Things to Know

- Collin Morikawa earns his first major championship title in his PGA Championship debut and second start in a major
- Morikawa becomes the third-youngest player since WWII to win the PGA Championship, behind only Rory McIlroy and Jack Nicklaus
- With the win, his third career PGA TOUR victory in his 29th start, Morikawa moves to No. 2 in the FedExCup standings and Wyndham Rewards Top 10
- Morikawa set the PGA Championship record for lowest closing 36-hole score (129) and tied the low final-round score by a winner (64)
- Two-time defending champion Brooks Koepka, who entered the final round in a tie for fourth, closed with a 4-over 74 to finish T29
- Dustin Johnson becomes the first player to finish runner-up at the PGA Championship in consecutive years since Jack Nicklaus (1964, 1965)

- Earns first career major championship title in PGA Championship debut and second start in a major
- Marks third PGA TOUR victory in his 29th career TOUR start

- At age 23 years, 6 months, 3 days, becomes the third-youngest PGA Championship winner since World War II, behind only Rory McIlroy and Jack Nicklaus
- Becomes ninth player to win PGA Championship in tournament debut (Jim Barnes/1916, Tom Creavy/1931, Bob Hamilton/1944, Doug Ford/1955, Bob Tway/1986, John Daly/1991, Shaun Micheel/2003, Keegan Bradley/2011)
- Becomes the third player since 1970 to win a major in two or fewer starts (others: Ben Curtis/first/2003 The Open Championship, Keegan Bradley/first/2011 PGA Championship)
- With third- and final-round scores of 65-64—129, records the lowest closing 36-hole score in PGA Championship history (previous: 130, Tiger Woods/2018)
- Ties PGA Championship record for lowest final-round score by a winner (64, Steve Elkington/1995)
- Led the field in Driving Accuracy, hitting 39 of 56 fairways, and Strokes Gained: Putting (8.076)
- Made an eagle at the par-4 16th, becoming the first player to make an eagle in the final round and go on to win the PGA Championship since Rory McIlroy in 2014
- Moves to No. 2 in the FedExCup standings and Wyndham Rewards Top 10 with just one week remaining in the Regular Season (Wyndham Championship)
- Moves to No. 5 in the Official World Golf Ranking
- Becomes fourth player with multiple PGA TOUR victories on the season (others: Justin Thomas/3, Brendon Todd/2, Webb Simpson/2)

Dustin Johnson (T2/-11)

- Finishes T2, earning a runner-up at the PGA Championship for the consecutive season; last player to accomplish the feat: Jack Nicklaus (1964, 1965)
- Marks fifth career runner-up in majors (T2/2011 The Open Championship, T2/2015 U.S. Open, T2/2019 Masters Tournament, T2/2019 PGA Championship, 2nd/2020 PGA Championship)
- Falls to 0-for-4 with the 54-hole lead/co-lead in majors (2010 U.S. Open, 2015 U.S. Open, 2018 U.S. Open, 2020 PGA Championship) and 8-for-18 in 72-hole events on TOUR
- Recorded ninth consecutive round in the 60s at the PGA Championship

Paul Casey (T2/-11)

- Finishes runner-up in his 64th career major start, the most by any player since 2002 without a victory
- Represents best career finish in a major championship and 10th runner-up of his PGA TOUR career
- Moves to No. 54 in the FedExCup standings; has qualified for the TOUR Championship in each of the last five seasons, the fourth-longest active streak on TOUR

Additional Player Notes

- 2018 and 2019 PGA Championship winner **Brooks Koepka**, who entered the final round T4, closed with a 4-over 74 to finish T29; was attempting to become the third player in the last 100 years to win the same major three years in a row
- **Bryson DeChambeau** finished T4, his first top-10 in a major championship; marks his ninth top-10 of the season, tied with Justin Thomas for the most on TOUR
- 2015 PGA Championship winner **Jason Day** finished T4, his fourth consecutive top-10 on TOUR (T7/Workday Charity Open, T4/the Memorial Tournament presented by Nationwide, T6/WGC-FedEx St. Jude Invitational, T4/PGA Championship)
- **Jon Rahm** (T13) returns to No. 1 in the Official World Golf Ranking; Rahm spent two weeks in the top spot before losing it to Justin Thomas following last week's WGC-FedEx St. Jude Invitational
- Despite losing World No.1 title, **Justin Thomas** (T37) maintains his lead in the FedExCup standings and Wyndham Rewards Top 10 with one week remaining in the Regular Season
- The top three players, not otherwise exempt, in the top 10 and ties earn U.S. Open exemptions; **Matthew Wolff** (T4) and **Cameron Champ** (T10) earned exemptions (all others in top 10 were otherwise exempt)
