With Hunter Mahan and Matt Kuchar advancing to the finals, it marks the sixth All-American final in the 15-year history of the Accenture Match Play Championship and the first since 2008.

With an American guaranteed to win the Accenture Match Play Championship, it continues a streak of Americans winning the first eight events on the PGA TOUR schedule. In 2012, Americans won the first nine events of the 2012 PGA TOUR season; Rory McIlroy broke that streak at The Honda Classic.

Kuchar was ranked No. 23 and Mahan was ranked No. 25 in the Official World Golf Ranking entering the Accenture Match Play Championship. Only four Accenture Match Play Championships have been won by players ranked lower than 23rd entering the week.

Both Kuchar and Mahan have will have faced five different countries in their six matches this week:

Kuchar: Japan, Spain, Belgium, US (twice), Australia

Mahan: Italy, South Africa, Germany, USA (twice), England

Only Ian Poulter (who won in 2010) and Tiger Woods (who finished second) faced six different countries in their six matches.

Semifinal match highlights

Match No. 61 – Matt Kuchar (21) defeated Jason Day (No. 41), 4 and 3

Matt Kuchar advances to the Championship Match for the first time in his career. The last two years, he's been knocked out of the Accenture Match Play Championship by the eventual champion (losing to Luke Donald, 6 and 5, in the 2011 semifinals; and losing to Hunter Mahan, 6 and 5, in the 2012 quarterfinals). Obviously, the only way he can guarantee that won't be the case this year is to win the Accenture Match Play Championship trophy. Kuchar has yet to play the 18th hole this week. Only Luke Donald (2011) has won the Accenture Match Play Championship without playing the final hole in any of his six matches.

In his semifinal match against Jason Day, Kuchar found himself 1 down after the second hole – the first time he had been down in a match since the fourth hole of round one versus Hiroyuki Fujita. But just like in round one, the deficit didn't last long. Day made bogey on No. 4 to bring the match back to all square, and then a birdie on No. 6 by Kuchar gave him a 1 up lead that he would not relinquish.

Day did not post a birdie in the semifinals, making bogey on holes No. 4, 7, 9, 12 and a double-bogey on 13.

Kuchar's path to the Championship Match:

- R1: Defeated Hiroyuki Fujita (No. 44), 3 and 2
- R2: Defeated Sergio Garcia (No. 12), 2 and 1
- R3: Defeated Nicolas Colsaerts (No. 37), 4 and 3
- QF: Defeated Robert Garrigus (No. 36), 3 and 2
- SF: Defeated Jason Day (No. 41), 4 and 3

Kuchar's record improves to 14-3. Since losing in round two of the 2010 event, his first appearance, Kuchar has finished 3rd (2011) and T9 (2012).

Kuchar is looking to join Hunter Mahan (2012), Luke Donald (2011), Ian Poulter (2010), Henrik Stenson (2007) Kevin Sutherland (2002), Steve Stricker (2001) and Darren Clarke (2000) as players to win the Accenture Match Play Championship in their first appearance in the finals (does not include 1999).

Kuchar has four PGA TOUR wins, with only one coming in the first four months of the season (The Honda Classic – March 2002, his first win). His other TOUR wins: Turning Stone Resort Championship (October 2009); The Barclays (August 2010); and THE PLAYERS Championship (May 2012).

But Kuchar's performance this week, and this early in the season, should be no surprise based on his first three events of 2013. He was the only player to finish in the top 10 at both events in Hawaii (T9-Hyundai Tournament of Champions; T5-Sony Open in Hawaii), and he finished T16 at the Humana Challenge before taking three weeks off to rest up for the Northern Trust Open (T38).

Kuchar is looking to break a recent streak by PLAYERS champions; Phil Mickelson (2007) is the last winner of the event to record another victory within a year of THE PLAYERS (Mickelson won later that season at the Deutsche Bank Championship). Since then, Sergio Garcia (2008) didn't win again until the 2012 Wyndham Championship; and Henrik Stenson (2009), Tim Clark (2010) and K.J. Choi (2011) have yet to capture another PGA TOUR title.

Kuchar (currently No. 23 in the OWGR) will move into the top 10 of the Official World Golf Ranking if he wins today; he's guaranteed to be in the top 15 by advancing to the Championship Match. His highest career ranking is No. 5, most recently following the 2012 Crowne Plaza Invitational.

Kuchar is guaranteed his best finish in a World Golf Championships event. His previous best, of 11 career starts, is third place here in 2011 and a T3 at the 2010 Cadillac Championship.

Day's path to the Consolation Match:

R1: Defeated Zach Johnson (No. 24), 6 and 5 R2: Defeated Russell Henley (No. 56), 19 holes R3: Defeated Bubba Watson (No. 8), 4 and 3 QF: Defeated Graeme McDowell (No. 17), 1 up SF: Lost to Matt Kuchar (No. 21), 4 and 3

Day's overall record is now 7-3. He was the only Australian to advance past the second round (four made the field). Day is guaranteed his best World Golf Championships finish in eight career starts, either a third or a fourthplace finish today. His previous best finish is a T4 at the 2011 Bridgestone Invitational. Day will leave this week with three top-10 finishes in four PGA TOUR starts this season (T9-Farmers Insurance Open; 6-Northern Trust Open).

Match No. 62 - Hunter Mahan (No. 23) defeated Ian Poulter (11), 4 and 3

Hunter Mahan took a 1-up lead with a birdie on No. 2 in his semifinal match against Ian Poulter, then gave that lead back with a bogey on No. 4. On the next hole, it was Poulter who made bogey to give Mahan his 1-up lead again, a lead that would only increase the remainder of the match,

Mahan made birdie on No. 8, 12, 13 and 15 with one bogey on No. 11 – but Poulter also bogeyed the hole, one of the Englishman's three bogeys versus two birdies in the match.

Hunter Mahan has played 76 holes en route to the Championship Match (14 in round one; 15 in round two; 14 in round three; 18 in the quarterfinals; 15 in the semifinals). Only Luke Donald in 2011 played fewer holes prior to the Championship Match (73).

Mahan has yet to fall behind in any of his matches this week. He last trailed in a match at the Accenture Match Play Championship during round one of the 2012 event, when he was 1 down to Zach Johnson through six holes. That is a streak of 166 holes (90 in 2012 and 76 thus far this week).

Mahan's path to the Championship Match:

- R1: Defeated Matteo Manassero (No. 42), 5 and 4
- R2: Defeated Richard Sterne (No. 55), 4 and 3
- R3: Defeated Martin Kaymer (No. 26), 5 and 4
- QF: Defeated Webb Simpson (No. 15), 1 up
- SF: Defeated Ian Poulter (No. 11), 4 and 3

Mahan becomes the third defending champion to advance to the finals.

2006 champion Geoff Ogilvy in 2007 (Ogilvy finished second that year) 2003 champion Tiger Woods in 2004 (Woods successfully defended his title)

Mahan's record improves to 15-4. He has won 13 of his last 14 matches.

Mahan (currently No. 25 in OWGR) will move into the top 15 of the Official World Golf Ranking if he wins today; he's guaranteed to move into the top 20 by advancing to the finals. His highest career ranking is No. 4, most recently after the 2012 Shell Houston Open.

With a win, Mahan would join Tiger Woods (16) and Geoff Ogilvy (3) as the only players with more than two World Golf Championships titles. Woods and Ogilvy are also the only other players with more than one Accenture Match Play Championship win (Woods: 2003-04, 2008; Ogilvy: 2006, 2009).

Poulter's path to the Consolation Match:

- R1: Defeated Stephen Gallacher (No. 54), 2 and 1
- R2: Defeated Bo Van Pelt (No. 22), 3 and 1
- R3: Defeated Tim Clark (No. 59), 5 and 3
- QF: Defeated Steve Stricker (No. 14), 3 and 2
- SF: Lost to Hunter Mahan (No. 23), 4 and 3

Ian Poulter (currently No.13 in OWGR) will move into the top 10 of the Official World Golf Ranking, regardless of his finish today. His highest career ranking is No. 5, most recently following the 2010 Masters.

Poulter's record improves to 22-10. Only Tiger Woods (33) and David Toms (24) have won more matches at the Accenture Match Play Championship; Stewart Cink also has 22. By the end of the day, Poulter will have competed in 33 matches in his career. Only Tiger Woods (43), David Toms (35) and Stewart Cink (34) have more.

Poulter is the only English player to advance past the second round, of the six who began the event. This week's finish will mark his fifth top five in World Golf Championships events; he has two wins, a T2 at the 2006 Cadillac Championship and a fourth-place finish at the 2005 Accenture Match Play Championship.
