Second-Round Notes

- On Saturday, Jay Haas' age is 64 years, 4 months, 12 days. If he goes on to win, he would become the oldest player to win in PGA TOUR Champions history, breaking the record held by Mike Fetchick, who won the 1985 Hilton Head Seniors Invitational on his 63rd birthday. The win would be Haas' third at the age of 60 or older, and he would tie Bernhard Langer and Hale Irwin for most all-time.
- On Saturday, **Bernhard Langer's** age is 60 years, 7 months, 18 days. If he goes on to win, it would be his fourth since he turned 60 on August 27, 2017, and he would become the Tour's all-time leader in wins at age 60 or older. With a win, Langer would have a victory in 12 consecutive seasons, setting a PGA TOUR Champions record.
- Jerry Kelly carded the best score of the second round, a 7-under 65, and he moved 19 places up the leaderboard and into a tie for the lead. If he goes on to win, it would be his fourth win in his last 14 starts on PGA TOUR Champions, and he would regain the lead in the Charles Schwab Cup.
- Two lefties finished the second round T4 at 7-under. Russ Cochran shot a 6-under 66 Saturday morning, while Steve Flesch shot 1-under 71. For Cochran, a win would be the sixth of his career and first since the 2013 SAS Championship. For Flesch, a victory would be the first of his PGA TOUR Champions career and first professional win since the 2007 Turning Stone Resort Championship, a span of 169 starts (148 PGA TOUR, 21 PGA TOUR Champions).
