Summary: After hitting a 163-yard approach shot from the fairway, **Kevin Sutherland** made a 4-foot birdie putt on the ninth playoff hole to beat **Paul Broadhurst** on Monday and win the Charles Schwab Cup Championship. The victory was the fourth of Sutherland's PGA TOUR Champions career and his second at the season-ending event.

Playoff Notes:

- Play was suspended due to darkness after the sixth playoff hole on Sunday and resumed at 8 a.m. MST. on Monday. Broadhurst and Sutherland parred all six playoff holes on Sunday (17-18-17-18-17-18).
- On Monday, both players made par on the seventh playoff hole (No. 17) and birdies on the eighth playoff hole (No. 18) before Kevin Sutherland claimed the victory with a birdie on the ninth extra hole (No. 17).
- The last time a sudden-death playoff needed to be completed on Monday was at the 2019 Rapiscan Systems Classic. Kevin Sutherland and Scott Parel played six holes Sunday evening before play was called due to darkness, and Sutherland won Monday morning with a birdie on the seventh extra hole.
- It was the sixth playoff in tournament history. Last year, Jeff Maggert defeated Retief Goosen with an eagle on the third playoff hole.
- The longest playoff in Tour history was 10 holes at the 1998 Royal Caribbean Classic, where David Graham defeated Dave Stockton.
- This was the longest playoff in tournament history. The previous longest was in 1994, when Raymond Floyd defeated Jim Albus with a birdie on the fifth playoff hole.
- It is the fourth playoff of the 2020 season:

- Mitsubishi Electric Championship at Hualalai: Miguel Angel Jimenez defeated Ernie Els and Fred Couples with a birdie on the second hole.
- Charles Schwab Series at Bass Pro Shops Big Cedar Lodge: Shane Bertsch defeated Bernhard Langer, Kenny Perry and Glen Day with an eagle on the first hole.
- PURE Insurance Championship: Jim Furyk defeated Jerry Kelly with a birdie on the first hole.

Kevin Sutherland, 65-64-69 - 198 (-15)

- Leading by five at the start of the final round, Sutherland was 1-over after nine holes Sunday and was tied with Broadhurst at 12-under. With Broadhurst in the clubhouse at 15-under, Sutherland made a 25-foot birdie putt on the 54th hole to force the playoff.
- The Sacramento, Calif. native is now a two-time winner of the Charles Schwab Cup Championship. In 2017, he shot rounds of 69-63-66 at Phoenix Country Club to earn his first win on PGA TOUR Champions and secure the season-ending Charles Schwab Cup.
- Sutherland is now the sixth player to earn multiple wins at the season-ending event, joining John Cook (2009, 2010), Jim Thorpe (2003, 2006, 2007), Tom Watson (2000, 2002, 2005), Raymond Floyd (1992, 1994) and Mike Hill (1990, 1991).
- Kevin Sutherland's playoff record is now 3-0.
 - With a course-record 62, Sutherland erased an eight-shot deficit, the third largest in PGA TOUR Champions history, to win on the second playoff hole at the Principal Charity Classic.
 - At the 2019 Rapiscan Systems Classic, he defeated Scott Parel on the seventh playoff hole.
- Prior to this week, his best finish of the season was a solo third-place finish at the Charles Schwab Series at Ozarks National. In 15 starts this season, Sutherland finished inside the top 10 nine times.
- Sutherland becomes the sixth player with multiple wins at the season-ending event, joining John Cook (2009, 2010), Jim Thorpe (2003, 2006, 2007), Tom Watson (2000, 2002, 2005), Raymond Floyd (1992, 1994) and Mike Hill (1990, 1991).
- Sutherland earned \$375,000 and moved up four places to No. 3 in the Charles Schwab Cup standings, finishing the 2020 season with \$1,226,807 in earnings.
- Sutherland now owns four PGA TOUR titles (2019 Principal Charity Classic, Rapiscan Systems Classic; 2017 Charles Schwab Cup Championship), nine runner-up finishes and 66 finishes in the top 10.

Paul Broadhurst, 67-68-63 – 198 (-15)

- Broadhurst started the final round T3 and six shots behind 36-hole leader Sutherland. He needed just 23 putts Sunday to card the lowest round of the week, an 8-under 63.
- Broadhurst's final-round 63 matched his career best on PGA TOUR Champions. Most recently, he closed with an 8-under 63 to win the 2018 KitchenAid Senior PGA Championship.
- Broadhurst moved up 12 places to No. 17 on the Charles Schwab Cup standings and finishes the 2020 season with \$612,436 in earnings.
- A native of England, Broadhurst owns five titles, including a pair of major championships (2016 Senior Open Championship presented by Rolex, 2018 KitchenAid Senior PGA Championship), three runner-up finishes and 21 finishes in the top 10 in five years on PGA TOUR Champions.
- Broadhurst is a six-time winner on the European Tour and was a member of the 1991 European Ryder Cup team.

Other Notes

- Woody Austin posted a bogey-free 6-under 65 on Sunday to finish in third place. It marks his eighth finish in the top 10 this year.
- Five-time Charles Schwab Cup Champion **Bernhard Langer** posted a bogey-free final round 64 and finished the week at T5, his 12th top-10 of the year and the 187th of his PGA TOUR Champions career.

- Ernie Els carded seven birdies en route to a final-round 66 and a T5 finish. It marks his 10th finish in the top 10 in 13 starts this year.
- Of the eight Masters champions in the field, two finished inside the top five: **Bernhard Langer** (T5) and **Fred Couples** (T5).
- Reigning Charles Schwab Cup champion **Scott McCarron** finished the week at T55.
- Defending champion Jeff Maggert finished T28 with rounds of 70-69-71.
- John Daly withdrew (illness) during the final round.
