Tournament 3 of 3 in the Charles Schwab Cup Playoffs

Final-Round Notes

Sunday, November 10, 2019

Course Setup: Par 71 / 6,740 yards (R4 average: 68.147; Cumulative: 68.588)

Weather: Partly cloudy with a high of 86. Wind from the W at 5-10 mph.

Summary: Jeff Maggert holed his 123-yard approach on the par-4 17th, the third hole of a sudden-death playoff, to make eagle and defeat Retief Goosen and win the Charles Schwab Cup Championship. Because Goosen did not win the tournament, Scott McCarron won the season-long race for the Charles Schwab Cup.

Jeff Maggert, 63-65-69-66 – 263 (-21)

- Maggert birdied No. 13 to get to 20-under and extend his lead to two over Goosen, who was playing in the group ahead. Goosen birdied Nos. 15, 17 and 18 to take the clubhouse lead by one. Maggert made a six-foot birdie putt on the par-5 18th to complete a bogey-free 66 and force a playoff with Goosen.



- Both players went par-birdie (No. 18) on the first two extra holes, and the playoff went to the par-4 17th. After Goosen hit his approach to 10 feet from the fairway bunker, Maggert holed a pitching wedge from 123 yards to make eagle and capture his sixth career victory.
- It was his first win since the 2015 DICK'S Sporting Goods Open, and it broke a winless streak of 96 starts over the last 4 years, 2 months and 11 days.
- This was the fifth playoff in tournament history, and Maggert's playoff record moves to 2-1.
- Maggert becomes the tournament's fourth wire-to-wire winner, joining Paul Goydos (2016), Jim Thorpe (2003) and Jim Colbert (1995). He and Scott McCarron (Mitsubishi Electric Classic) are the only two wire-to-wire victors this season.
- Before this week's victory, Maggert went 13 starts since his last top-10 (T6, Regions Tradition). He finished the season with six top-10s and over \$1.1 million in winnings, his first million-dollar season since he won four times in 2015.

Scott McCarron, 69-71-69-71 – 280 (-4)

- McCarron started Sunday T25 and played in the day's fifth pairing (11 a.m. tee time), two hours before leader Jeff Maggert. Through 10 holes Sunday, he was 8-under for the tournament, but he played the last eight holes in 4-over and shot a final-round 71. When McCarron posted his 4-under total, he was 27th and Goosen and Langer were two shots off the lead and T2.
- McCarron won the money title with \$2,534,090. It's his third straight \$2-million season and he ends Langer's seven-year run atop the money list. Before Langer, the last player to win the money title was Tom Lehman in 2011.
- McCarron's season included wins at the Mitsubishi Electric Classic, Insuperity Invitational and Mastercard Japan Championship, and he had 14 top-10 finishes.
- He topped the Charles Schwab Cup standings the last 21 weeks and is the fourth player to lead at least 20 weeks in the same season, joining Bernhard Langer (2014, 2016, 2017), Tom Lehman (2011) and Hale Irwin (2002).

Retief Goosen, 66-67-66-64 – 263 (-21)

- Goosen closed with a 5-under 30 on the back nine, including birdies on Nos. 15, 17 and 18, to post a final-round 64 and take a one-shot lead at 21-under.
- After Maggert parred the first playoff hole, Goosen missed a three-foot birdie putt that would have given Goosen both the tournament win and the Charles Schwab Cup win. Both players birdied the second playoff hole, and the tournament was decided when Maggert made eagle on No. 17.
- Goosen finished with the Tour's best scoring average (69.14). He is the seventh player to win the scoring title as a rookie, and it ends Bernhard Langer's five-year streak as the Tour's scoring leader.

- Goosen was one of three players to post top-10s in all three Playoffs events. He was a total of 44-under.
- It was Goosen's second playoff loss this season, as he fell to Jerry Kelly on the third hole of a playoff at the American Family Insurance Championship.
- In his rookie season on PGA TOUR Champions, Goosen posted five top-three finishes, including a win at the Bridgestone SENIOR PLAYERS Championship. He was third on the money list (\$1,859,085) and finished No. 3 in the Charles Schwab Cup.

Bernhard Langer, 64-68-69-67 – 268 (-16)

- Langer aced the 194-yard eighth hole with a 6-iron. At the time, it moved him into a tie for second at 16-under, two shots behind Maggert.
 - It was his second hole-in-one on PGA TOUR Champions. He aced the third hole at Harding Park in the first round of the 2010 Charles Schwab Cup Championship.
 - It was the ninth ace in tournament history, and first since Billy Andrade in 2015.
 - It was the 11th ace this season.
- Langer made six straight pars after his hole-in-one and trailed by four with four holes to go. His comeback bid came to an end when he hit his tee shot into the water on the par-3 15th. He closed with a final-round 67 and finished T4.
- With Scott McCarron finishing T27 and Jerry Kelly finishing T10, Langer would have won his sixth Charles Schwab Cup had he won the tournament.
- Langer finishes the season fourth on the money list with \$1,831,622. It is the first time he has played a full season and not surpassed \$2 million (he only made 14 starts in 2011 due to a thumb injury).
- It is also the first time Langer has played a full season and not won the money title. In all, he has won 10 money titles (2008-2010, 2012-2018) and is the Tour's all-time money leader (\$28,653,126).
- He finishes the season with the Tour's second-best scoring average (69.26). It is the first time he has not won the scoring title since 2013, and it's his second-highest, full-season average (69.65/2008).
- Langer finishes the season with two wins, 12 top-10s and was No. 4 in the Charles Schwab Cup. The five-time Cup winner has never played a full season and finished outside the top-five (worst: 4th/2009, 2019), and he has won a total of \$7.2 million in bonus annuity.

Jerry Kelly, 66-74-64-66 – 270 (-14)

- When Kelly birdied No. 18 and posted a final-round 66, he was in a four-way tie for eighth at 14-under and six shots behind Maggert. The Charles Schwab Cup scenarios were effectively reduced to two possible outcomes: If Goosen won, he would win the Charles Schwab Cup; if Goosen did not win, McCarron would win the Charles Schwab Cup.
- With Scott McCarron finishing T27, Kelly would have won the Charles Schwab Cup had he finished two shots better at 16-under.
- This season, Kelly won three times and tallied 14 top-10s and finished second on the money list with \$2,382,675. He was second in the final Schwab Cup standings, 81,400 points behind McCarron.

Other Notes

- **Colin Montgomerie** finished the tournament T4 and was No. 5 in the final Charles Schwab Cup standings. It's his fourth top-five finish in the final standings (2nd – 2014, 2015, 2016).
- **Woody Austin** eagled the 18th hole and finished third at 19-under. He was sixth in the final standings and has five top-10s in the last six Playoffs events.
