Five Things to Know

- Bryson DeChambeau birdied the second playoff hole to defeat Byeong Hun An and Kyle Stanley in the first three-way playoff in the history of the Memorial Tournament presented by Nationwide.
- DeChambeau's second career PGA TOUR title moves him up to No. 4 in the FedExCup standings.
- Justin Thomas remains No. 1 in the FedExCup points standings and No. 1 in the Official World Golf Ranking with a T8 finish.
- Joaquin Niemann secured PGA TOUR Special Temporary Membership with a T6 finish that earned him 95 non-member FedExCup points. Niemann needed to earn the equivalent of No. 150 on last season's FedExCup standings, which was 269 points (Rick Lamb). With the 95 points, Niemann has 275 non-member FedExCup points.
- Five-time Memorial winner Tiger Woods shot an even-par 72 Sunday to finish T23, despite leading the field in Strokes Gained: Tee-to-Green and Strokes Gained: Approach-the-Green.

Bryson DeChambeau (1st)

Age: 24 (September 16, 1993) **Joined TOUR:** 2016-17

- 1/1 Wins when holding 54-hole lead/co-lead
 - Holed a 11'10" birdie putt on the second playoff hole to defeat Byeong Hun An and Kyle Stanley for his second career victory. Scrambled from the right rough on the first playoff hole, chipping it to 3'6" to save par and advance to the second playoff hole.
 - As the 54-hole leader, made birdies on three of his first 12 holes to take the outright lead, but dropped into a three-way playoff with bogeys on two of his last five holes including a three-putt on the 72nd hole.
 - At 24 years, 8 months and 18 days, DeChambeau is the fourth youngest winner in the Memorial Tournament history behind Hideki Matsuyama's 2014 win (22 years, 3 months and 7 days) and Tiger Woods' 1999 and 2000 victories.
 - Led the field in scrambling (17/21) for the week.
 - Ranked ninth in Strokes Gained: Putting (+4.916).
 - Through 72 holes, was 11-under par on the front nine and 4-under on the back nine.

• Hit 37 of 58 fairways, 52 of 72 greens and needed 111 putts for the week.

Additional Player Notes

Kyle Stanley (T2)

- Opened with birdies on two of his first five holes before a bogey at No. 9 and a double bogey at No. 12 dropped him
 out of the lead. Made four consecutive birdies on Nos. 14-17 to tie the lead entering the last, before a bogey to fall into
 a three-way playoff.
- Now 1-2 in his career in playoffs.
- Moves to No. 30 in the FedExCup standings with his fourth top-10 of the season a season-best T2 finish.
- Now posted seven consecutive under-par rounds at Muirfield Village.
- Led the field in birdies with 26.
- Has claimed top-10 finishes in three of six career starts at Muirfield Village 3/2013, T6/2017, T2/2018.

Byeong Hun An (T2)

- Entering the final round three shots off of the lead, An bogeyed two of his first four holes but played the last 14 holes bogey free with five birdies for a 3-under 69 to play his way into a three-way playoff with DeChambeau and Kyle Stanley.
- After hitting it over the green on the second playoff hole into the primary rough, pitched his third shot to 2'3" for par but DeChambeau holed his birdie to end the playoff.
- The T2 ties his best career finish on the PGA TOUR. An also lost in a three-way playoff at the 2016 Zurich Classic of New Orleans and is 0-2 on the PGA TOUR in playoffs.
- Moves up to No. 46 in the FedExCup standings with his third top-10 of the season.
- Ranked first in greens in regulation (83.33%), putts per green in regulation (107 on 60) and eighth in Strokes Gained: Off the Tee (+4.008) and Strokes Gained: Tee to Green (+11.345).
- Remains in search of his first PGA TOUR victory, but has posted wins on the European Tour (2015 BMW Championship), Challenge Tour (2014 Rolex Trophy) and Korean Tour (Shinhan Donghae Open).
- As an amateur, he became the youngest winner in U.S. Amateur history with his win in 2009 at age 17.

Patrick Cantlay (4th)

- Opened with birdies on four of his first eight holes to take the lead but played his last 10 holes in 3-over-par to finish one shot short of the playoff.
- Recorded his fifth top-10 of the season and third in his last five starts.
- Moves up to No. 13 in the FedExCup standings.
- Ace in round three marked his second career hole-in-one (2018 AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am/R1).
- Ranked 2nd in Strokes Gained: Tee-to-Green (+12.148) and led the field in eagles with three.
- Finished T35 in 2017 in his only other start at the Memorial Tournament.

Joaquin Niemann (T6)

- Thanks to a T6 finish, currently owns 275 non-member FedExCup points, earning Special Temporary Membership of PGA TOUR.
- Entering the final round one shot off of the lead, the 19-year-old made birdie at the second to climb into a share of the lead but made two double bogeys his only ones of the week at the par-4 sixth and par-5 11th on his way to a 1-over-par 73.
- Was third in most birdies with 23 and led the field in par-3 scoring average (2.63).
- Posted his third top-10 of the season and second in a row after finishing T8 at the Fort Worth Invitational last week.
- Became the youngest player in tournament history to finish in the top 10, surpassing Ryo Ishikawa, who was 20 years, 8 months and 17 days when he did it in 2012.
- Chilean was No. 1 in the World Amateur Golf Ranking before making his professional debut at the 2018 Valero Texas Open, where he finished sixth.
- Prior to winning the Latin America Amateur, Niemann finished T108 at Web.com Tour Qualifying Tournament in early December, failing to gain fully exempt status on the Web.com Tour.

Tiger Woods (T23)

- After birdies at two of his first five holes, Woods played the last 13 holes in 2-over-par for an even-par 72. The T23 finish moves him up four spots to No. 50 in the FedExCup standings.
- After climbing into a share of the lead during the third round at 11-under-par, played his last 25 holes of the tournament in 2-over-par.
- The 79-time PGA TOUR winner played the front nine at Muirfield Village in 13-under-par and the back nine in 4over-par.
- In nine starts this season on the PGA TOUR, Woods has six top-25s, including two top-10s.

- Ranked 1st in Strokes Gained: Tee-To-Green (+14.157), Strokes Gained: Approach-the-Green (+11.164), and proximity (23'8"). Was third in Strokes Gained: Around-the-Green (+4.977) but was 72nd in Strokes Gained: Putting (-7.695).
- Played the par-5s in 10-under-par for the week, fourth best in the field.

Justin Rose (T6)

- Finished in the top-10 in six of 11 starts this season.
- In 12 career starts at the Memorial Tournament, now has one victory (2010), two runner-ups and five additional top-10s.
- Remains one of five multiple winners this season on the PGA TOUR, having won the World Golf Championships-HSBC Champions and Fort Worth Invitational.
- Ranked second in Strokes Gained: Around-the-Green (+5.267).

Peter Uihlein (5th)

- Uihlein posted birdies on Nos. 5, 7, 9, 10, 11, and 17 and zero bogeys on his way to a 6-under 66 to climb into fifth.
- Has four top-10s in 18 starts this season.
- The former Oklahoma State Cowboy won last September in Columbus, winning the Nationwide Children's Hospital Championship at the Scarlet Course at Ohio State University Golf Club, the first of four Web.com Tour Finals events. That win helped Uihlein earn his PGA TOUR card for the 2017-18 Season.

Rory McIlroy (T8)

- After making the cut on the number at even-par, recorded weekend rounds of 64-69 to move into a T8 for his third top-10 of the season.
- Secured his fourth top-10 (T8/2018, T4/2016, 5/2011, T10/2010) in his seventh career start at the Memorial Tournament.
- Led the field in Strokes Gained: Around-the-Green (+5.630).
- Third-round 64 was the lowest round of the tournament.

Justin Thomas (T8)

- Thanks to a T8 finish, Thomas will remain No. 1 in the FedExCup standings and the Official World Golf Ranking.
- Finished his final round eagle-birdie-par-birdie for a 4-under 68.
- Has six top-10s in 13 starts this season and back-to-back top-10s at the Memorial Tournament after finishing T4 in 2017.

Louis Oosthuizen (T13)

• Posted the best final round of the day with a 7-under 65 that included eight birdies and a bogey.

Phil Mickelson (T13)

• In his 18th start, the 43-time PGA TOUR winner has failed to win the Memorial Tournament. It is one of just eight events on the PGA TOUR where he has 10 or more starts in his career but hasn't found the winner's circle.

Ryan Armour (T23)

• Former Ohio State Buckeye Ryan Armour finished T23 at the Memorial Tournament with rounds of 68-70-72-69—279 (-9).

Officials of the Memorial Tournament presented by Nationwide announced today that the Captains Club has selected LPGA legend and broadcasting pioneer Judy Rankin as the Honoree for the 44th Memorial Tournament, scheduled for May 27-June 2, 2019.

Jack Nicklaus Award presented by Barbasol Recipients Announced

 Norman Xiong of Oregon, Florida Southern's John VanDerLaan, Josh Gibson of Hope, Dalton State's SM Lee, and Midland College's Callum Bruce have been named the recipient of the Jack Nicklaus National Player of the Year Award presented by Barbasol. The Nicklaus Award recognizes the top players at the Division I, Division II, III, NAIA, and NJCAA levels. The recipients were recognized in a press conference Sunday morning.

Barbasol Shootout

• John VanDerLaan of Florida Southern won the 2018 Barbasol Shootout Saturday, which pitted the five recipients of the Jack Nicklaus National Player of the Year Award against each other, at Scioto Country Club in Columbus. VanDerLaan shot a 3-under 67 to earn an exemption into the Barbasol Championship in July.
