

**PAUL GOYDOS (-6)**

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**Q. Well, first of all, several of the -- almost everyone I talked to this week said it's a week and a course where you need to be aggressive. That's kind of the approach you've taken?**

**PAUL GOYDOS:** I play the same way regardless kind of of the course, quite frankly. The problem, you know, protecting par is that the weather and the course -- the course is in too good of shape and the weather's too nothing, you know. There wasn't really weather, the absence of weather. When you get those two combinations, the scores are going to be good.

But, you know, you've got to just, you know, put the pedal down and keep going. I don't know if I would use the word "aggressive" because I don't know, I don't know that I play this golf course any different than any other golf course, quite frankly. Golf is now aggressive regardless of the course or the situation. We've turned into a bunch of guys who just hit it at the flag every time and accept what happens. That's why you're seeing a lot more rounds with 10 birdies and four bogeys as opposed to four birdies and 14 pars.

**Q. You've had pretty good success, you've won up there and you played pretty well here.**

**PAUL GOYDOS:** I have, I played pretty well here like in rounds one and two. I have not played as well here in rounds three and four. But yeah, for some reason, again, I had a good start today. You look at the last four years of this tournament, my stroke average in the first round's pretty low, but I need to find a way to do it -- the guys who win are the guys -- the year that I won, I played well, I played great all three days. The reality is, to win this golf tournament, you've got to play great. It used to be you could play an okay -- three great rounds and an okay round and win. That just isn't the case anymore in golf. Golf is four great rounds.
