Jordan Spieth

Jordan Spieth, who entered the final round of the Hyundai Tournament of Champions with a five-stroke advantage over Brooks Koepka, carded a final-round 6-under 67 for an eight-stroke victory over defending champion Patrick Reed. The eight-stroke win is the largest on TOUR since Jimmy Walker won by nine at the 2015 Sony Open in Hawaii.

Spieth collects his seventh PGA TOUR victory in his 85th start at the age of 22 years, 5 months and 14 days. By comparison, the youngest winner of the Hyundai Tournament of Champions is Tiger Woods, winning in 1997 at the age of 21 years and 13 days.

Most wins on TOUR by a player 22 and younger: Horton Smith (14), Tiger Woods (7), Jordan Spieth (7).

Spieth's Career PGA TOUR Victories (7):

Spieth collects 500 points and moves from No. 87 to No. 7 in the FedExCup standings. In late September, Spieth won the TOUR Championship by Coca-Cola (his fifth victory of the 2014-15 season) to become the youngest FedExCup champion at the age of 22 years and 2 months.

Spieth's winning total of 30-under 262 falls one shy of Ernie Els' record 261 in 2003.

Spieth's eight-stroke win this week falls one shy of the Hyundai Tournament of Champions record nine-stroke win by David Duval in 1999.

Largest winning margins during the 2015-16 Season:

6 strokes – Kevin Kisner (The RSM Classic)

Spieth becomes the first top-ranked player in the Official World Golf Ranking to win in Kapalua since Tiger Woods in 2000.

Spieth now has six consecutive rounds in a row in the 60s at the par-73 Hyundai Tournament of Champions dating back to his first appearance in 2014 when he finished solo second behind winner Zach Johnson, where he recorded rounds of 66-70-69-69.

Third-Round Leader Notes

The third-round leader has gone on to win the Hyundai Tournament of Champions 24 of 32 times, with Spieth's win the first since Steve Stricker in 2012.

The third-round leader has won four of the eight PGA TOUR events so far in the 2015-16 Season (Justin Thomas/CIMB Classic; Russell Knox/WGC-HSBC Champions, Kevin Kisner/The RSM Classic, Jordan Spieth/Hyundai Tournament of Champions).

Patrick Reed

Patrick Reed finished solo second in his attempt to become the first player to successfully defend his Hyundai Tournament of Champions title since Geoff Ogilvy in 2009-10. Since the event moved to Kapalua in 1999, Stuart Appleby is the only other player to win in back-to-back starts, doing so in 2004, 2005 and 2006.

The runner-up finish is the second (2015 Valspar Championship) of the four-time winner Reed's career.

Reed's only bogey this week came on the par-5 15th hole Sunday (his 69th hole of the week). The last player to record no bogeys in 72 holes and not win was Charles Howell at the 2010 Greenbrier Classic (T9). The last player to win without a bogey was Lee Trevino at the 1974 Zurich Classic of New Orleans.

Reed now owns eight consecutive rounds in the 60s at the Hyundai Tournament of Champions, posting scores of 67-69-68-67 en route to winning in a playoff over Jimmy Walker a year ago.

Additional Player Notes

FedExCup leader Kevin Kisner finished ninth this week to maintain his lead in the FedExCup standings.

Rickie Fowler battled a cold Sunday but still managed a 6-under 67 to finish fifth in his second Kapalua start (T6-2013).

Jason Day (T10) carded the best round Sunday with an 8-under 65, moving to T10. Last year, Day finished with a course-record-tying 11-under 62 to finish T3.
