INTERESTING NOTES ABOUT THE COURSE

Founded in 1890 as the Hillside Tennis Club, Plainfield has enjoyed a revered reputation among families and golf lovers alike. The main course was designed by Donald Ross in 1916. The club has hosted two U.S. National Championships, as well as a number of state and regional championships.

RESTORATION PROGRAM

Over the past 15 years, Plainfield Country Club has undergone an extensive restoration program under the direction of architect Gil Hanse, involving the removal of over 2,000 trees and the rediscovery of a number of lost bunkers that were covered over the years. The restoration included expansion of 16 greens and the lengthening of 12 tees to reflect modern equipment and skill, as well as the restoration of bunker complexes on No. 4 and No. 15.
