Cejka in Charge

Las Vegas Resident Paired with Tiger Woods in Final Round

Alex Cejka walks fast, plays fast and chews his gum quickly. He likes to play aggressively and described his third-round, even-par 72 on Saturday as "trying to hang in there like a pit bull."

Today, the 38-year-old Las Vegas resident and native of what is now the Czech Republic carries a record five-stroke lead into the final round of THE PLAYERS Championship. He is at 11-under par and holds a career-first 54-hole outright lead in a PGA TOUR event. He has yet to win on TOUR. Making his task more difficult is Tiger Woods, the world's top golfer, shares second at 6-under par and will be in his final twosome at 2:25 p.m.

"I'm wearing a red shirt tomorrow myself and black pants," said Cejka,

making the same fashion choice as Woods does every Sunday. "So hopefully it works for me, too. We'll see. It's nice to watch the best player in the world, but I've got to focus on my game tomorrow and let him work a little bit."

Cejka completed his round with a short birdie putt on the 18th green to reach 11-under par, five ahead of six players at 6-under, including Woods, two-time U.S. Open champion Retief Goosen, St. Simons Island, GA, resident Jonathan Byrd, first-round leader Ben Crane, Sweden's Henrik Stenson and England's Ian Poulter.

Woods finished off a 2-under-par 70 approximately two hours before the final group would come home. He birdied the 16th and 17th holes to reach 6-under and kept inching up

the leaderboard as the contenders floundered under the hard-and-fast conditions.

All faltered except for Cejka, who has matured in his 30s after a sometimes stubborn start to his professional career.

"No, I don't get mad," Cejka said of his emotions on the course. "Those days are over. I got mad in my 20s. Now I just play the game...Back in my early 20s, I hit driver on every hole. It didn't matter if there was water, out of bounds or a landing area of 10 yards...I'm almost back to my years then. I'm more aggressive."

How did he expect to deal with the pressure on Saturday night?

"Japanese food, a shower and watch some sitcoms, the usual," he said with a laugh.

Strong Finish Vaults Woods into Final Pairing Today

As TPC Sawgrass dried out, Tiger Woods kept climbing the leaderboard. Tied for 22nd when he began the third round, Woods shot a 2-under 70 and jumped into a tie for second with five players, at 6-under. Because he was the first player to post at 6-under, Woods will play in the final pairing today with Alex Cejka.

"It's playing just like a major championship," Woods said of TPC Sawgrass' condition. "It's fast, it's hard, it's dry. And you just have to keep plodding along."

Woods made his move Saturday with back-to-back birdies on Nos. 16 and 17. He two-putted from 43 feet on the par-5 16th then thrilled the huge gallery assembled at No. 17 by knocking his tee shot to 8 feet and making the putt.

"It was really fast. I played almost a foot-and-a-half of break there," Woods said of 17. "And I was joking with Stevie (Williams, his caddie), thank goodness I'm wearing spikes. At least I can hold myself on that slope."

That birdie putt didn't bring out the loudest cheer of the day, for Woods, however. That came on the front nine, at No. 6, when he made a 47-footer for birdie, one of five birdies he made on the day.

"It was a double-breaking putt, left to right and right to left at the end. It's nice to get back out here and play a golf course this fast. I really enjoy it," he said. "I think this is how we've always thought this golf course should be played. Hard and fast."

With temperatures expected to reach the 90s again tomorrow, hard and fast is a given.

Retief Goosen

Goosen in Similar Position to 2006; Looks for Different Result

Retief Goosen asked the question and essentially answered it at the same time. "You always want to be one or two shots better, don't you?" the South African said after his 1-under 71 Saturday that left him at 6-under for the tournament, tied for second with five others.

A couple of those shots he alluded to came on the final two holes, what he called his "poor finish." On the par-3 17th hole, Goosen missed a 9-foot birdie putt. He then bogeyed the final hole when he couldn't get up and down from right of the green.

"I had a perfect tee shot on the last, and I was stuck in between a hard 9 (-iron) and a soft 8," he said

of his second-shot approach. "I went for a soft 8 and made a poor swing."

Even with struggles on the last two holes, Goosen finds himself only five shots off the lead, putting him in position to win his second TOUR event this season (Transitions Championship).

Goosen was in a similar situation to this one in 2006 when he began the final round of THE PLAYERS four strokes behind Stephen Ames. Despite shooting a 3-under 69 in the final round, he still lost by six strokes to Ames. Goosen, the owner of seven PGA TOUR titles, looks for a different result today.

"[It's] going to be an interesting day," he said. "You still need to hit the ball well. It's going to be tough."

The Champions at 16, 17 and 18

The final three holes at TPC Sawgrass feature a risk-reward par 5 at No. 16, the famous par-3 17th and the finishing 18th hole, a par 4 that is traditionally one of the most-difficult closing holes in golf. The winners of THE PLAYERS Championship at TPC Sawgrass have both dominated those holes — as Fred Couples did in 1996 when he was 7-under for the week —

and struggled. Hal Sutton was 4-over there in 2000.

Alex Cejka, who goes into the final round of the 2009 PLAYERS with the lead, is a combined 3-under on the holes in his first three rounds. Of those near the top of the leaderboard, Tiger Woods and Jonathan Byrd have had the most success on the holes. They are a cumulative 4-under this week.

BEHIND THE SCENES: THE PLAYERS Championship Media Center

As the media landscape continues to change, one thing that remains constant is that people want to read, listen or watch – or all three – to find information about THE PLAYERS Championship. What did Tiger shoot? How many balls went in the water at 17? When do the leaders tee off?

Answering those questions are writers, broadcasters and photographers who, when not following players on the course, are doing their work inside the Media Center, an out-of-the-public's view building just to the east of the TPC Sawgrass

clubhouse. This year, THE PLAYERS Championship credentialed 720 working members of the media (not including those from GOLF CHANNEL and NBC Sports). Those 720 represent 192 different organizations from five continents, including publications some First Coasters see on a regular basis, such as the *USA Today*, the *New York Times*, *Sports Illustrated* and, of course, the *Florida Times-Union*. Others, like *Jyllands-Posten*, the largest-circulation daily newspaper in Denmark, aren't typically arriving in plastic bags on Ponte Vedra residents' driveways. Regardless of

the journalists' affiliations, they're all doing their jobs in a state-of-the-art facility that meets their needs.

At the front of the room, projected onto screens, are computer-generated scores of each player. Also scattered throughout the building are high-definition TVs showing the NBC telecast as well as Live@17, courtesy of PGATOUR.COM.

All the while, writers work on their stories, columns and blogs, and broadcasters are in booths at the rear of the building doing what they're paid to do: disseminating news from THE PLAYERS.

Throughout the day, moms should keep an eye on the electronic scoreboards to see a Mother's Day message as part of THE PLAYERS tribute to these special ladies.



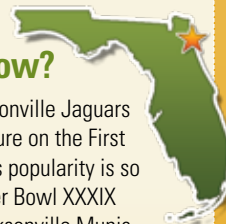
Thanks for Shopping

- Jacksonville has more than 111,000 acres of parks, which make up the country's largest urban park system.

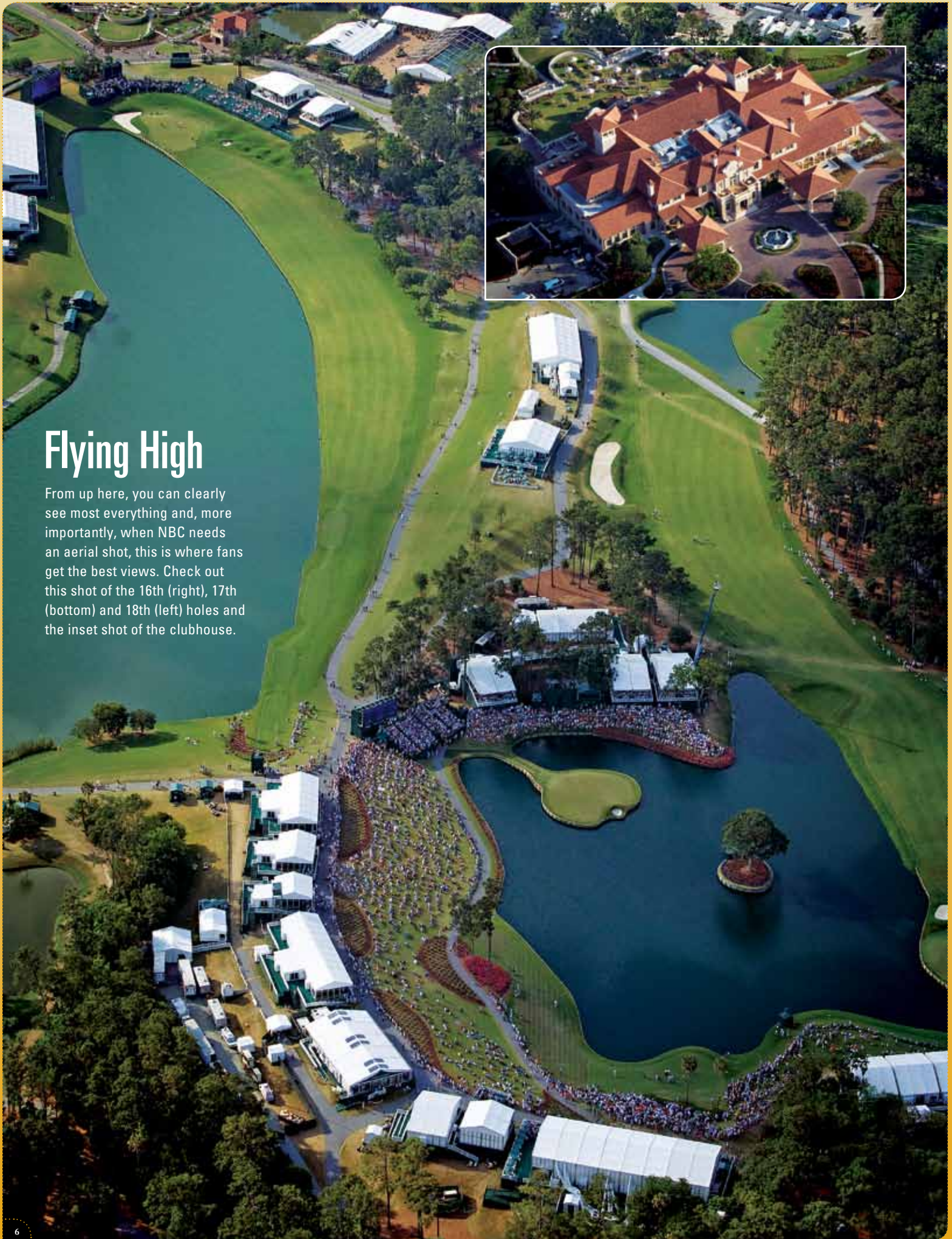

Stadium Village

THE PLAYERS Stadium Village is a place where fans can once again attempt to hit the 17th green on the UBS 17th Challenge, try some of THE PLAYERS' famous final putts on a replica of the 18th green or have their pictures taken

with a photo of 2008 champion Sergio Garcia as he eyes a putt — all at no charge. This year, all fans enter the area through "THE PLAYERS Shop" that includes a strong retail presence. Dining will also be available inside the area — which will include shaded

seating for the first time — including new features such as Morton's steak sandwiches. A bag check and shipping center is also available. Additionally, new this year is a business center where fans can stay connected by checking their e-mail.



Please Keep Hydrated!



After one of the warmest events in PLAYERS history last year, officials have announced two initiatives aimed to give fans easy and affordable access to water. The price of bottled water, available at all concession stands, will be \$2.50. In addition, there will be numerous drinking fountains (also known as Hydration Stations) available for the public to use free

of charge throughout the course.

Approximately 60 volunteers donate more than 150 hours of first aid and medical services every year at THE PLAYERS. Volunteers typically treat around 75-100 patients during the tournament week, with about 12 percent of those patients being transported to the Baptist Medical Center Beaches Emergency Center for further treatment.

"If you are one of the many people who do not like the bland taste of water,

don't fret. There are ways to ensure proper hydration and great taste. If purified water and bottled water still are not enough for you, mix water and fruit juice, try sparkling water options, or eat fruits—which can provide a great source of hydration. Just don't forget to get your water in somewhere — it is always the best option."

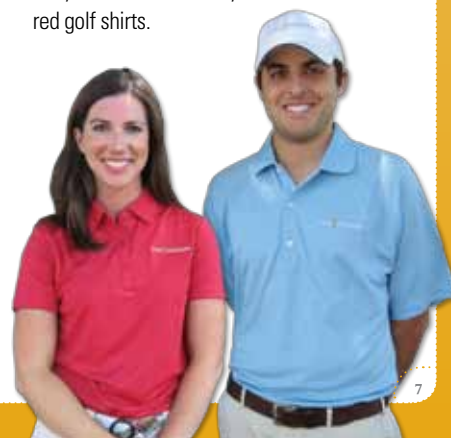

Ambassadors, answering questions and directing spectators around the course. They can be identified by their cardinal red golf shirts.



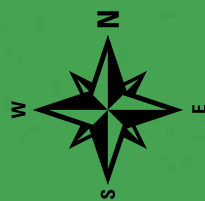

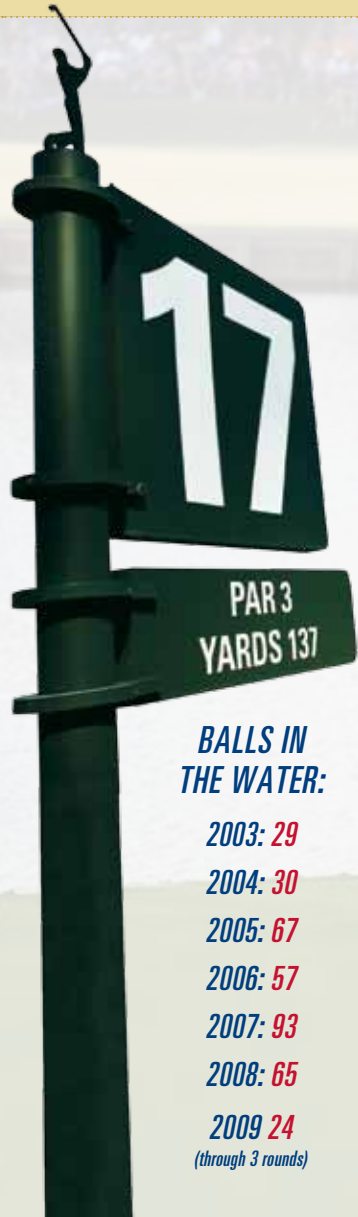

161 The number of holes-in-one made by amateurs and professionals from when the course opened in 1980 through April 5, 2009. The first, by Larry Denton, occurred on Nov. 10, 1980. All aces are posted in the clubhouse. No. 17 is by far the most-aced par 3 on the course, followed by No. 13 with 127, No. 3 with 111 and No. 8 with 96.

121 Yardage from the middle of the championship tee to the front of green.

3,912 Square footage of the green. The course average is 4,500 square feet.

50,000 Amount of dirt, in cubic yards, that was removed to create the island green during construction of the course in the early 1980s.

120,000 Number of balls hit in the water during the course of a year, an average of just less than three balls per player based on an average of 44,000 rounds played per year on THE PLAYERS Stadium Course. Former TPC Sawgrass superintendent Fred Klauk says that number is skewed because some players hit as many as a dozen balls into the water.

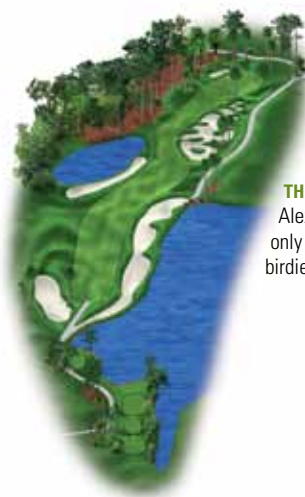

The foundation's goal is to help alleviate their financial burden and improve their quality of life.
