The next four players in the standings (Miguel Angel Jimenez/T32, Jerry Kelly/T8, Scott McCarron/2nd, David Toms/T11) are also mathematically capable of winning the Charles Schwab Cup.

Paul Goydos, 63-65 – 128 (-14)

Charles Schwab Cup Standings – Start: 14th / Projected: 6th

- Goydos' 128 total is his best opening 36-hole score on PGA TOUR Champions. His previous best was 129 at the Charles Schwab Cup Championship in 2016 and at the Pacific Links Hawai'i Championship in 2014.
- He has led/co-led after seven of the last eight rounds at the Charles Schwab Cup Championship. He won wire-to-wire at Desert Mountain in 2016, and last year he shared the first-round lead and was the solo leader after 36 holes (64-66 – 130) before finishing T9.
- This is the first time Goydos is the 36-hole leader of a 72-hole event on PGA TOUR Champions. In this year's majors, he entered the weekend among the top-10 at the U.S. Senior Open (T4, finished T5) and the KitchenAid Senior PGA Championship (T7, finished T15).
- Should he win, Goydos would become the tournament's sixth repeat winner, joining Jim Thorpe, John Cook, Mike Hill, Raymond Floyd and Tom Watson.

- This season, he has six top-10s and two runner-up finishes. He started the week No. 14 in the Charles Schwab Cup and he could finish as high as No. 3 in the final standings.

Scott McCarron, 65-64 – 129 (-13)

Charles Schwab Cup Standings – Start: 5th / Projected: 2nd

- McCarron's 36-hole score of 129 is the third-lowest start of his career. His best was 13-under 127 through two rounds at the 2017 Shaw Charity Classic.
- This is the third time McCarron is among the top-five through two rounds of a 72-hole event this year. He entered the weekend T1 at the KitchenAid Senior PGA Championship (finished T3) and was T4 midway through the Constellation SENIOR PLAYERS Championship (finished T4).
- In order to win the Charles Schwab Cup, McCarron must win and Bernhard Langer must finish worse than solo fourth. Through 36 holes, Langer is T20 at 2-under 140.
- He has hit 32 of 36 greens in regulation (T1) and is 6-under on the par 5s (T1).
- McCarron has two wins this season, bringing his career total to eight. In June, he posted a final-round 64 to complete a two-shot comeback at the American Family Insurance Championship, and in September he made a final-round hole-in-one en route to his second straight win at the Shaw Charity Classic.

Tim Petrovic, 63-67 – 130 (-12)

Charles Schwab Cup Standings – Start: 12th / Projected: 8th

- Petrovic's 130 total is his best 36-hole start on PGA TOUR Champions. His previous best was 135 at this year's 3M Championship and KitchenAid Senior PGA Championship.
- This is the third time Petrovic is among the top-three through two rounds of a 72-hole event on PGA TOUR Champions. In this year's majors, he entered the weekend third at the U.S. Senior Open (finished T5) and T3 at the KitchenAid Senior PGA Championship (finished second).
- He leads the field in putting (1.536 putts per GIR) and is T1 in scoring on par 3s (2-under) and par 4s (8-under).
- He has four runner-up finishes this season, including two at majors (72-hole events). At the KitchenAid Senior PGA Championship, he was a co-leader after the first and third rounds before finishing second; and at the U.S. Senior Open, he birdied the 72nd hole to finish in a three-way tie for second.
- He started the week No. 12 in the Charles Schwab Cup and he could finish as high as No. 3 in the final standings.

Other Notes

- The top-six players in the standings have a mathematical chance to win the Charles Schwab Cup.
 1. **Bernhard Langer** – T20 / -2 (Projected rank: 1st)
 2. **Scott Parel** – T20 / -2 (Projected rank: 3rd)
 3. **Miguel Angel Jimenez** – T32 / +2 (Projected rank: 5th)
 4. **Jerry Kelly** – T8 / -7 (Projected rank: 4th)
 5. **Scott McCarron** – 2nd / -13 (Projected rank: 2nd)
 6. **David Toms** – T11 / -6 (Projected rank: 7th)
- Langer carded a second-round 70 and is T20 at 2-under, but he is still projected to win the Charles Schwab Cup. However, if McCarron goes on to win, Langer needs to finish solo fourth or better in order to win his fifth Charles Schwab Cup. Should McCarron win the tournament, Langer is 10 strokes behind the position he would need to win the Cup.
- Kelly is T8 at 7-under after shooting a 4-under 67. In order to win the Charles Schwab Cup, he must erase the six-stroke deficit and win the tournament, and Langer needs to finish worse than T3 (2-way).
- **Kevin Sutherland**, the defending champion and reigning Charles Schwab Cup champion, carded a second-round 68 and is T8 at 7-under. He started the week 17th in the standings and can finish as high as 5th in the Charles Schwab Cup.
- **Wes Short Jr.** carded the day's best score, an 8-under 63, and improved from T21 to T4 at 9-under. He had two top-10s this season, including a runner-up at the 3M Championship, and he advanced to the Charles Schwab Cup Championship for the fifth straight season. Short started the week 29th in the standings and can finish as high as 7th in the Charles Schwab Cup.
