## Things to Know

- Justin Thomas wins the WGC-FedEx St. Jude Invitational for the second time and earns 13th PGA TOUR title
- Thomas collects his third win of the season, the most on the PGA TOUR, and extends his lead in the FedExCup standings to 713 points with two weeks remaining in the Regular Season
- Thomas becomes the third-youngest player to win 13 times on TOUR since 1960, behind only Tiger Woods and Jack Nicklaus
- Thomas moves to No. 1 in the Official World Golf Ranking for the second time in his career and first since the week of June 3, 2018

- Wins the event for the second time (2018, 2020)
- Earns 13<sup>th</sup> PGA TOUR title and becomes the first player to win three times during the 2019-20 season (THE CJ CUP
   @ NINE BRIDGES, Sentry Tournament of Champions, WGC-FedEx St. Jude Invitational)
- Becomes the third-youngest player to win 13 TOUR titles since 1960, behind only Tiger Woods and Jack Nicklaus

- Moves to No. 1 in the Official World Golf Ranking for the first time since the week of June 3, 2018; held the No. 1
  position for four weeks following THE PLAYERS Championship in 2018
- Extends lead in the FedExCup standings to 713 points with two weeks remaining in the Regular Season; the only
  other players with a mathematical chance to win the Wyndham Rewards Top 10 are Webb Simpson, Sungjae Im
  and Bryson DeChambeau
- Becomes the second consecutive FedExCup leader to win the event (Brooks Koepka/2019, Thomas/2020) and fifth
  consecutive winner of the event to enter the week No. 3 or better in both the FedExCup and OWGR (entered No. 1
  and No. 3, respectively)
- Entered the final round trailing by four strokes, tying the largest final-round comeback by a winner during the 2019-20 season (others: Tyler Duncan/The RSM Classic, Marc Leishman/Farmers Insurance Open) and the largest of his career (2016 CIMB Classic)
- Becomes the second consecutive PGA TOUR winner from the University of Alabama (Michael Thompson/3M Open)

## **Additional Player Notes**

- Daniel Berger (T2/-10) earned his fifth top-five in his last six starts (T5/AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am, T4/The Honda Classic, Won/Charles Schwab Challenge, T3/RBC Heritage, T2/WGC-FedEx St. Jude Invitational); Berger, who won the FedEx St. Jude Classic back-to-back at TPC Southwind (2016, 2017), earned a spot in the 2020 U.S. Open as the only player in the top 10 not otherwise exempt
- Phil Mickelson (T2/-10), 50, is the first player age 50 or older to finish runner-up on TOUR since Vijay Singh at the 2016 Quicken Loans National; marked the 37<sup>th</sup> second-place finish of Mickelson's career and first since the 2019 Desert Classic
- Tom Lewis (T2/-10) entered the third round 14 strokes back at T57 before closing with scores of 61-66 to tie for second; the largest 36-hole deficit overcome to win on TOUR since 1983 is 13 strokes (Mike Sullivan/1989 Houston Open)
- Brooks Koepka (T2/-10) becomes the second player to finish runner-up in a title defense during the 2019-20 season, joining Xander Schauffele (twice: P2/WGC-HSBC Champions, P2/Sentry Tournament of Champions);
   Koepka led the field in Strokes Gained: Approach the Green (8.436)
- 36- and 54-hole leader **Brendon Todd** (T15/-7) shot a final-round 75 to finish T15; Todd held the 54-hole lead for the fourth time during the 2019-20 season, the most on TOUR
