Q. You are one of the ones who has a ways to go.

DAVID TOMS: Yes.

Q. But you're up there. Is this frustrating or is this how it goes?

DAVID TOMS: We've been doing this a lot this year, so it's that time of year, especially in the south. I mean, this came through Shreveport where I live last night. My wife said if it rains like this in Birmingham, you're not going to play golf for a while.

So it's frustrating, yes, especially when you're playing well and you've got some momentum. You've got to be inside, be safe and wait until the golf course dries up enough to go back out, try to continue to play well.

Q. If you can't get back out there, is it really that much of a disadvantage for you to play 27 in one day and Billy Andrade's done? Does it matter?

DAVID TOMS: Well, it happens a lot. I played 35 holes last Saturday, so it's part of golf. We've been doing it a long time. You know, we're getting older, it's hard to play more than one round in a day. It wears you out a little bit, you have to recover. But it's still golf, it's a sport, and when you have to play a lot of holes in one day, if you're playing well, you actually like that. You don't want to have to play a few and then wait a day to start again. We'll see what happens.

Q. You mentioned you had some momentum going on there. If you do get back out today, how much does this kind of kill that momentum?

DAVID TOMS: Well, I mean, certainly anytime you have to stop, whether it's stopping for hours or stopping for 10 minutes to wait on the group in front of you, after you come off a birdie or make a nice putt, you want to go to the next tee to tee off. As a professional golfer, we've done it a long time, but just have to get past it, stay positive and try to get back on a roll once you do get to play.
