MEDIA INFORMATION

The information in this guide will assist all recognized media personnel with coverage of the 2009 Zurich Classic of New Orleans. A limited number of media credentials are available and will only be issued to recognized working personnel who have been approved by the PGA TOUR. Guests and non-working personnel will not be granted media credentials. Credentials may be claimed in the Media Center according to the schedule below. MEDIA CENTER

The Media Center is located to the right of the clubhouse. Only working media with the proper credentials will be allowed to use the media facility. Hours of operation are as follows:

RADIO

Radio booths are available on a first-come, first-serve basis.

FOOD AND BEVERAGE

Coffee, soft drinks, water and snacks will be available in the Media Center all day. Breakfast and lunch are available beginning Monday, April 20, 2009, in the media dining area, located on the 1st floor of the Media Center.

Directions:

From Downtown New Orleans (Approximately 15 miles), take the Greater New Orleans Bridge over the Mississippi River to the Westbank Expressway US 90. Continue on the Expressway for approximately 13 miles, go past the Alario Center / Segnette Blvd. traffic light and proceed on US 90 West. Continue on US 90 West to the traffic light at Lapalco Blvd., turn left, stay in the right lane and then follow the signs for Valet Parking.

From I-10, exit on Clearview Parkway and proceed to the Huey P. Long Bridge. Cross the bridge and continue on US 90 West to the second traffic light at Lapalco Blvd., turn left, stay in the right lane and then follow the signs for Valet Parking.

From Baton Rouge (Approximately 70 miles), from I-10 Eastbound take exit I-310 South. Continue on I-310 for approximately 10 miles until you reach US 90 East, turn left at the traffic light and proceed on US 90 East for approximately 13 miles. Continue on US 90 East to the traffic light at Lapalco Blvd., turn right, stay in left lane and then follow the signs for Valet Parking.

MEDIA REGULATIONS AND INFORMATION

GENERAL REGULATIONS

The following regulations are to be followed by all members of the media:

1. An armband is necessary to walk inside the gallery ropes. Remain not more than an arm's length from the ropes, so as to blend into the gallery and appear to be a part of the gallery at all times.
2. Players are not to be distracted during play. Do not interview players or ask them to pose for photographs during their rounds.
3. Do not interview players or ask them to pose for photographs during their practice sessions before a round, except by prior arrangement with the player.
4. If an interview is to be conducted in the practice areas, either the range or the putting green, it must be done by prior arrangement with the player, up against the ropes and not in the middle of the areas where it could be distracting to other players.
5. Do not disturb players at their 18th green and/or scoring tent until after they have checked, signed and returned their scorecards. Media are not allowed in the scoring tent.

WORKING PRESS REGULATIONS

To avoid embarrassment to you and distraction to the contestants:

1. Do not walk or stand in playing areas.
2. Follow directions of marshals and other officials.
3. Do not interview during play. The leading player each day – and others requested – will be interviewed following their rounds in the Media Room interview area.

TAPE RECORDER REGULATIONS

1. All tape recording should be done in the proximity of the Press Room and/or Clubhouse.
2. Tape recorders are not permitted in the locker room.
3. Tape recorders are not permitted within the playing area of the golf course unless written permission has been granted by the PGA TOUR.

WEATHER DELAY GUIDELINES

1. During weather delay situations, no one other than players and essential staff will be permitted in the locker room. This means the media are not permitted in the locker room in such situations. However, whenever possible, arrangements will be made for interviews during such situations.
2. Fully accredited members of the news media will be welcome in the locker room at all other times to carry out their assigned duties. (Note: Cameras and tape recorders are not permitted in the locker room.)

PHOTOGRAPHY REGULATIONS

Photo credentials will be issued only to personnel on assignment from recognized and accredited publications or news services. Requests for credentials must be made by the appropriate news agency, not by the photographer.

Photographic likenesses of PGA TOUR, Champions Tour and Nationwide Tour players may be used only for legitimate newspaper and magazine coverage of the events in which they are competing.

Commercial exploitation of these likenesses without written consent of the players and PGA TOUR is prohibited.

A limited number of photo armbands (or photo bibs), which permit the wearer access inside the gallery ropes, may be issued. Photographers and photographic assistants who do not have armbands or bibs must stay outside the gallery ropes. Photographic assistants will not be issued armbands.

Cameras may be used only by accredited media representatives who have been assigned photo credentials, and such use is subject to the following conditions:

1. Photographers with photo armbands must stay within one arm's length of the ropes at all times. Photographers without armbands are not permitted inside the ropes at any time.
2. The use of golf carts is prohibited at all times.
3. Photographers must not position themselves in the line of play. If requested to move by a player, his caddie or an official, the photographer will do so without delay or discussion.
4. No photograph shall be taken until a player has completed his stroke.
5. Players should not be asked to pose during a round.
6. Noise-free equipment must be used at all times.
7. Cameras are not permitted in the scoring tent or in the locker rooms.

The Photographer shall indemnify, defend and hold the Tournament and the PGA TOUR and their respective officers, agents, representatives, successors and the liabilities (including reasonable attorney's fees and expenses) incurred by, arising from, or in connection with (1) the unauthorized use of photographs taken by the Photographer, whether such unauthorized use is by the Photographer, the company designating the Photographer to use the credential on its behalf, or some third party to whom the photographs are distributed; (2) any injuries resulting from acts or omissions by the Photographer or some third party to whom the Photographer directly or indirectly distributed the material; (3) any cameras, wires, cables or other equipment brought to the premises by the Photographer; or (4) the use of any photographs of any matter other than coverage of the Tournament.

Photographer lockers will be available for equipment storage during Media Center hours.

FORE!KIDS FOUNDATION HISTORY

Professional golf has been around New Orleans since 1931 and an annual event since 1958. Over the years, big names in the golfing community have left their mark here, including Byron Nelson, Billy Casper, Jack Nicklaus, Lee Trevino, Tom Watson and Seve Ballesteros. More recently, winners have included Ian Woosnam, Ben Crenshaw, Davis Love III, Louisiana native David Toms and 2004 PGA TOUR Money Leader Vijay Singh. Over the years, the Classic has attracted such golfers as Nick Faldo, Payne Stewart, Greg Norman, Ernie Els, David Duval, Chris DiMarco and Phil Mickelson, to name a few. The great relationship between golf and the city of New Orleans has blossomed through the years for various reasons.

From its early days in the 1930s at the City Park Golf Course, tournament golf in New Orleans took hold and began to expand. In 1963, the Greater New Orleans Invitational (as it was originally called) moved to Lakewood Country Club. By 1975, the Classic had its first corporate sponsor – the First National Bank of Commerce (FNBC).

The Classic's second corporate sponsor was USF&G Insurance, which pushed the tournament to new heights in its 10 years of sponsorship. In those 10 years, the Classic really showcased its big golfing party to the rest of the nation as televised coverage made it a major event on the PGA TOUR.

In 1991, Freeport-McMoRan became the Classic's third corporate sponsor and golf was contested at English Turn Golf and Country Club. Thanks to Freeport-McMoRan's commitment to sponsoring a first-class event and philanthropic efforts associated with the tournament within the New Orleans community, the Classic continued to enjoy growth and success.

In 1999, the Classic welcomed Compaq Computer Corporation as the fourth corporate sponsor. At that time, Compaq Computer Corporation was the second largest computer company in the world and the largest worldwide global supplier of computer systems. Compaq added an internationally recognizable name to the tournament, enhancing the stature of this great event. The quality of the event continued to grow with Hewlett Packard as the Classic's title sponsor after the merge in 2002 between Compaq and Hewlett Packard.

2005 ushered in New Orleans' newest title sponsor, Zurich Financial Services, an insurance-based financial service provider with a global network that focuses its activities in its key markets in North America and Europe. In addition to the new title sponsor, the Classic had a brand new course in the Pete Dye sensation, TPC Louisiana.

Despite the devastation from Hurricane Katrina, the Foundation hosted the 2006 Zurich Classic at English Turn Golf & Country Club, marking New Orleans' first post-Katrina nationally televised professional sporting event.

Now back at TPC Louisiana, with a \$6.3 million purse, an economic impact of more than \$25 million annually and an additional \$16 million in television exposure, the Zurich Classic generates much-needed funds for the city of New Orleans. The Classic's host organization, the Fore!Kids Foundation, also contributes more than \$1 million to area children's service organizations. Through the years, the Foundation has donated more than \$18 million to worthy children's service organizations and has helped more than 200,000 children in the region. In addition, the Foundation was the recipient of a \$1 million grant from the Bush-Clinton Katrina Fund, which has been disbursed to nine local children's agencies. **To learn more about the Foundation, visit forekidsfoundation.com.**

TPC LOUISIANA HISTORY

The Tournament Players Club network was born in a swamp with the development of the TPC Sawgrass in 1980 and has become a symbol of excellence in golf course development. Little wonder then that there were great expectations for another relatively flat site, TPC Louisiana.

Situated on 250 acres across the Mississippi River from New Orleans, TPC Louisiana was designed by a man who knows how to turn a site with limited topography into a beautiful and compelling test of golf. Pete Dye, who created TOUR masterpieces like Sawgrass and Hilton Head Golf Links, was called in for another challenge.

Dye responded by carefully sculpting a brilliant but subtle track that winds through cypress trees and natural bayous on land that was once owned by Carlos Marcello, a legendary member of the New Orleans underworld. Working in conjunction with Steve Elkington and New Orleans native Kelly Gibson, Dye crafted holes that sit low and utilize natural vegetation and light. Chipping and runoff areas are prevalent and there is a conceptual commitment to testing a player's short game, with no green exceeding 5,000 square feet.

After a 2005 tournament in which the winning score was only -11, Hurricane Katrina damaged TPC Louisiana in several ways. The course lost over 4,000 trees and several holes had extensive freshwater flooding. However, the course is back and better than ever, as Mr. Dye took advantage of the course's closure to reshape several bunkers and greens, increasing the course's playability and shot variety.

Now playing closer to 7,400 yards, TPC Louisiana is truly one of the finest layouts on the PGA TOUR.



TPC LOUISIANA HOLE DESCRIPTIONS

HOLE #1 399 YARD PAR 4

The first hole is one of the shortest par 4's on the golf course. Most players will hit a fairway wood or long iron off the tee into the narrow fairway in an attempt to avoid the long fairway bunker on the left. Guarding the green on the right side are 2 pot bunkers.

HOLE #2 548 PAR 5

A mid length par 5 that can be reached by some of the longer hitters. Players will have to avoid a long fairway bunker down the left hand side if reaching this par 5 in two. The green is one of the smallest on the course and is well guarded with bunkers. Most players will lay up on their 2nd shots to allow for a safer approach with a wedge.

HOLE #3 221 PAR 3

The tee shot on this par 3 is visually deceptive, as the front part of a large green is hidden by a grass mound and pot bunker. The green is relatively flat but players should be aware of water behind and to the right of the green.

HOLE #4 482 PAR 4

One of the longer holes on the course, the 4th hole sets up for a right to left tee shot while avoiding a hazard on the right. This approach will leave players with a mid to long iron shot into the green that favors a right to left approach. Trees on the left took a hit during Katrina but still pose a problem. Beware of the deep pot bunkers left of the green and the back right.

HOLE #5 442 PAR 4

This beautiful hole has a large fairway bunker on the left side of the fairway that favors a right to left tee shot. The 2nd shot will be a mid to short iron to a green that is well guarded by pot bunkers in the front and right side. In 2007, Nick Watney won his 1st TOUR event with the help of holing out a pitching wedge for an eagle in the 4th round.

HOLE #6 476 PAR 4

One of the most difficult holes on the PGA TOUR, the 6th hole is defined by a large pond on the left side of the fairway. The tee shot must be played to the right of the hazard to a wide fairway. The 2nd shot is a 90 degree dogleg left that will leave players with a fairway wood to long iron. The green is guarded by a small pot bunker in the front and another bunker to the right.

HOLE #7 561 PAR 5

A fairly long par 5 requires a well placed drive, avoiding the massive fairway bunker on the right and some pot bunkers on the left. A lay up is a prudent play as the fairway widens out to the right. Longer hitters must avoid the pot bunker to the left if they are trying to hit a smallish green in two.

HOLE #8 372 PAR 4

This hole may be reachable downwind for big hitters but errand shots are magnified by well placed pot bunkers in the approach. Smart players will lay up to 120 yards and play a safe wedge shot to one of the smaller greens on the course.

HOLE #9 200 PAR 3

A demanding par 3 will intimidate even the best players with water on the left side of the green. The hole is a mid to long iron shot to a very large green. Shots to the left will find the water while shots to the right will funnel into a collection area. Par is always a great score on this challenging par 3.

HOLE #10 390 PAR 4

A fairway wood is the play off the tee to avoid the long bunker down the right side. A well executed tee shot will allow players to be aggressive with a wedge or short iron into this narrow but deep green. Bunkers guard the left side of the green.

HOLE #11 575 PAR 5

After pounding a driver on this long par 5, decisions must be made. Going for the green in two requires a 2nd shot to be maneuvered around the tall cypress tree in the middle of the fairway that is a mere 80 yards from the green. If laying up is your choice, the best option is to avoid the cypress tree with a shot down the right side of the fairway. Pot bunkers located in the front, left, and back of the green make for a tricky approach no matter if you're playing a 3 wood or a wedge.

HOLE #12 490 PAR 4

This hole is one of toughest on the course that doesn't have a water hazard. The tee shot should be hit with a right to left shot to avoid the large fairway bunker down the left side of the hole. This approach will leave long to mid iron into a green that requires a left to right shot. A deep bunker is on the right while a large chipping area dominates the left side of a big green.

HOLE #13 377 PAR 4

A classic risk/reward hole that is drivable to the long hitters if there is a favorable breeze. The conservative approach is to play a fairway wood to the right of large cypress tree which will set up a wedge to a small green. Birdies are plentiful as this is the flattest green on the course.

HOLE #14 216 YARDS PAR 3

Straightforward par 3 that requires a long iron shot into a green. Different tee complexes can make this hole play as short as 155 yards.

HOLE #15 490 YARD PAR 4

The last difficult par 4 on the course is also the last hole on the course where water does not come into play. The tee shot requires a well struck driver which must avoid a large fairway bunker down the left side and 3 pot bunkers down the right. The green does not have any bunkers but runs away from the player and has a few slopes that make any pitches or chips tricky. Par is a great score here.

HOLE #16 355 YARDS PAR 4

A new tee has been built to provide for multiple setup options. This hole can played as short as 295 yards making eagle a possibility. Players who pull driver out the bag have to avoid going left as the green is nestled against the water hazard. Many players will play safe off the tee with a hybrid or long iron leaving a short wedge into one of the most undulating greens on the course.

HOLE #17 200 YARD PAR 3

Similar to #9, this challenging par 3 has water down the entire left side of the hole. Two pot bunkers guard the right side of the green. Depending on the wind, players will choose a mid iron through a 3 wood to safely reach the green. Par is also a great score on this hole.

HOLE #18 PAR 5

The finishing hole at the TPC Louisiana has undergone several refinements since last year's Zurich Classic. In addition to increasing the size of the tee box, the fairway bunkers have been shifted to the left allowing the width of the fairway to be increased by 10 yards. With an aggressive tee shot, players will be presented with the option of laying up or going for the dramatic shot to reach the green in 2. A pot bunker that was 50 yards short of the green has been removed to allow players a larger lay up area and to allow for the aggressive shot to run up to the front of the green. A true risk/reward gambling par 5, the 18th at TPC should ensure great theater and a great champion for the 2009 Zurich Classic of New Orleans.

2008 PGA TOUR SEASON OVERVIEW

In 2009, the PGA TOUR continues a new era in golf with an exciting season-long points competition called the FedExCup. This competition, spanning 37 weeks, will dramatically change the PGA TOUR, offering fans a new competitive element while giving the sport a more defined "season."

The PGA TOUR season will now be divided into two parts:

FedExCup

- PGA TOUR Regular Season (33 weeks)
- PGA TOUR Playoffs for the FedExCup (4 weeks)

PGA TOUR 2009 Regular Season

The Regular Season will consist of 36 events in 33 weeks from the beginning of January to the middle of August. Players will accumulate FedExCup points, which will determine their seeding for the PGA TOUR Playoffs for the FedExCup.

Romero had previously finished T17 at the World Golf Championships-Accenture Match Play Championship and T30 at the World Golf Championships-CA Championship. His previous best finish on the PGA TOUR came in 2007 when he tied for third at the British Open.

Padraig Harrington, who made his third start at the Zurich Classic of New Orleans in 2008, finished T4 at TPC Louisiana. The Ireland native has done well in the Crescent City. He finished T9 in 2005 the first year that the event was played at the TPC Louisiana. In 2006, when the event moved back to English Turn for one year due to Hurricane Katrina, he finished T11.
