

**JERRY KELLY (-14)**

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**Q. Your initial thoughts coming off of here? Emotions for today? It looks like it's maybe one or possibly two.**

**JERRY KELLY:** Yeah. I mean, I feel like I was just a little bit off with my swing today. What finished off yesterday did not really show up as much today. Definitely a little loose, but it was good enough. Up until 17, I missed one green. Gave myself enough chances, I just didn't give myself a close enough chance. My 9-iron's usually dead on. I missed a green with a 9-iron and put another one 30 feet, another one 20 feet. That's usually inside of 10.

So, you know, I put myself pretty far back. The problem was it's such an easy day. I go out and shoot 5 under when the wind's blowing a little bit, it's a different story, but everybody's shooting it here. Par's like 68. So I felt like I played all right in that position, but I definitely -- it's not like I'm happy with the way I played, either.

**Q. Could you walk me through what you felt on the first tee, because you got a huge ovation, which is pretty impressive.**

**JERRY KELLY:** It was kind of unexpected. I was like, wow, that was really nice of everybody. Makes me feel even better that this is a second hometown. Seriously, I got chills on that. I was surprised, it was fantastic. It was a great start to the day, a couple of great shots. Burned the edge on one for eagle. There's the shot.

**Q. And then there were a couple of putts, and I don't know if two counted as one of them where you and Eric were looking at each other after you've executed the putt.**

**JERRY KELLY:** Probably four of them I hit right where I wanted to and they broke too much. When you're going with the slopes and the grain, it just goes so much, it just keeps going. I did a lot, but I just didn't --

**Q. Is there one shot that really stands out above all others where you felt you missed an opportunity? Was it not getting up and down from the bunker on five, the reachable par 4?**

**JERRY KELLY:** I can't remember where it was, but I missed a tap-in this year. How about that one?

No, I mean, I would say the 9-iron from the middle of the fairway, you know, licking my chops thinking I'm going to have it inside of 10 feet. I miss the green left, don't get it up and down. That was my only bogey of the day. Obviously the sand wedge on 17 I would love to

have back. I tried to hit it hard, I hit it hard with my body, not my club unfortunately, so left it out. That was a good up-and-down to give myself an opportunity to make an eagle on the last and I missed the fairway.

**Q. Was that -- what did you do -- what was --**

**JERRY KELLY:** Like I said, I was just enough off that I was thinking swing all day.

**Q. Right.**

**JERRY KELLY:** But there was no freedom of motion because I didn't really have it on any swing. So it was -- I was manufacturing out there the entire time. I did all right with that, but you know, I would like to know where I went off. Find out here in about two minutes.

**Q. Just curious, pretty crazy year when you think about it. Scott, you, Retief, all these guys fighting and it comes down to the final day, final few holes. Can you just talk about the year on this tour and what it's been like?**

**JERRY KELLY:** It's fun. It was a tough six months for me being hurt. Coming off of surgery and having a torn elbow, I was hurting. It was not fun, it was not easy. I grinded through that pretty hard, made some top-10s and then finally broke through with the win when it started feeling better. I'll get stronger for next year. I'm finally going to be able to start working out again. Hopefully I don't hurt myself working out, which is how I usually do it. I'll just try and get stronger and come back better for next year.

**Q. Was the win in Madison obviously the highlight then?**

**JERRY KELLY:** Oh, no question, no question.
