How It All Started



The Men Responsible for the Tournament's Success

In 1926, when the Junior Division of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce first discussed a Los Angeles Open golf tournament to promote Los Angeles throughout America, the Junior Chamber did not have the far-reaching activities it does today. The tournament put the Junior Chamber on the map and allowed it to continue its existence and grow, as the members of the "senior" chamber had always been reluctant to let the "junior division" have more to do within the community.

Most of the details of the first tournament were arranged through Emerson Spear, the first president of the Junior Chamber and chairman of the first two tournaments. The first committee, the "Big Six", included: Emerson Spear, Everett Grubb, Leroy Carver, Bart Stebbins, Carl Kegley and Durward Howes.

Everett Grubb, president of the Junior Chamber in 1927, is the oldest living tournament Chairman. He is now retired and living in Riverside. Carl S. Kegley, president of the Junior Chamber in 1926, is the oldest living president of the Junior Chamber.

Carl Kegley, attorney, writes: "Emerson Spear, who was chairman of the Junior Chamber's golf club, heard that the first \$10,000 open golf tournament planned by the pros was in direct need of financial support. As usual, the group, anxious to jump in where angels fear to tread, decided to make every effort to help out.

"An appointment was made with the pros to meet at the Biltmore Hotel. Of those who were there, I recall Bart Stebbins, M. Spear, Carl Heintz, Mel Haldeman, myself and two others.

"We stopped in the lobby of the Biltmore and agreed that if the subject of money came up tell the pros 'to forget it' and that we would take care of that. The meeting went on and we told the pros that if they would take care of their end of it, meaning the golf professional end, we would see to the financial end.

"After the meeting, the committee stopped on Olive Street and, as we had just taken over a \$10,000 golf tournament, we decided to see how much cash we had on hand and where we stood. Out of all our pockets there was a total of \$87.00!

"We went on, of course, and with the aid of the merchants and a lot of leg work, and a loan from the Union Bank of \$3,500, we put on the first and very successful tournament."

Everett Grubb recalls that he, Mel Haldeman and Roy Carver were a committee of three to contact movie people and raise money to guarantee the purse. "M. Spear had a first tournament budget of \$17,000, and the three of us got busy contacting people to raise the money. I got \$1,000 from Douglas Fairbanks and another \$1,000 from another actor whose name I can't recall. Roy and Mel had a similar sort of success, but we were still well below the needed budget.

"Now one of the members of the original group was Norman Chandler, and he said, 'Let's go and see my dad and ask if he has any suggestions to make,' and made arrangements for us to meet with Harry Chandler. He heard out the story and called Guy Barham, publisher of the *Examiner* – and after a few minutes on the phone he turned to us and told us that the *Times* and the *Examiner* would guarantee the \$17,000."

The first tournament was financially successful and it was not necessary to call upon any of the guarantees. This, despite the story about Everett Crosby, brother of Bing Crosby, who was the tournament ticket chairman. As the story is told, Everett had a old Model 'A' Ford touring car, which had the top removed. He had to pick up the tickets from the printer and take them to the L.A. Open Committee meeting being held at the Wilshire Country Club. He put the tickets on the back seat of the Ford, and took off for the club – and left a trail of flying tickets along the boulevard – and no one knew how many of those tickets found their way into the first tournament.

Durward Howes, chairman of the board of B.D. Howes & Sons, and president of the Junior Chamber in 1928, felt that the tournament should be on a firmer foundation than the hard-sought guarantees. He proposed a fund-raising event and the Junior Chamber put on the first \$100-a-plate sportsman's banquet.

"It was the very first \$100-a-plate dinner ever held in the United States," recalls Durward Howes. "We had Will Rogers as master of ceremonies, and I remember he opened the evening by pulling a \$100 bill from his pocket and handing it to me and then telling the audience that he, too, was paying his hundred dollars 'like all the rest of you suckers ...'"

After the banquet, Durward Howes went to Arthur Arnoll, then general manager of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce, and gave him \$9,000, the proceeds of the banquet, for the underwriting of the 4th tournament, the first to be held at the Riviera Country Club.

The sportsman's banquets were continued for a few years, until they fell victim to the depression years and the purse of the tournament had to be reduced from the "golden \$10,000."

After the tournament was established, a winter tour was built with the addition of Phoenix, San Diego, San Francisco, and "the Crosby".

From these beginnings the tournament continued for nearly seven decades, with one gap for the World War II sports blackout, and the story is chronicled in these pages. The tournament has involved thousands of young men – and new young men and women – in its history, and has established thousands of lifetime friendships. It is hoped that it will continue to do so.

Billed as the "greatest golfing classic the West has ever known," the first Northern Trust Open Golf Tournament generated such interest that Damon Runyon was dispatched from New York to cover the \$10,000 event. This purse, the largest offered on the tour, was enough to attract Harry Cooper and amateur George Von Elm who waged a head-to-head battle against a field of 250 other entrants. Cooper managed to take command after the 14th hole, finishing with an eagle on the 18th for a 279 and a three-stroke victory margin.

The tourney belonged to Jimmy Thompson, who demolished the Griffith Park courses with a second-hand putter he had picked up for \$1 in a Pasadena pro shop three weeks before the tournament. Thompson and Willie Goggin shot spectacular 65s for a three-stroke lead in round one. The second day saw Thompson set a new 36-hole competitive record of 131. His spectacular 66 included a 50-foot downhill putt for a birdie on the ninth hole. Although stumbling a bit on the third round, he returned to form for a final round 68, setting a new tournament record 273, 12 under par. Johnny Revolta trailed by four strokes. This was the tournament that featured the legendary Babe Didrickson, who played the first two days, shooting 84-81 for a 165. She failed to make the cut, but was the first woman ever to play in a men's golf tournament.

Defending champions Jimmy Thompson and Harry Cooper were featured as the banquet was broadcast coast-to-coast over the Mutual System. In what looked like a replay of the previous year, Jim Demaret fired a 66 in the opening round. He started off round two with bogeys on two of the first three holes, but recovered for a 68. Demaret shot a par 71 on round three, but opened the final round with a birdie and added an eagle on the eighth hole. His best shot, however, came on the 15th hole. With his drive 50 feet short of the pin and behind a slight hill, Demaret used a wedge to sail the ball over the hill and roll it on the cup. Truman predicted that 1948 would be a very good year. And it was, at least for Ben Hogan, who was to win the PGA, US Open and capture his third Northern Trust Open crown. More than 400 golfers came to try for only 150 spots, requiring a nine-course qualifying. Walter Hagen showed up half an hour late for his starting time and was disqualified. Deciding that his course record in 1947 wasn't good enough, Hogan opened with a 68, then followed with two 70s and a 67 for an amazing nine-under-par 275. His record would not be equalled for 25 years. Later that year, Hogan returned to the Riviera course for the US Open, almost equalling his record with a 276, for his third straight victory at Riviera.

Four-time winner MacDonald Smith played in his 23rd consecutive Northern Trust Open — also his last. 

The 30th Northern Trust Open was indeed a memorable tournament, as records fell and the purse rose to \$32,500. Defending champion Gene Littler was the pre-tourney favorite. However, it was Lloyd Mangrum right from the start, firing a 66 as he pushed towards his fourth Northern Trust Open win. He turned in another in round two, but was overshadowed by Tommy Bolt's performance. Bolt went out in 33, then fired six straight birdies on the back nine, with no birdie putt longer than 20 feet. His most spectacular moment came on the 506-yard ninth hole. After firing one out-of-bounds and taking a two-stroke penalty, he saved par by sinking a 31-foot putt. His 63 was a tournament record. Mangrum continued his own record-setting play with a 68 for a record three-round total of 200. He could do no better than 72 in the final round, but he set a new tournament record and joined the late MacDonald Smith as the only four-time winners of the tournament.

Ken Venturi's final round 63 brought him from eight strokes off the lead to win the 1959 Northern Trust Open. This will probably remain as one of the most memorable rounds in the tournament's history. Venturi entered the tournament as one of the favorites along with Billy Casper, Dow Finsterwald, Arnold Palmer and Art Wall, Jr. But it was colorful Johnny Bulla, with his baseball style grip, who surprised the field with a first round 64 to take the lead. Round three was Art Wall's showcase as he followed his second round 68 with another 68 to take the lead with a total of 207. At that point, Venturi was in the unenviable position of being eight strokes behind the leader Art Wall's at 215. The next day Venturi took revenge by shooting a six-under-par 30 on the front side, including back-to-back eagles on eight and nine, three more birdies on the back nine, bogeying only number 12, and finishing with the lowest final round score in the history of the tournament.

Four-time winner Lloyd Mangrum served as honorary chairman of the 39th tournament as the purse climbed to \$70,000. Billy Casper started things off with a 66, followed by defending champion Paul Harney at 68. Casper held on to his lead in round two while Harney picked up a stroke. Shooting a second 68 in round three, Harney pulled ahead by two. A final round 69 made Harney the second man to win two consecutive tournaments, the first being Ben Hogan in 1947 - 48. This feat was even more spectacular considering that Harney had just recovered from a two-week bout with pneumonia and had time for only two practice rounds. 

Fred Marti, just recovering from pneumonia, took the first round lead with a 65. Round two ended in a tie between former winner Charles Sifford and Tommy Aaron at 134. The 49th Northern Trust Open was billed as a confrontation between Jack Nicklaus and Johnny Miller, with defending champion Dave Stockton bent on making it two in a row. Nicklaus eagled the first hole in round one, but the lead went to Lee Trevino with a 66. Only two players broke par in round two due to high winds. Round three saw the emergence of the virtually unknown Pat Fitzsimons, who set a new course record with a seven under par 64. With only one bogey and six birdies, his most spectacular shot was an eagle on 11 requiring a 75-foot putt from the front edge of the green. Starting round four with a six-stroke lead, the young player withstood pressure from Nicklaus, who turned in a 65 and Tom Kite, with a 68. Fitzsimons' 70 gave him his first tour victory and tied the Riviera course record set by Ben Hogan in 1948.


Tom Watson

In one of the greatest Northern Trust Open comebacks, Tom Watson defeated Johnny Miller on the third hole of a sudden death playoff to capture the title. The tournament began with an exceptional round by virtual unknown Terry Mauney, who shot an eight-under-par 63 to set a new Riviera Course record. Mauney led Tom Weiskopf, Wayne Levi and Mike Morley by four strokes after the first round. Weiskopf then took the second round lead by shooting another 67 for a two round total of an eight-under-par 134. The third round ended with a pair of leaders as both Weiskopf and Johnny Miller finished play at an 11-under-par 202. Tom Watson trailed the co-leaders by two strokes. The final of the tournament was all Miller and Watson and it looked as if Miller had wrapped up the championship. But he bogeyed the 17th and 18th holes while Watson was dropping in a four-foot par putt to send the Northern Trust Open into its first overtime since 1952.

David Edwards began the final day of play two shots off the lead and two over par for the tournament. He immediately birdied the first two holes to take a share of the lead, led by two at the turn, and never looked back as he won his first PGA TOUR title. The week preceding the final day was frustrating for most pros. Winds whipped the course at speeds up to 40 m.p.h. There was a seven-way tie for the top spot after the first round at one-under par. Second and third round scores also hovered around par. Sunday brought calm and sunny relief for the leaders as well as the gallery that had shied away from the winds. Jack Nicklaus was clearly the crowd favorite going into the last day, but he was sapped on the first hole after three-putting for a bogey. It was an uphill climb for him to shoot a 69 and finish alone in third. Jay Haas, Fred Couples and Jack Renner were tied at the top of the leader board going into day four. Haas dropped out of contention, bumping his way to a 76 finish, tied for 13th. Couples had trouble early and was five-over after four holes. He ended tied for eighth. Renner was the only golfer left with a chance of forcing a playoff with Edwards. His drive off the 18th landed in the rough 221 yards out. Renner, needing to hole-out from there to force a tie, hit a shot that rolled off the green and had to salvage a bogey, and settle for second place. Edwards record low score of 64 on the final day was added to his record high total of 279. The card was the highest winning score at the Riviera since Lloyd Mangrum's 280 in 1953, and the highest in the tournament since Paul Harney's 280 at Rancho Park in 1964.

Lanny Wadkins

Lanny Wadkins captured his second Northern Trust Open title in record-setting style shooting a 20-under-par 264 (63-70-67-64), seven strokes in front of second place finisher Hal Sutton. In the first round of tournament play, Wadkins shot a 63, eight-under-par, which tied the Riviera Course record set by Terry Mauney in the 1982 Northern Trust Open. Wadkins' 31-32 round over the par 35-36 course surprisingly didn't put him far ahead of the rest of the field. Pat Lindsey and local favorite Tony Sills both shot rounds of 31-34 for a six-under 65 and a share of second place. Unfortunately for Wadkins, he didn't get to admire his spectacular record-tying for long. In the second round, 26-year-old Larry Mize broke Mauney's and Wadkins' record, firing an incredible 29 on the front and 33 on the back for a course-shattering 62. Both Hal Sutton and Gary Koch equaled their first round 66 for a second round score of 132 and a share of the lead with Mize. Wadkins shot a 70 for 133 total. In the final round, Pavin shot a 70 for a third place finish, and Chip Beck, Gary Koch and Craig Stadler ended tied for fourth at 273.

In front of a Riviera record crowd of 41,352, 36-year-old Doug Tewell recorded eight birdies en route to an eight-under-par 63, for a 14-under 270, a seven stroke victory over Clarence Rose (277), and a winner's check of \$81,000. Tewell was three strokes behind first round leaders Jay Delsing (a second year pro out of UCLA) and Fresno State product Dennis Trixler who each shot 33-33, 66. Bob Gilder and Mac O'Grady carded 68s, while seven players were in at 69. After 36 holes, Mac O'Grady shot his second 68 (which included a hole-in-one on six) for a six-under-par 136, good enough for a one-stroke lead over Trixler who shot a second round 71 for a 137 two-day total. Mark Lye shot a 66 for 138, and Lennie Clements and Jim Colbert were in at 139. Tewell and defending champion Lanny Wadkins both made their moves in the third round. Tewell birdied the first six holes, which put him at fiveunder-par 66 (207) with a one shot lead over Wadkins, Trixler and Willie Wood who all were at 208 after 54 holes. Trixler shot a third round 71, while both Wadkins and Wood shot 67s. The final day saw Tewell card a 63 for a runaway seven stroke (270) victory. Clarence Rose, a five-year pro out of Goldsboro, NC, shot a 68 to finish second at 277, good for \$48,600. Jay Delsing and Jim Gallagher shot 68 and 69 respectively finishing tied for fourth at 279. After a hole-in-one on number six in the third round, which led to a 67, 204 total, 28-year-old Tze-Chung Chen went into the final round the sole leader with Danny Edwards (205), Bobby Wadkins (206) and "everybody's favorite" Ben Crenshaw (206) on his heels. The stage was then set. And on February 22, a Riviera record crowd of 46,100 was about to witness to the first Northern Trust Open overtime since Tom Watson completed one of the greatest comebacks defeating Johnny Miller on the third hole of a sudden-death playoff in 1982. By the time Chen, Crenshaw and Edwards reached the 18th green, all had putts over 15 feet for birdie. All were tied for the lead. Crenshaw was away. Putting first, his straight-away 15 footer dropped for birdie and the lead. With the crowd still restless from Crenshaw's shot, Edwards hit. But his putt never came close. It was now all up to Chen and his 16 footer to force a tie and a playoff with the 35-year old Texan. Chen's par on #15 (the playoff hole) was good enough to win the \$108,000 first place check. Crenshaw was in trouble from the start when his drive landed left on a dirt road. He wound up bogeying the hole and settling for \$64,800 and second place.

Jay Haas, along with Chip Beck, Dan Pohl and Jumbo Ozaki all were tied atop the leaderboard at the end of the first day at 65. Round two saw Ben Crenshaw shoot 64 (two shots off Larry Mize's course record), to share the lead with Haas at 133. Crenshaw wasn't alone in the "assault on Riviera" department. Going into the final day, Ted Tryba had a two-stroke lead much to the credit of a tournament record 61 in the third round. However, Tryba lost his lead by the third hole on Sunday and, at the turn, found himself in a three way tie with Tiger Woods and Ernie Els. At the 11th hole, Tryba took a one-stroke lead with a 15 foot birdie putt. However, Els tied Tryba with a 20 foot putt on the 12th hole. Meanwhile, Woods, who hadn't bogeyed the back nine all week, did so on the 13th hole due to an errant drive. Els maintained his lead; however, the 23-year-old South African left a small opening for Tryba and Woods by missing a four foot putt on the 18th hole. Needing birdies to force a playoff, Woods and Tryba both missed the green on their approach shots. Woods hit it right, 15 yards down an enbankment and into a concession stand, while Tryba was chipping just off the putting surface. Both chips were slightly over 12 feet, and both were missed. Davis Love III, the third man in the group, parred the hole with a four foot putt to tie for second place. Els, who was playing his first PGA TOUR event since the Canadian Open in September, won his seventh TOUR event and moved past the \$5 million dollar mark in career earnings. Els stated after his victory, "The Northern Trust Open is definitely one of the most prestigious stops on the tour because of its history. Now I can say I'm part of that history".

Davis Love III had a three-stroke lead going into the final round of the tournament's 75th Anniversary event. However, with his lead cut to only one stroke with four holes left to play, Love finished with a disastrous four over par, eliminating him from any chance of victory. Both Robert Allenby and Jeff Sluman only needed a par on the final hole to force their two-man playoff; however, they both bogeyed, thus joining four other players in a tie for the lead after regulation play. Riviera's 451-yard 18th hole was playing extremely difficult on the rain-soaked course and only one birdie was carded on this historic finishing hole. In the playoff, only Bob Tway and Allenby reached the green in regulation. Tway's approach shot landed 35 feet from the pin, just barely on the putting surface. Then Allenby, 220 yards from the pin using his 3-wood, hit his shot just six feet from the hole. After Tway's putt finished just short of the hole. Allenby converted his winning putt for his third PGA TOUR victory while improving his playoff record to 7 and 0 as a professional.

Len Mattiace

After 220 attempts at a victory on the PGA TOUR, Len Mattiace finally achieved his goal. Along the way, he also won his largest paycheck of \$666,000. However, it didn't come easy as Scott McCarron tried his best to maintain his final round lead on the way to what would have been the fourth victory of his career. Going into the 12th hole with a three-stroke lead, McCarron felt it was his tournament to win or lose. After all, in his three victories on the PGA TOUR, each came after having the 54-hole lead. However, McCarron bogeved two of his final three holes and three putted the 18th green, which was only good enough for a share of second. The real hard luck case was Brad Faxon who missed birdie putts of 8 and 12 feet down the stretch. Then, on the 18th green, he missed a 12 foot putt that would have tied him for the lead and a playoff with Mattiace. Also, Rory Sabbatini had a chance for a playoff, but failed to get up and down from the rough on 17 and tied for 2nd place with McCarron and Faxon with a 270 total score. In the end, it was a great day for Mattiace. The 34-year old from Jacksonville, Florida closed with a 68 on the final day for the victory.

Charles Howell III held a three-stroke lead over veteran Nick Price, four strokes over K.J. Choi and five-strokes over last year's tournament champion Len Mattiace and 2002 PGA Champion Rich Beam. However, with the leaders failing to break par, Mike Weir, trailing by seven strokes at the beginning of the day, shot a 66 – good enough to force a playoff hole – before he headed for the 10th tee. Howell, who bogeyed the hole in regulation after hitting his tee shot behind a tree on the left, drove into the far right bunker, thereby leaving an almost impossible shot to get close. Meanwhile, Weir played to the middle of the fairway then put his approach eight feet from the pin. In a miraculous shot, Howell came out of the bunker to within six feet. However, after Weir sunk the birdie putt, Howell missed his birdie opportunity. The win was Weir's second of the season after winning the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic just three weeks earlier.

Mike Weir

In 2003, Mike Weir won the tournament after trailing the field by seven strokes on the final day of play. This year, Weir came into the final round with a seemingly comfortable five-stroke lead over Shigeki Maruyama, six strokes over Jeff Maggert and seven strokes over Scott McCarron. After starting out strong on the first three holes, Weir's lead increased to seven strokes over Maruyama. However, after a couple of bogeys, things started to fall into place for Maruyama. By the 16th hole, after sinking his putt for birdie, Maruyama tied Weir at 17 under. Weir, who had come from behind in the final round for all of his six previous wins, took an optimistic view. "If you told me at the beginning of the week I would be tied going into the last hole of the tournament, I would be happy with that." With the rain beginning to fall harder, Maruyama, hitting first, drove into the right rough, 217 yards from the pin. Weir followed with a drive down the middle, 205 away. Then after Maruyama's second shot landed 41 yards short, Weir put himself in a difficult sidehill lie about 45 feet from the flagstick. Maruyama left himself a 12 foot putt, and Weir, after almost holing out a fantastic chip shot, left himself a 16 inch putt. Maruyama missed his par putt and Weir knocked it in for his back-to-back victory. Weir became only the fifth player to win back-toback, sharing the honor with MacDonald Smith, Ben Hogan, Arnold Palmer, Paul Harney and Corey Pavin.

In 2005, Southern California was pummeled by days of unforgiving rain during tournament week. In fact, it was the worst rain storm in 50 years. Riviera Country Club, home of the 2005 Northern Trust Open, was inundated by five inches of rain in 48 hours. With course conditions making continuation of the tournament impossible. The event was shortened to a 36 hole event for the first time in the tournament's 79year history. With Adam Scott and Chad Campbell tied for the lead at nine under par, tournament officials elected to have a sudden death play off on Monday morning. Starting the playoff on the famous 18th hole in the rain, both Scott and Campbell reached the soggy green in regulation. Scott made his four footer for par. Then, what seemed to be a certain continuation of the playoff turned into disaster when Campbell missed his three foot putt to give Scott what should have been his fourth win on the PGA TOUR. However, as a footnote, although the full purse was awarded to the field, the 36-hole event was not considered an official win on the PGA TOUR since it did not satisfy the 54 hole requirement.

Rory Sabbatini

Rory Sabbatini closed with a one-over 72 – the highest final round by a winner at Riviera Country Club since 1977 - and had few complaints. He outlasted Riviera favorite Fred Couples, won for the first time in three years on the PGA TOUR and finally had something to show for his strong start to the season. The clincher was a 45-foot lag putt on the 18th hole to within a foot, leaving him a tap-in for par to avoid a playoff with defending champion Adam Scott. Scott started the final day nine shots behind, shot 31 on the back nine to close with a 64. Couples, a two-time winner at the Northern Trust Open, caught Sabbatini on the 12th hole and stood over an eight-foot birdie putt on the 13th for the outright lead. He left that short, then ran into trouble with bogeys on three of his last four holes for a 71 to finish fourth. Craig Barlow, who also had a share of the lead with three holes to play, missed two short putts down the stretch and had to settle for a 70 that left him in third. Sabbatini finished at 13-under 271 and earned \$918,000 for his third PGA TOUR victory. The win shot him to the top of the TOUR money list with more than \$2.1 million. He finished the season 12th on the list.

Charles Howell III

Charles Howell III made the putt and slammed the door with an improbable playoff victory over Phil Mickelson at the 2007 event. Howell had gone four years and nine runner-up finishes since his lone PGA TOUR victory. At almost every turn Sunday, he was confronted with so many of his past failures - all the putts he missed, the 10th hole at Riviera that denied him victory in 2003, a chip that cost him a month earlier in Honolulu. He erased those memories with three clutch pars in the playoff, the last one on a solid chip to three feet and a putt that felt like more like 30. Four shots down at the turn, Howell closed with a six-under 65 and faced Mickelson in the longest playoff at Riviera in 25 years until Mickelson missed a 10-foot par try on the 14th. "I had every chance on the back nine to create some separation and not give anyone a chance," said Mickelson, who twice missed putts inside four feet and closed with a 68. "I felt like I had the tournament in my grasp and let it go." Coming off a five-shot victory at Pebble Beach where he tied a tournament scoring record, Mickelson was poised to get in the Riviera record books until he stumbled along the back nine. He missed a two-foot par putt on the 13th, then misplayed a four-foot birdie putt on the 16th hole to fall into a share of the lead. Needing a par to win, he came up short on the 18th and hit a pedestrian chip to 18 feet and took bogey. "I had the tournament in control," Mickelson said. "It happens. It's part of the game." They finished at 16-under 268.

Phil Mickelson

Phil Mickelson avenged his 2007 playoff loss to Charles Howell III at Riviera Country Club, becoming only the 2nd left-hander to win since Mike Weir in 2003 and 2004. It was a one-under final round that enabled Mickelson to garner his first victory of the 2008 season and his 33rd PGA TOUR title. Finishing with a 12-under-par 272, he bested his fellow Arizona State Sun Devil Jeff Quinney to win the 2008 Northern Trust Open. "I think it has some of the greatest holes on the PGA TOUR, and it's fun to play well here, because early in my career I did not. This was really the first year I played well here and to break through with a victory feels terrific." Mickelson reversed the memories of last year's failings. "I felt I had the tournament won last year and I bogeyed 18. I didn't want to get ahead of myself. I wanted to try to play each shot smart coming down the stretch and not get too emotional." This strategy proved successful, but he was aided by Quinney's four bogeys over the last six holes of Sunday's round. The two matched birdies on the par-5 11th and again with pars on the par-4 12th before Mickelson's concluded with a string of three pars to round out the final holes for the win.

HOLE #1 • 503 yards • par 5

"Standing on the first tee and looking down on the first hole is frightening. The fairway looks like a bowling alley. It's not your basic security hole; but at the same time, you can jump right out of the box and pop up with an eagle."

HOLE #2 • 463 yards • par 4

HOLE #6 • 199 yards • par 3

"No. 6 is one of the most recognizable holes at Riviera, with the bunker in the middle of the green. I think it's a great concept. This could be a pivotal hole Saturday or Sunday, when officials place the pin to the left of the bunker. If you hit a bad shot to the right, you're looking at a bogey."

HOLE #8 • 433 yards • par 4

"I have more trouble playing No. 8 than I do playing No. 4. It's an excellent driving hole, but you've got to drive unbelievably straight to get it through the narrow opening in the trees. If you succeed, you've only got a wedge or so and a possible birdie."

HOLE #9 • 458 yards • par 4

"It's a beautiful hole with that majestic clubhouse sitting on top of the hill. The second shot is deceiving to an uphill green that slopes toward you. I always try and stay below the pin, otherwise you have no chance above it or beyond the green."

"This is one of the greatest par-4 holes in the world. It's only 308 yards, doesn't have an out of bounds or a water hazard, but it's a very demanding hole. HOLE #11 • 583 yards • par 5

"This is probably as good a par-5 as you would want to play anywhere. It's not reachable in two for me, and I would think there are not many players who could reach the green in two. Those big eucalyptus trees on the right make it the kind of par-5, where if you're not careful, you can make a high score."

HOLE #12 • 479 yards • par 4

This is a deceiving hole because sometimes it looks a little shorter than it actually is. It's the widest green on the course and is split level. Unless your tee shot is reasonably close, you can three-put this baby."

HOLE #15 • 487 yards • par 4

"This is a magnificent hole and will loom very big during the tournament. It's a dogleg right, so you must fade both your drive and second shot, while keeping it away from the eucalyptus trees on the right. You have to hit a long iron into a two-tiered green that has some subtle undulations. I'll take my par here anytime."

HOLE #16 • 166 yards • par 3

"It's the shortest hole on the course and one of the most intimidating. Believe it or not, No. 16 can cause a lot of problems. The bunkers are so high they give you the illusion that the green is really smaller that it is. It's a crucial hole because if you're trying to get in with a good score, 16 can eat your lunch. It's the kind of hole where you can make a double bogey if you hit a bad shot or get unlucky and plug it in the bunker-tip."

HOLE #17 • 590 yards • par 5

"Riviera has so many great holes that when you look at 17, you figure you only have to muscle up two big woods and a wedge. But length isn't its only characteristic. If you're long, especially when the pin is cut on the second tier, you have no chance of getting it close."

HOLE #18 • 475 yards • par 4

"This is my favorite hole at Riviera. You've got to hit two excellent shots. Too far right with the drive and you have tall eucalyptus trees to contend with. Your second shot to the green must be on target. Too far left and the ball stays in the kikuyu grass with little chance to pitch it close to the hole. It's a strong and excellent finishing hole."

The Northern Trust Open Facts and Firsts

- The first Northern Trust Open was staged in 1926 by the Los Angeles Junior Chamber
 of Commerce (LAJCC) to promote the still-young city of Los Angeles throughout the
 country. An unheard of \$10,000 purse was offered and the tournament caused a
 nationwide stir.
- The first Northern Trust Open held at Riviera Country Club was in 1929. Riviera was less than two years old. This year will mark the 46th tournament hosted by Riviera.
- The 1929 Northern Trust Open was the first golf tournament broadcast on the radio.
- The first woman to play in a PGA men's event was "Babe" Didrickson Zaharias at the 1938 Northern Trust Open.
- In 1942, Ben Hogan won the tournament for the first time. Hogan became the first three-time winner of the Northern Trust Open with his victory in 1948.
- The Northern Trust Open defied the PGA ban on black players by allowing boxing great Joe Louis to compete in the 1952 tournament. Louis became the first African-American to compete in a PGA event.
- The Northern Trust Open became the first golf tournament ever televised locally in 1953 and the first nationally televised tournament in 1966.
- The Northern Trust Open gave unknown Jack Nicklaus an exemption to the 1962 tournament, where he picked up his first check as a professional \$33.33.
- Golf pioneer Charles Sifford opens the tournament in 1969 with an amazing 63 on his way to a playoff victory.
- In 1992, 16-year-old Tiger Woods received an exemption to play in his first tournament and shot 72-75 to narrowly miss the cut.
- The Northern Trust Open is the oldest civic-sponsored event on the PGA Tour.

Media Regulations

General Regulations

The following regulations are to be followed by all members of the media:

- 1. **AN ARMBAND IS NECESSARY** to walk inside the gallery ropes. Remain close up against gallery ropes in such a way as to appear to be a part of the gallery at all times.
- DO NOT interview players or ask them to pose for photographs during their practice sessions before their round except by prior agreement with the player.
- 3. **DO NOT** disturb players at their 18th green and/or scoring tent until after they have checked, signed and returned their scorecards.
- 4. If an interview is to be conducted in the practice areas, either the range or the putting green, it must be done by PRIOR ARRANGEMENT WITH THE PLAYER and up against the ropes, NOT in areas where it could be distracting the other players.

Working Press Regulations

To avoid embarrassment to you and distraction to the contestants:

- 1. **DO NOT** walk or stand in playing areas.
- 2. Follow directions of marshals and other officials.
- 3. **DO NOT** interview during play. The leading players each day and others requested will be interviewed following their rounds in the Media Tent interview area.

Tape Recorder Regulations

- All tape recorder work should be done in the proximity of the Media Tent or the Clubhouse.
- 2. Tape recorders are **NOT** permitted in the locker room.
- 3. Tape recorders are **NOT** permitted within the playing area of the golf course.

Photography Regulations

This Tournament is essentially for the players and spectators. Fair play requires that there be no noise or other distractions. The interests of all others must be subordinated to the players' interests. The result of any one shot could decide the tournament.

Only **ACCREDITED PHOTOGRAPHERS** for **RECOGNIZED NEWS MEDIA** will be permitted to take pictures during the Tournament. Photography will be restricted to news use. Commercial and personal photography is prohibited (except that spectators may take pictures on practice days and during a Pro-Am).

The following regulations apply to accredited news and television photographers and videotape cameramen as a condition of the privilege of taking pictures:

General - All Photographers

- A photographer must not ask a player to pose or in any way verbally distract a player during a round.
- If a player or an official requests that no photographs be taken in a certain situation, the request must be honored immediately, without discussion.
- A camera must not be pointed at a player about to make a stroke in any manner which might tend to disturb him or distract his attention.
- At the 9th and the 18th greens, photographers must not approach, delay or distract
 a player until he has checked, signed and returned his scorecard to the proper
 official. Under the rules of golf, a player turning in an incorrect scorecard in
 stroke play may be disqualified.
- · Cameras are not permitted in the locker room.
- Use of golf carts or other means of transportation on the course during tournament play is prohibited.

Still Photographers

- Only still photographers to whom armbands have been issued will be permitted
 inside gallery ropes. They must station themselves immediately inside such ropes,
 and not more than an ARM'S LENGTH FROM THE ROPES, so as to blend into the
 gallery and appear to be part of the gallery. They must not take conspicuous positions
 in the open. Any photographer who violates this regulation will forfeit the right to
 working inside the ropes and possibly to work at the tournament.
- · Close-up action shots are prohibited.
- All pictures must be taken at appreciable distances, as far from the players as
 possible and from angles which are not acute to the line of play.

Photography Regulations

continued

- When working at a green, photographers must not position themselves directly in a player's putting line.
- Pictures, even from a distance, may not be made until the player has completed his stroke. The photographer must not release his camera shutter until the shot is made.

Television/Videotape Cameramen

- Television and videotape filming may be done from inside the gallery ropes, or from
 areas approved by the PGA TOUR. All camera personnel who have been issued
 PHOTO armbands will be permitted inside the gallery lines, but this does not include
 other members of the crew. Camera personnel must station themselves immediately
 inside the gallery lines, not more than an arm's length from those lines, so as to blend
 into the gallery. They must not take conspicuous positions in the open.
- Filming may be done from such locations during a player's stroke, provided modern equipment that produces a minimum of noise is used.
- Post-round interviews must be filmed far enough away from the arena of play to eliminate the possibility of distraction to those competing.
- Difficulties will be avoided if photographers are fair and will treat players as they themselves would wish to be treated in similar circumstances.
- The cooperation of all photographers will be appreciated.
