#### Things to Know

- Gary Woodland wins first major championship title in his 31st career attempt
- Woodland had never previously converted a 54-hole lead/co-lead to victory in seven attempts at stroke-play events
- Woodland joins Brooks Koepka and Jordan Spieth as only players to win a major by three or more shots in last three seasons
- Brooks Koepka's results in the last four majors: Win, T2, Win, 2<sup>nd</sup>
- 2018 U.S. Amateur winner Viktor Hovland becomes first low amateur at Masters and U.S. Open in same season since 1998

## Gary Woodland (1st/-13)

**PGA TOUR wins (4):** 2011 Valspar Championship, 2013 Barracuda Championship, 2018 Waste Management Phoenix Open, **2019 U.S. Open** 

- Collects his fourth career PGA TOUR title and first major championship victory in his 245<sup>th</sup> TOUR start at the age of 35 years,
  26 days
- Becomes seventh first-time major winner in the last 10 years at the U.S. Open
- Win comes in his ninth U.S. Open start and 31<sup>st</sup> major championship appearance; previous-best finish at the event was T23 in 2011 (Congressional CC)
- Represents third top-10 in last four major championships (T6/2018 PGA Championship, T8/2019 PGA Championship, Win/2019 U.S. Open)

- Ties lowest 72-hole score at the U.S. Open since 2011 (other 271 in that stretch: Martin Kaymer/2014)
- Joins Brooks Koepka and Jordan Spieth as the only players to win a major by three or more shots since the start of the 2017 season (Koepka/4/2017 U.S. Open, Spieth/3/2017 The Open Championship)
- Collects 600 FedExCup points and moves from No. 9 to No. 5 with 1,789 points; has qualified for the season-ending TOUR Championship in five of the last six seasons
- Earns 1,200 points towards making the 2019 Presidents Cup Team and 2,250 towards making the 2020 Ryder Cup Team
- Converts a 54-hole lead/co-lead for the first time in his eighth effort at stroke-play events
- Becomes the 53<sup>rd</sup> player to convert a 54-hole lead/co-lead for the win in U.S. Open history
- Becomes the 17<sup>th</sup> player to convert a 54-hole lead/co-lead on the PGA TOUR this season (32 individual stroke-play events)
- Played 34 consecutive holes without a bogey (No. 10 in R1 No. 7 in R3)
- Was one of only five players to post a bogey-free score this week (R2)
- Led the field in Scrambling this week (16/20); began the week ranked 169<sup>th</sup> in that category
- In four starts at the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am, has three missed cuts and a T5 (2017)
- Owns two runner-up finishes in 17 prior starts this season: THE CJ CUP @ NINE BRIDGES and Sentry Tournament of Champions

# Brooks Koepka (2<sup>nd</sup>/-10)

- Birdied four of his first five holes en route to a 3-under 68 and solo-second place finish
- Results in last four major championships: Win, T2, Win, 2nd
- In his last 15 starts at majors, has finished outside the top 15 just twice (T21/2016 Masters Tournament, T39/2018 The Open Championship)
- Koepka becomes the first player in U.S. Open history to post five consecutive rounds in the 60s. Beginning with last year's final round, he has posted scores of 68-69-68-68
- For the week: 40 of 56 fairways, 54 of 72 greens in regulation
- Was attempting to become the first to win three straight U.S. Opens since 1905 and the fourth player to win five or more majors before the age of 30

## Tiger Woods (T21/-2)

- Following bogeys on four of his first six holes, rallied with six birdies to shoot 2-under 69 and finish T21 at 2-under 282
- Moves to No. 21 in the FedExCup standings
- For the week: 41 of 56 fairways, 45 of 72 greens in regulation
- Was making his 21<sup>st</sup> U.S. Open start; among eight top-10 finishes are wins in 2000, 2002 and 2008
- Had not made the cut at the U.S. Open since 2013 (MCs in 2015 and 2018) and had not broken 70 in the final round since 2009 (69)
- Was seeking his 198<sup>th</sup> top-10 finish on TOUR, fifth of the season and second-straight (T9/the Memorial Tournament presented by Nationwide)

## Miscellaneous notes

- **Justin Rose** (T3) entered the round one shot back of Gary Woodland and made three bogeys on his final seven holes; collects 10<sup>th</sup> top-five in major championships
- Seeking his third win of the 2018-19 PGA TOUR Season, **Xander Schauffele** (T3) earned his fourth top-five in his 10<sup>th</sup> major championship start
- Jon Rahm (T3) collected his fourth top-10 in major championships since the start of the 2017-18 season
- Six-time U.S. Open runner-up and winner of the 2019 AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am **Phil Mickelson**, who celebrated his 49<sup>th</sup> birthday Sunday, posted a 1-over 72 to finish at 4-over 288. He was making his 28<sup>th</sup> U.S. Open start
- Graeme McDowell, who won the 2010 U.S. Open at Pebble Beach, finished with a 1-over 72 to finish T16 at 3-under 281
- 2018 U.S. Amateur champion Viktor Hovland made six birdies against two bogeys to close with a 4-under 67 and finish T12 at 4-under 280. In doing so, he becomes the first low amateur at the Masters and U.S. Open in the same season since Matt Kuchar achieved the feat in 1998
- Hovland's score of 280 marks the lowest 72-hole score by an amateur in U.S. Open history. Jack Nicklaus previously held the record at 282 in 1960
- Americans have now won nine of the last 10 majors (Francesco Molinari/2018 The Open Championship is the only non-American major winner in that stretch)
