Final-Round Notes

Sunday, February 10, 2019

Course Setup: Par 72 / 6,807 yards (R3 average: 71.921; Cumulative: 71.379)

Weather: Partly cloudy with a high of 81. Wind from the E at 15-20 mph.

Summary: **Bernhard Langer** birdied five of his first seven holes in the final round to work a five-stroke victory. He claimed his 39th PGA TOUR Champions title and become the first repeat winner of the Oasis Championship. The win moved him to No. 1 on the Tour's all-time money list, surpassing Hale Irwin.

Bernhard Langer, 64-68-65—197 (-19)

- Langer won \$255,000 and moved to No. 1 on the Tour's all-time money list with \$27,196,504. He surpassed Hale Irwin, who has won \$27,120,554.
- The win is Langer's 39th of his career, which is second-most in Tour history (45, Hale Irwin). He has won 16.6 percent of his starts (39 wins in 235 starts), or one win every 6.03 starts.
- It marks the 13th straight season Langer has won on PGA TOUR Champions, extending the Tour's all-time longest streak.
- This is the 20th time he has posted a sub-200 total for a 54-hole tournament. His best 54-hole total was 25-under 191 at the 2007 Insperity Invitational.
- Langer is the first repeat winner of the Oasis Championship (2010, 2019), and this is the 10th tournament he has won multiple times.
- His five-stroke victory is the largest margin in the Oasis Championship's 13-year history. Of his 39 wins, nine have been by five shots or more.
- He set the tournament scoring record at 19-under 197 (previously 18-under 198) and his 7-under 65 is the best final-round score by a winner in tournament history.
- Sunday was Langer's 20th consecutive round under par. He set the all-time record of 36 in 2016-17.

- The five-time Charles Schwab Cup champion moves to No. 1 in the Charles Schwab Cup standings. Since 2008 (his first full season on Tour), he has led the standings 129 of 285 weeks (45.26%).
- At the age of 61 years, 5 months, 14 days, Langer is the Tour's eighth-oldest winner. It is his sixth win at age 60 or older, extending his Tour record.

** Irwin's 45th win came at the age of 61 years, 7 months, 18 days at the 2007 Mitsubishi Electric Championship at Hualalai. His 39th win came in his 212th start, and he had 42 wins through 235 starts.*

Marco Dawson, 66-67-69—202 (-14)

- Dawson played alongside Langer in the final round. He carded four birdies, including on Nos. 17 and 18 to finish in solo-second place at 14-under 202.
- Last year, Dawson finished runner-up at the PURE Insurance Championship and now posted six finishes in the top five.
- Dawson owns two victories on PGA TOUR Champions: 2015 Cologuard Classic and the 2015 Senior Open Championship.

Bob Estes, 67-68-68—203 (-13)

- Estes carded a final-round 4-under 68, with five birdies. He held a solo-second place until Dawson birdied No. 18, pushing Estes into a solo-third place finish. It is his best finish on PGA TOUR Champions.
- His previous best finishes came at T5 at the 2017 KitchenAid Senior PGA Championship, 2018 Cologuard Classic and 2018 3M Championship. It is his ninth finish in the top 10 in three years on PGA TOUR Champions.
- Estes ranked second in the field this week in scrambling, saving par 13 of 15 times.
- Estes takes home his largest paycheck on PGA TOUR Champions earning \$122,400 (previous highest was \$106,000 at the 2017 KitchenAid Senior PGA Championship).

Other Notes

- **David Toms** began his final round T3 and opened with an eagle on the first hole, followed by three birdies throughout his round. Toms bogeyed Nos. 16 and 17, moving him down the leaderboard into a fourth-place finish. It is his second top-five finish this year and 13th top-five finish in three years on PGA TOUR Champions.
- **Gene Sauers** opened with a birdie on the first hole en route to a 3-under 69 final round. He finished at 11-under 205 (T5) for his 22nd finish in the top five.
- **Scott McCarron** carded a final-round 5-under 67 with six birdies to finish T5, his 24th top-five finish in five years on PGA TOUR Champions.
- **Woody Austin** eagled the first hole of his final round, followed by two birdies to finish at 2-under 70 (T5). Austin extended his streak to 33 consecutive rounds of par or better, the longest active streak on Tour. The all-time record is shared by Colin Montgomerie and Jay Haas (38).
- Making his PGA TOUR Champions debut, World Golf Hall of Fame 2019 inductee **Retief Goosen** finished at 6-under 210 (T24), earning \$17,425.
- The field included 10 past champions of the Oasis Championship.
 - **Mark Calcavecchia** (2018) finished in 72nd place after a final round 7-over 79.
 - **Scott McCarron** (2017) finished at 11-under 205 (T5).

- **Esteban Toledo** (2016) finished at 1-under 215 (T46).
- **Paul Goydos** (2015) finished at 5-under 211, after a 1-over 73 final round (T26).
- **Michael Allen** (2014) finished at 7-under 209 after a final round 4-under 68 (T19).
- **Rocco Mediate** (2013) finished at 2-under 214 (T42).
- **Corey Pavin** (2012) carded a final round 6-under 66 to finish T10.
- **Tom Lehman** (2011) finished at 7-under 209 (T19).
- **Bernhard Langer** (2010) became the tournament's first repeat winner.
- **Scott Hoch** (2008) finished at 6-over 222 (T67).
- In 2018, the 507-yard, par-5 18th was the easiest closing hole on Tour for the sixth straight year (4.351 average) and it was the third-easiest hole overall. Over three rounds, it played to a 4.338 average.
- Four players made their PGA TOUR Champions debuts this week:
