Five Things To Know

- Justin Thomas becomes the fifth and youngest player to win a FedExCup, major championship and World Golf Championships
- World No. 1 Dustin Johnson ties tournament record with lowest front-nine score of 29
- Woods makes one par on rocky inward nine to shoot 73 for second-straight day
- Denmark's Thorbjorn Olesen ties low round of the day with 64 to post career-best finish on the PGA TOUR
- 2017 and 2018 U.S. Open champion Brooks Koepka closes with 3-under 67 to finish fifth at 9-under 271

 Converted a 3-stroke 54-hole lead into a 4 stroke win after a final-round 69. Win comes in his 112th career start on the PGA TOUR at the age of 25 years, 3 months, 7 days

- Reigning FedExCup champion rises to the No. 2 position in the Official World Golf Ranking
- Is now 6/8 when attempting to convert a 54-hole lead/co-lead into victory on the PGA TOUR
- Becomes the first player to convert the 54-hole lead/co-lead at the WGC-Bridgestone Invitational since 2013 (Tiger Woods) and ninth since 1999
- Joins Dustin Johnson and Bubba Watson as three-time winners this season on the PGA TOUR
- Becomes the fourth-youngest winner of the WGC-Bridgestone Invitational (Tiger Woods/1999, 2000 and Rory McIlroy/2014)
- Becomes the fifth and youngest player to win a FedExCup title, a major championship and a WGC title
- Has now finished inside the top five in the three World Golf Championships he has competed in this season (P2/Mexico Championship, 4th/Dell Technologies Match Play)
- Had not finished inside the top five in a stroke play event on TOUR since losing in a playoff at the WGC-Mexico Championship in March
- Becomes the 24th 54-hole leaders/co-leaders to win on PGA TOUR in 2017-18 (most recent: Dustin Johnson/RBC Canadian Open)
- In two previous starts at the WGC-Bridgestone Invitational, finished T28 in 2017 and T33 in 2016
- Was coming off a missed cut in his most recent start at The Open Championship
- Will defend his PGA Championship title next week at Bellerive Country Club in St. Louis
- Last player to successfully defend a PGA Championship title was Tiger Woods in 2007
- Since 1934, only 11 players on the PGA TOUR have won the week before winning a major. The last to do so was Rory McIlroy in 2014 (WGC-Bridgestone Invitational-PGA Championship)

Thomas' stats for the week:

R1 – 7 of 14 fairways, 15 of 18 greens in regulation, 2 of 3 scrambling, 29 putts

R2 – 9 of 14 fairways, 13 of 18 greens in regulation, 4 of 5 scrambling, 24 putts

R3 – 9 of 14 fairways, 13 of 18 greens in regulation, 2 of 5 scrambling, 28 putts

R4 – 8 of 14 fairways, 13 of 18 greens in regulation, 4 of 5 scrambling, 29 putts

Kyle Stanley (-11/2nd)

- Began the final round five strokes back at 9-under 201.
- Record for largest final-round comeback in the event is four strokes (Keegan Bradley/2012)
- En route to his first career PGA TOUR title, came from eight shots back after 54 holes to win the 2012 Waste Management Phoenix Open
- Moves from No. 40 to 18 in the FedExCup standings with 1,198 points
- Was making his third start at the WGC-Bridgestone Invitational (T41/2017, T16/2012)
- Was making his sixth start in a World Golf Championships event
- Was in search of his third career PGA TOUR win (2012 Waste Management Phoenix Open, 2017 Quicken Loans National)
- Has now claimed five top-10 finishes on the PGA TOUR this season, including a playoff loss to Bryson DeChambeau at the Memorial Tournament presented by Nationwide

Dustin Johnson (-10/T3)

- 2016 WGC-Bridgestone Invitational champion birdied his first four holes en route to a 6-under 29 on the Firestone Country Club's outgoing nine, tying the tournament record for the front nine (Retief Goosen/R3/2001, Adam Scott/R1/2006, Vaughn Taylor/R2/2008)
- Was making his ninth start in the event, with his 2016 victory his only top-10 finish at Firestone Country Club
- Was the only player in the field to remain bogey-free in round four, until he took bogey on his 72nd hole
- With his T3, maintains control of the top spot in the FedExCup standings over Justin Thomas by 147 points
- Will be making his ninth start in this week's PGA Championship

Thorbjorn Olesen (-10/T3)

- Denmark native birdied three of his last five holes to shoot 6-under 64 and tie the low round of the day with Dustin Johnson
- Was making his third start in the WGC-Bridgestone Invitational; T10/2017, T48/2013

- Was making just his fourth start on the PGA TOUR this season; T31/WGC-HSBC Champions, MC/U.S. Open, T12/The Open Championship
- Was making his 44th career start on the PGA TOUR. Most recent top-10 TOUR finish before this week was a T10 at the 2017 WGC-Bridgestone Invitational
- Won the Italian Open on the European Tour in June

Tiger Woods (E/T31)

- Eight-time winner of the WGC-Bridgestone Invitational got off to a strong start with birdies on his first two holes. He would make two quick bogeys at Nos. 4 and 6 (par-4s), a birdie at the par-4 ninth and make the turn in 1-under par.
- On Nos. 10-18, went bogey, birdie, bogey, bogey, double-bogey, birdie, double-bogey, par, birdie (+4)
- Posted 3-over 73 for second-straight day
- T31 finish marks just the third occasion on which he has finished outside the top-8 in the WGC-Bridgestone Invitational (16 starts). He finished T78 in 2010 and T37 in 2011
- 73 marks just his second over-par score in a final round this season (13 events). He closed with 3-over 74 at the Wells Fargo Championship (T55)
- Outside the major championships, had not made two-or-more double bogeys in a round before today since the final round of the 2015 Memorial Tournament
- 5/14 fairways in regulation (26/56 week), 10/18 greens (45/72 week), 1/8 scrambling (13/27 week)
- Made 106' 10" of total putts in round four, nearly 30' more than his next best round (79' 3"/R1)
- Will be making his 19th start in this week's PGA Championship and first since 2015 (MC). He won the event in 1999, 200, 2006 and 2007
