#### Things to know

- As the second of three events in the FedExCup Playoffs, the BMW Championship is the final opportunity for players outside the top 30 to qualify for the TOUR Championship
- Brooks Koepka enters the BMW Championship in the No. 1 position in the FedExCup standings
- Four players played their way into BMW Championship following THE NORTHERN TRUST: Harold Varner III, Troy Merritt, Wyndham Clark, Joaquin Niemann
- Phil Mickelson is the only player to qualify for the BMW Championship every year during the FedExCup era
- Tiger Woods is in search of PGA TOUR victory No. 82, which would tie Sam Snead for the most all-time; Woods won two of his 15 major championships at Medinah Country Club the PGA Championship in 1999 (by one over Sergio Garcia) and 2006 (by five over Shaun Micheel)
- This week marks the final week for players to move into the top eight in the Presidents Cup standings. After the top eight earn their spots on their respective teams following the BMW Championship on Sunday, August 18, International Team Captain Ernie Els and U.S. Team Captain Tiger Woods will have the opportunity to each make four additional Captains' selections following the conclusion of the World Golf Championships-HSBC Champions in November.
- 22 players in the field previously competed in previous events held at Medinah; 1999 PGA Championship, 2006 PGA Championship and the 2012 Ryder Cup;

#### The BMW Championship and the FedExCup

- New in 2019, the top 70 players in the FedExCup standings following THE NORTHERN TRUST advanced to the BMW Championship; when there were four Playoffs events, the top 70 was determined at the Dell Technologies Championship
- On three occasions a player won the BMW Championship en route to winning the FedExCup (Tiger Woods in 2007 and 2009, Billy Horschel in 2014)
- Justin Rose is currently No. 12 in the standings in his attempt to become the first FedExCup champion to defend his title
- Keegan Bradley finished No. 8 in the final 2017-18 FedExCup standings following his BMW Championship win; he is currently ranked No. 66

- Keegan Bradley defeated 54-hole leader Justin Rose with a par-4 on the first extra hole (No. 18) to win the 2018 BMW Championship; he overcame a three-stroke deficit in the final round with a 6-under 64 to force the playoff
- Bradley's win came in his 209th start on the PGA TOUR at the age of 32 years, 3 months, 3 days
- Victory came in his 161<sup>st</sup> start since winning the 2012 WGC-Bridgestone Invitational
- Despite the loss, Rose moved to No. 1 in the OWGR for the first time in his career; 22<sup>nd</sup> player to reach the No. 1 position
- Bradley and Xander Schauffele played their way into the TOUR Championship via the BMW Championship
- Jordan Spieth and Emiliano Grillo fell out of the top 30 and failed to advance to the TOUR Championship, leading to Spieth missing the Playoffs Finale for the first time
- Marc Leishman finished T41 in his bid to become the first player to win this event in successive years in the FedExCup era
