Field Overview (as of 11/6/18)

The season-long race for the Charles Schwab Cup concludes this week with the 29th-annual Charles Schwab Cup Championship at Phoenix Country Club. After two years as a 54-hole event, the season finale will feature 72 holes, a format that was used from 1994-2015. The top-six players in the standings still have a mathematical chance to win the Charles Schwab Cup. Bernhard Langer is in position to win his fifth Charles Schwab Cup, as he leads second-ranked Scott Parel by 253,048 points. Langer and Parel can clinch the Cup with a tournament win, while Miguel Angel Jimenez, Jerry Kelly, Scott McCarron and David Toms need a tournament win and help from the players ahead of them. In all, the 35-player field includes 15 of this year's winners and five former champions of the Charles Schwab Cup (Langer, Kevin Sutherland, Kenny Perry, Tom Lehman and Jay Haas).

2017 Recap: Sutherland Wins Season Finale to Clinch the Charles Schwab Cup

Kevin Sutherland won for the first time on PGA TOUR Champions, finishing at 15-under to win the 2017 Charles Schwab Cup Championship by one over Vijay Singh and Lee Janzen. With the win, Sutherland also won the Charles Schwab Cup, breaking the three-year winning streak by Bernhard Langer, who finished the tournament T12 and was second in the final standings. With the win, Sutherland became just the third player to win the Charles Schwab Cup Championship and the Charles Schwab Cup in the same season, joining Tom Watson (2005) and Tom Lehman (2012).





Six Players Still Alive for the Charles Schwab Cup

If **Bernhard Langer** or **Scott Parel** win the Charles Schwab Cup Championship, he would win the Charles Schwab Cup. In all, six players are mathematically capable of winning the Charles Schwab Cup.

1. Bernhard Langer (2,417,904 points)

Since the Playoffs started in 2016, Langer has led after seven of the eight Playoffs events; the only exception was after last year's Charles Schwab Cup Championship when he finished second behind champion Kevin Sutherland. This year, he has two wins and six runner-up finishes, the most he's had in a single season. The Charles Schwab Cup Championship is one of just eight tournaments on this year's 27-event schedule that Langer has not won. He has finished runner-up three times in his previous 10 starts.

Charles Schwab Cup finishes: 1st (2010, 2014, 2015, 2016), 2nd (2012, 2013, 2017), 3rd (2008), 4th (2009), 24th (2011)

Charles Schwab Cup winning scenarios:

- Win
- T2 (2-way) or better; and Parel does not win
- T3 (2-way) or better; and Parel or Jimenez do not win
- 4th (solo) or better; and Parel, Jimenez and Kelly do not win
- T5 (3-way) or better; and Parel, Jimenez, Kelly and McCarron do not win
- 6th (solo) or better; and Parel, Jimenez, Kelly, McCarron and Toms do not win
- Regardless of Langer's finish, he would win if:
 - o Parel finishes worse than T5 (2-way) AND
 - o Jimenez finishes worse than T2 (2-way) AND
 - o Kelly, McCarron and Toms do not win

2. Scott Parel (2,164,856 points / trails Langer by 253,048)

In Parel's last eight starts, he has two wins (Boeing Classic, Invesco QQQ Championship) and two runner-up finishes, and he has won \$1,099,245. That total exceeds his career winnings on the Web.com Tour (\$705,350 in 222 starts) and PGA TOUR (\$11,660 in 5 starts) combined. If he wins the Charles Schwab Cup, he would be the record-breaking eighth player to lead the standings this season. He would also become the fourth Charles Schwab Cup champion to lead just one week, joining Tom Watson (2005), Bernhard Langer (2015) and Kevin Sutherland (2017).

Charles Schwab Cup finishes: 21st (2017), 46th (2016) Charles Schwab Cup winning scenarios:

- Win
- Solo 2nd; and Jimenez, Kelly and McCarron do not win; Langer finishes T6 (2-way) or worse
- Solo 3rd; and Jimenez, Kelly, McCarron, Toms do not win; Langer finishes T8 (3-way) or worse
- Solo 4th; and Jimenez, Kelly, McCarron, Toms do not win; Langer finishes T17 (2-way) or worse

3. Miguel Angel Jimenez (1,992,668 points / trails Langer by 425,236)

Jimenez's year has been highlighted by his play in the majors. He won the Regions Tradition and The Senior Open Championship, and he was the only player to post top-10 finishes in all five majors. He has wins in each of his five seasons on PGA TOUR Champions, and his \$1,915,968 in winnings this year is his most since turning 50.

Charles Schwab Cup finishes: 6th (2017), 6th (2016), 30th (2015), 34th (2014) Charles Schwab Cup winning scenarios:

- Win AND Langer must finish worse than T2 (2-way)
- Jimenez could finish as low as T2 (2-way) and still have a mathematical chance to win





4. Jerry Kelly (1,900,638 points / trails Langer by 517,266)

After being named 2017 Rookie of the Year, Kelly opened his sophomore campaign with a win at the Mitsubishi Electric Championship at Hualalai. He has since collected three runner-up finishes and 11 total top-10s, and he topped the standings a Tour-best nine weeks this season.

Charles Schwab Cup finishes: 7th (2017) Charles Schwab Cup winning scenario:

• Win AND Langer must finish worse than T3 (2-way)

5. Scott McCarron (1,871,618 points / trails Langer by 546,286)

McCarron has two wins this season, bringing his career total to eight. In June, he posted a final-round 64 to complete a two-shot comeback at the American Family Insurance Championship, and in September he made a final-round hole-in-one en route to his second straight win at the Shaw Charity Classic.

Charles Schwab Cup finishes: 3rd (2017), 4th (2016), 45th (2015) Charles Schwab Cup winning scenario:

• Win AND Langer must finish worse than solo 4th

6. David Toms (1,724,872 points / trails Langer by 693,032)

Toms captured his first title on PGA TOUR Champions when he won the U.S. Senior Open. He is coming off a T6 finish at the Invesco QQQ Championship, his 11th top-10 of the season, and he finished T4 last year in his debut at the Charles Schwab Cup Championship.

Charles Schwab Cup finishes: 11th (2017) Charles Schwab Cup winning scenario:

• Win AND Langer must finish worse than T7 (2-way); Parel must finish worse than T2 (2-way)

Charles Schwab Cup Bonuses on the Line

At the end of the season, the top-five players in the Charles Schwab Cup standings will earn a share of the \$2.1 million purse of bonus annuities. Entering the season finale, the top-18 players are mathematically capable of finishing in the top-five of the standings. Bonus structure:

1st: \$1,000,000
2nd: \$500,000
3rd: \$300,000
4th: \$200,000
5th: \$100,000

At the Top of Their Games

Five players posted top-10s in each of the first two Charles Schwab Cup Playoffs events. **Jay Haas** took the greatest advantage of double points in Richmond and Thousand Oaks, as he improved 21 spots in the first two Playoffs events, while **Bernhard Langer's** record now includes six top-10s in seven starts in the Playoffs. **Woody Austin** and **Scott Parel** posted top-10s alongside their victories, while **Vijay Singh** now has seven top-10s this year.

Men on the Move

Four players advanced to the season finale after starting the Playoffs outside the top-36. **Stephen Ames** played in Sunday's final pairing both weeks, and he improved 13 spots in the standings after finishing T15 at the Dominion Energy Charity Classic and T3 at the Invesco QQQ Championship. The other three players that played their way into the Charles Schwab Cup Championship were **Jay Haas**, **Kent Jones** and **Billy Mayfair**. The four players that dropped out of the top-36 during the Playoffs were Mark Calcavecchia (32nd to 39th), Bob Estes (34th to 37th), Doug Garwood (35th to 43rd) and Jerry Smith (36th to 38th).

From Q-School to the Charles Schwab Cup Championship

The last 12 months have come full circle for three players, as **Tim Petrovic**, **Ken Tanigawa** and **Kent Jones** will end the season at Phoenix Country Club less than a year after earning their cards at PGA TOUR Champions Q-School in Scottsdale.

- At No. 12 in the standings, Petrovic is the highest-ranked player without a victory this season. He has five top-10s and four second-place finishes this season, including a runner-up at the KitchenAid Senior PGA Championship and a T2 at the U.S. Senior Open.
- After a short stint on the Web.com Tour, Tanigawa regained his amateur status in 2003 and over the next 15 years he became an accomplished amateur golfer, twice winning the Arizona Amateur (2015, 2017). He turned pro after finishing T4 at Q-School last year, and in September he won the PURE Insurance Championship and became the first Q-School rookie to win since Jerry Smith in 2015. He is one of five first-time winners on Tour this season, and he is No. 25 in the standings entering the Charles Schwab Cup Championship.
- Jones posted four top-10s this season, including a career-best T3 at the Dominion Energy Charity Classic. He is one of four players to move into the top-36 during the Playoffs, as he's No. 33 in the standings.

Field Includes Five Winners of the Charles Schwab Cup

The Charles Schwab Cup Championship will feature five players who have won the Charles Schwab Cup: **Kevin Sutherland** (2017), **Bernhard Langer** (2010, 2014-2016), **Kenny Perry** (2013), **Tom Lehman** (2011, 2012) and **Jay Haas** (2006, 2008).

About Phoenix Country Club

Phoenix Country Club is no stranger to hosting PGA TOUR events. It was the site of the inaugural Waste Management Phoenix Open in 1932 (won by Ralph Guldahl) and went on to serve as the tournament site through 1986, except for odd years from 1955-73 when it was played at Arizona Country Club. Designed by Harry Collis, the club did a redesign in 2002 with current PGA TOUR Champions player **Tom Lehman** and partner John Fought doing the honors.

The Tour's mission is to provide financial opportunities for its players, entertain and inspire its fans, deliver substantial value to its partners, create outlets for volunteers to give back and generate significant charitable and economic impact in tournament communities. In 2018, the PGA TOUR Champions schedule includes 27 tournaments across the United States, Scotland and Canada, with purses totaling more than \$56 million. The Charles Schwab Cup, which includes the Regular Season and the Charles Schwab Cup Playoffs, is used to determine the season-long champion. All events are televised in the United States, with most receiving complete coverage on Golf Channel, the exclusive cable-television partner of PGA TOUR Champions. Internationally, telecasts air in excess of 190 countries and territories, reaching more than 330 million potential households. Tournament Recaps

- 1. **Mitsubishi Electric Championship at Hualalai:** Jerry Kelly birdied the 18th hole in the final round to turn a one-shot deficit into a one-shot victory over Colin Montgomerie. Leading by one on No. 18, Montgomerie found the fairway bunker off the tee and missed the green with his approach. After Kelly made his 18-foot birdie putt, Montgomerie had a chance to force a playoff, but his six-foot par putt slid by the hole.
- 2. **Boca Raton Championship:** Mark Calcavecchia captured his fourth PGA TOUR Champions title in wire-to-wire fashion, finishing two shots better than Bernhard Langer. Langer, who trailed by as many as four on Sunday, evened the score at 16-under with two holes to play, but he bogeyed the last two holes and finished second. The win was Calcavecchia's first since the 2015 Principal Charity Classic.
- 3. **Chubb Classic:** Over the last six holes at the Chubb Classic, Joe Durant and Steve Stricker traded two two-shot swings and one three-shot swing. In the end, it was Durant's birdie-birdie finish that produced a 19-under total and four-shot victory, the third of his PGA TOUR Champions career and first since the 2016 3M Championship.
- 4. **Cologuard Classic:** One year after bogeying No. 18 and finishing runner-up in his PGA TOUR Champions debut, Steve Stricker parred the closing hole en route to a 14-under total and two-stroke victory. It was his first win in his eighth start on Tour, and it was his first victory since the 2012 Sentry Tournament of Champions.
- 5. **Toshiba Classic:** As many as six players shared the lead Sunday, and Vijay Singh was the last man standing as his five back-nine birdies helped him post an 11-under total and a one-shot victory. It was his first individual win since the Dell Technologies Championship on September 1, 2008, and he had played 237 individual tournaments since that triumph. Singh is the first FedExCup champion (2008) to win on PGA TOUR Champions.
- 6. **Rapiscan Systems Classic:** For the first time, Steve Stricker claimed consecutive titles on PGA TOUR Champions with his 11-under-par effort at the Rapiscan Systems Classic. Stricker held a one-stroke lead through the front nine on Sunday before making four back-nine birdies to secure the title. His 4-under 68 on Sunday was his 25th consecutive round of par or better (the longest active streak on Tour) and kept his stat of never carding a round over par on PGA TOUR Champions intact.
- 7. **Mitsubishi Electric Classic:** With a birdie on the second extra hole, Steve Flesch prevailed in a three-man playoff and won the Mitsubishi Electric Classic, his first win on PGA TOUR Champions. Flesch birdied No. 18 to get into a playoff with Bernhard Langer and Scott Parel, and he birdied it twice more in the playoff, first eliminating Langer on the first extra hole, and then Parel. Because of inclement weather in Sunday's forecast, both the second and final rounds were played on Saturday.





- 8. **Bass Pro Shops Legends of Golf at Big Cedar Lodge**: Kirk Triplett holed a bunker shot for birdie on the first playoff hole to secure the victory with partner Paul Broadhurst at the Bass Pro Shops Legends of Golf at Big Cedar Lodge. The team of Bernhard Langer and Tom Lehman birdied five of their last seven holes (best ball) to get into a playoff at 24-under, but they settled for second place after they both missed birdie putts in sudden death.
- 9. **Insperity Invitational:** Bernhard Langer saved par on the 54th hole to win wire-to-wire and claim his fourth victory at the Insperity Invitational. Langer led by one through 36 holes, but he started the final round 2-over through eight holes and fell four shots off the pace. He played the last 10 holes bogey free, and birdies on Nos. 9, 10, 13 and 15 gave him an 11-under total and a one-shot win over Paul Goydos, Bart Bryant and Jeff Maggert.
- 10. **Regions Tradition:** Miguel Angel Jimenez birdied Nos. 16 and 18 to break a three-way tie for the lead and win his first major title. Jimenez had at least a share of the lead after every round, and his 19-under total was three shots better than Steve Stricker, Joe Durant and Gene Sauers. It was Jimenez's fifth win on PGA TOUR Champions, and he extended his streak to five straight years with a victory.
- 11. **KitchenAid Senior PGA Championship:** Paul Broadhurst carded weekend rounds of 64-63 and won the KitchenAid Senior PGA Championship by four strokes with a tournament record-tying total of 19-under 265. Broadhurst's 8-under 63 on Sunday erased the two-shot advantage held by the 54-hole co-leaders, Scott McCarron and Tim Petrovic.
- 12. **Principal Charity Classic:** After recording a second-round 65, Tom Lehman took a two-shot lead through 36 holes at the Principal Charity Classic. That lead turned into his margin of victory, as severe weather in Des Moines forced the cancellation of the final round and Lehman earned his 11th win on PGA TOUR Champions. Lehman's 13-under 131 total set the tournament's 36-hole scoring record at Wakonda Club, and it was two shots better than Bernhard Langer, Scott Parel, Woody Austin and Glen Day.
- 13. American Family Insurance Championship: Scott McCarron carded an 8-under-par 64 for a one-stroke victory over Wisconsin native Jerry Kelly. The seven-time PGA TOUR Champions winner birdied Nos. 14 through 16 and with pars on the final two holes took the American Family Insurance title with a 15-under-par 201 score. Tournament host Steve Stricker finished T3 with a 7-under-par 65 clean card on Sunday.
- 14. **U.S. Senior Open:** David Toms made a 15-foot birdie putt to take the lead at No. 16, then a long par putt at No. 17 on his way to a one-shot victory Sunday at the U.S. Senior Open. Toms' two-putt par on No. 18 closed out his final round of even-par 70. His 3-under-par 277 finish claimed his first victory on PGA TOUR Champions over Miguel Angel Jimenez (69), Tim Petrovic (70) and Jerry Kelly (72), who led after each of the first three rounds.
- 15. **Constellation SENIOR PLAYERS Championship:** Vijay Singh birdied the second playoff hole to defeat Jeff Maggert and win the Constellation SENIOR PLAYERS Championship, his third win on PGA TOUR Champions and first senior major. Singh started the final round one shot behind in fourth place, and he carded a final-round 67 to earn a spot in the playoff at 20-under. With the win, Singh earned an exemption into THE PLAYERS Championship in 2019
- 16. **The Senior Open Championship presented by Rolex:** Miguel Angel Jimenez made a 12-foot par putt on St. Andrews' 17th hole to preserve a one-stroke lead, and a par on No. 18 gave him the victory over defending champion Bernhard Langer at The Senior Open Championship presented by Rolex. Jimenez closed with a final-round 69 and finished with a 12-under total for his second major victory of the year on PGA TOUR Champions.
- 17. **3M Championship:** Kenny Perry built a five-shot lead after carding a second-round 60, and he closed with a 3-under 69 to seal a three-shot victory at the 3M Championship. The win was his third in eight starts at TPC Twin Cities, making him the tournament's second three-time champion (Hale Irwin 1997, 1999, 2002), and it was his 10th career win on PGA TOUR Champions.





- 18. **DICK'S Sporting Goods Open:** Bart Bryant made a 25-foot birdie putt on the 18th hole to secure a one-shot victory over Michael Bradley at the DICK'S Sporting Goods Open. Bryant became the first repeat winner in tournament history (2013, 2018), and both of his wins on PGA TOUR Champions have come at this event.
- 19. **Boeing Classic:** Scott Parel birdied the final six holes on the front nine en route to a 9-under 63 to win the Boeing Classic, his first victory on PGA TOUR Champions and first official victory since 2013. Parel entered the final-round trailing by five strokes behind Kevin Sutherland and Ken Tanigawa before setting a new 18-hole and 54-hole career-low to secure the victory at The Club at Snoqualmie Ridge.
- 20. **Shaw Charity Classic:** Scott McCarron aced the 14th hole, carded a final-round 63 and turned a three-shot deficit into a one-shot victory the Shaw Charity Classic. The win was the eighth of his career and second of the season, and he became the first player to successfully defend a title on PGA TOUR Champions since Bernhard Langer (2016, 2017 Regions Tradition).
- 21. **The Ally Challenge:** Paul Broadhurst won in Michigan for the second time this season, as a final-round 66 gave him a two-shot victory at the inaugural Ally Challenge at Warwick Hills Golf & Country Club. It was Broadhurst's Tour-best third victory of the season and he improved to No. 6 in the Charles Schwab Cup.
- 22. **Sanford International:** Steve Stricker tallied his third win in seven starts this season, as he carded a final-round 67 en route to a 13-under total and a four-shot victory at the inaugural Sanford International in Sioux Falls, South Dakota. Tied atop the leaderboard with Brandt Jobe through 36 holes, Stricker opened with birdies on Nos. 1 and 2 and built a three-shot lead that he wouldn't relinquish.
- 23. **PURE Insurance Championship:** Ken Tanigawa made a 35-foot eagle putt on the 18th hole at Pebble Beach to turn a one-shot deficit into a one-shot victory at the PURE Insurance Championship. It was Tanigawa's first win on PGA TOUR Champions, and he became the first Q-School graduate to win since Jerry Smith in 2015.
- 24. **SAS Championship:** Tied for the lead at the start of the day, Bernhard Langer built a three-shot cushion through nine holes and won by six after carding a final-round 65. The win was his second at the SAS Championship and 38th of his career, and he'll begin the Charles Schwab Cup Playoffs as the No. 1 player for the third straight season.
- 25. **Dominion Energy Charity Classic:** Trailing by three at the start of the final round, Woody Austin birdied the 18th hole for a final-round 69 and a one-stroke victory over defending champion Bernhard Langer at the Dominion Energy Charity Classic. The win was Austin's fourth of his career and he improved to No. 8 in the Charles Schwab Cup with two events remaining in the Charles Schwab Cup Playoffs.
- 26. **Invesco QQQ Championship:** Scott Parel closed with a bogey-free 68 to erase a one-shot deficit and win the Invesco QQQ Championship, his second victory of the season. With the win, Parel earned 610,000 points and improved to No. 2 in the Charles Schwab Cup standings, while points leader Bernhard Langer finished T6 and maintained his lead heading into the season-ending Charles Schwab Cup Championship.
