

With This Victory — Feb. 2, 2009

Kenny Perry

FBR Open

Earns his 13th career PGA TOUR victory in his 565th event at the age of 48 years, 3 months and 21 days.

Earned 500 FedExCup points to move into second place on the season-long points list with 598 total points.

FBR OPEN NOTES

At 48 years, 3 months and 21 days, he becomes the oldest winner in FBR Open history. Previous oldest winner was Julius Boros (1967) at the age of 46 years, 11 months, 9 days.

Kenny Perry's opening-round 1-over-par 72 ties the mark for the fourth-highest opening round score by a tournament winner. Harold McSpadden shot a 74 at Phoenix CC in 1944, Phil Mickelson shot a 73 at TPC Scottsdale in 2005, Dudley Wysong shot a 73 at Phoenix CC in 1966 and Cary Middlecoff shot a 72 at Phoenix CC in 1956.

His win comes in his 22nd start at the FBR Open. He now has 6 top-10s and 12 top-25s and 17 cuts made. His previous best finish was a tie for second in 2002.

With his win, he ties Rocco Mediate for second place on the tournament's list for most top-10 finishes since the event moved to TPC Scottsdale in 1987. Phil Mickelson leads the list with nine, Perry and Mediate have six each.

With the winner's check for \$1,080,000, Perry moves to No. 2 on the FBR Open's all-time money list with \$2,119,898. He trails only all-time leader Phil Mickelson, who has earned \$2,452,814.

2009 NOTES

Collects 500 FedExCup points to give him 598 for the season and moves into 2nd place.

Collects check for \$1,080,000 and moves into 1st place with \$1,280,968.

Becomes the oldest winner on TOUR this year at 48 years, 3 months and 21 days. Wins for the tenth time in his 40s; Oldest winner on TOUR since Fred Funk (50 years, 8 months, 12 days) at the 2007 Mayakoba Golf Classic.

Becomes the third player to win this season to win when holding the lead going into the final round, joining Geoff Ogilvy (Mercedes-Benz Championship) and Zach Johnson (Sony Open in Hawaii).

CAREER NOTES

Tenth time in 13 career wins that he has held/shared the lead heading into the final round and gone on to win.

He is now 10 for 17 when holding/sharing the lead going into the final round, including seven of the past eight times.

He wins for the fourth time in his last 15 PGA TOUR starts – 3 wins in final 12 starts of 2008, 1 win in 3 starts in 2009.

Runs his playoff record to 3-2:

Collects paycheck of \$1,080,000 to match the largest of his career.

Moves to No. 1 on the money list for the first time in his career. His previous highest rank was No. 2 following his win at the 2008 John Deere Classic.

Increases his career money to \$27,477,410 to pass Justin Leonard and move into eighth place on the all-time list.

With his win today, Perry ties the legendary Julius Boros for fourth place on the list for most TOUR wins after the age of 40:
