Esteban Toledo, 70-67—137 (-3)

- Toledo moved 15 places up the leaderboard when he carded five birdies en route to a 3-under 67 and ranks first in the field in putting (52 on 29 GIR).
- Toledo owns four victories on PGA TOUR Champions. His latest came in 2016 at the Oasis Championship.
- This season, Toledo has made six starts with his best finish coming at the Hoag Classic (T15).
- In seven starts at the KitchenAid Senior PGA Championship, Toledo has made the cut four times, with his best finish coming in 2015 as runner-up to Colin Montgomerie.
- It is the first time he has led/co-led after 36-holes in a major championship. When he finished runner-up in 2015, he was in fourth place entering the weekend.
- Last year at the KitchenAid Senior PGA Championship Toledo withdrew after the first round due to a back injury.

Paul Broadhurst, 70-67—137 (-3)

- As the only player in the field to card a bogey-free second round, Broadhurst carded three birdies en route to a 3-under 67, moving up the leaderboard 15 places to share the lead.
- It is the first time he has led/co-led after 36-holes in a major championship.
- Broadhurst owns two major championships on PGA TOUR Champions (2016 Senior Open Championship presented by Rolex, 2018 Senior PGA Championship). He's looking to become the seventh player to win back-to-back titles and first since Colin Montgomerie won in 2014-2015.
- This season, Broadhurst finished runner-up at the Bass Pro Shops Legends of golf at Big Cedar Lodge when he looked to defend his title with partner Kirk Triplett and he has posted two additional top 10 finishes.

Second-Round Lead Notes

- Only four players in the second round carded under-par rounds: **Esteban Toledo** (T1/-3), **Paul Broadhurst** (T1/-3), **Mike Goodes** (T7/+1), and **Scott McCarron** (T7/+1).
- Three players from Friday's morning wave will enter the weekend T17 or better. Six players in Friday's morning wave will enter the weekend T24 or better.
- The 36-hole leader/co-leader has won five of the last eight majors:
 - Steve Stricker, 2019 Regions Tradition
 - Miguel Angel Jimenez, 2018 Open Championship Presented by Rolex
 - Kenny Perry, 2017 U.S. Senior Open Championship
 - Bernhard Langer, 2017 Senior Open Championship presented by Rolex
 - Bernhard Langer, 2017 KitchenAid Senior PGA Championship
- Of the 476 rounds at the 2008 KitchenAid Senior PGA Championship, there were only 12 rounds under par and 26 rounds of par or better. Mark O'Meara carded the lowest round of the tournament during the second round with a 4-under 66.

Retief Goosen, 72-67—139 (-1)

- Goosen carded one birdie on No. 12 and three bogeys to card a 2-over 72 adding to his 3-under 67 opening round.
- In Goosen's only other start at Oak Hill, he carded rounds of 77-74 and missed the cut at the 2003 PGA Championship.
- Goosen is making his eighth start on PGA TOUR Champions since turning 50 on February 3.
- After a T6 finish in his second start on Tour at the Chubb Classic, Goosen broke his right ring finger during the second round of the Cologuard Classic and was forced to withdraw. He missed the next seven weeks, and since returning he has three top-25 finishes in four starts. He is currently No. 40 in the Charles Schwab Cup.

Scott Parel, 66-73—139 (-1)

- As the first-round leader, Parel carded a 3-over 73 with three birdies, to add to his 4-under 66 on Thursday.
- He has three top-10s in 13 senior majors (best: T2/2017 Regions Tradition) and his best finish in three starts at the KitchenAid Senior PGA Championship was a tie for seventh in 2016.
- In 10 starts this season, Parel owns two runner-up finishes (Rapiscan Systems Classic, Insuperity Invitational) and is No. 8 in the Charles Schwab Cup standings.
- Parel owns one victory on PGA TOUR Champions (2018 Boeing Classic), seven runner-up finishes and 22 finishes in the top 10.
- In 2016, Parel Monday qualified eight times and finished 46th in the Charles Schwab Cup. At PGA TOUR Champions Q-School in December 2016, he was co-medalist and became fully exempt for the 2017 season. He tallied six top-10s and finished 21st in the final Charles Schwab Cup standings in 2017, and last year he won twice en route to a third-place finish in the final standings.

Other Notes

- Eight of the top 10 players in the Charles Schwab Cup standings are in the field and all made the cut.
- **Mike Miles** (The Oak Bridge Club) and **Bob Sowards** (Kinsale Golf and Fitness Club) are the low golf professional after the second round at T24.
- Charles Schwab Cup leader **Scott McCarron** carded four birdies for a 1-under 69 in the second round to add to his 2-over 72 opening round. He sits T7, four strokes behind the leaders.
- Rochester native **Jeff Sluman** carded a 10-over 80 in the second round, missing the cut for just the second time in 12 starts at the event.
- **Shaun Micheel**, winner of the 2003 PGA Championship at Oak Hill, is T58 after two rounds of 4-over-par.
- **Jay Haas**, winner of the 2008 KitchenAid Senior PGA Championship at Oak Hill, is T58 after two rounds of 4-over-par.
- **Paul Claxton** (+7), **Peter Jacobsen** (+10) and **Christopher Perry** (+16) withdrew from the second round.
- This week's winner will receive a lifetime exemption into the KitchenAid Senior PGA Championship and exemptions into the 2020 PGA Championship, 2019 Senior Open Championship and 2019 U.S. Senior Open.
