Things to Know

- The Korn Ferry Tour Championship presented by United Leasing & Finance is the third and final event of the Korn Ferry Tour Finals, with the second set of 25 PGA TOUR cards being awarded to The Finals 25 at the conclusion of this week's tournament
 - Following the final round of the Pinnacle Bank Championship presented by Aetna (Sunday, August 15) – the 43rd and final event of the 2020-21 regular season – the first set of 25 PGA TOUR cards were awarded to the top 25 players in the regular season points standings
- Stephan Jaeger, who is not in this week's field, leads The 25 points standings by 362.655 points; he can
 only be overtaken if Greyson Sigg finishes solo third, four-way T2 or better, or wins, or if either Chad
 Ramey or Adam Svensson win the Korn Ferry Tour Championship presented by United Leasing & Finance
 - The players who finish No. 1 in The 25 points standings and the Korn Ferry Tour Finals points standings will earn fully exempt status for the 2021-22 PGA TOUR season, as well as an exemption into the 2022 THE PLAYERS Championship
- Nine players have already crossed the 210-point threshold the Korn Ferry Tour is currently using as its fail-safe number for players to finish inside The Finals 25, leaving 16 available PGA TOUR cards this week
- Defending tournament champion **Brandon Wu** has a chance to make history this week, as no player in the Korn Ferry Tour's 32-year history has successfully defended a title
 - o Past champions Matt Every (2009) and Tom Lewis (2019) are also in the field
- Victoria National Golf Club hosted the last two playings of the Korn Ferry Tour Championship presented by United Leasing & Finance which has been an annual event on the Tour schedule since 1993 (except for 2016, when the tournament was cancelled due to Hurricane Matthew)
- Prior to hosting the Korn Ferry Tour Championship, Victoria National Golf Club hosted the United Leasing
 Finance Championship from 2012-18
 - Played anywhere from late April to early July, Victoria National became known as one of the toughest courses on the Korn Ferry Tour, with three of the seven champions finishing at 5-under par, a fourth finishing at 8-under par, and the remaining three finishing at 11-under par
 - Victoria National ranked among the top-three toughest courses on Tour six consecutive seasons from 2013-18, and it was the No. 1-ranked toughest course in 2015, 2016, and 2018

Finals 101

The Korn Ferry Tour returns to Newburgh, Indiana for the final event of the three-event Korn Ferry Tour Finals. The Korn Ferry Tour Championship presented by United Leasing & Finance follows the Albertsons Boise Open presented by Chevron and Nationwide Children's Hospital Championship. The Finals events include:

- The top-75 point leaders from the Korn Ferry Tour's regular season points standings
- Players who finished 126-200 in the PGA TOUR's FedExCup standings
- Non-members who have earned enough FedExCup points based on their performance on the PGA TOUR to place them 126-200 on that points list
- Players competing on PGA TOUR medical extensions

While 25 Korn Ferry Tour players already earned their PGA TOUR cards through the regular season, a separate points list for the Korn Ferry Tour Finals determines the remaining 25 PGA TOUR cards (The Finals 25). The player who earns the most points during the three Finals events (excluding The 25 from the regular season) will earn fully exempt status on the PGA TOUR for the 2021-22 season, as well as an invitation to THE PLAYERS Championship.

The ordering of all 50 players after the Korn Ferry Tour Finals will be done on an alternating basis, with the top position going to the leading points winner from The 25, and the second position going to the leading points winner from The Finals 25. The sequence then alternates between The 25 (Nos. 3, 5, 7, 9, etc.) and The Finals 25 (Nos. 4, 6, 8, 10, etc.) through the 25th player on both lists.

Field Notes (as of 8/31/21)

- Field headlined by 19 members of The 25, including five of the top 10 in the points standings
- Field includes 72 past Korn Ferry Tour winners with 98 total wins, led by Tommy Gainey and Adam
 Svensson with three apiece
- Field includes 21 PGA TOUR winners with 35 total wins, led by Aaron Baddeley, Sean O'Hair, and Camilo Villegas with four apiece

- **Brandon Wu** entered the final round in T8 position and five shots behind the outright 54-hole leader, Greyson Sigg, but rallied to victory with a final-round 7-under 65 (seven birdies, zero bogeys)
- Wu's victory came in his sixth start of the 2020-21 Korn Ferry Tour season
- Sigg surrendered the outright lead and fell back to 17-under par for the tournament following a double bogey at the par-4 14th
- Sigg had a birdie putt inside of 10 feet on the 72nd hole, but it missed and he finished a stroke behind Wu
- Wu, Sigg, and **Seth Reeves** (T3) all went on to earn PGA TOUR cards by finishing in the top 25 of the 2020-21 Korn Ferry Tour regular season points standings
- Vince India's T3 remains the highest finish of his Korn Ferry Tour career
- Dan McCarthy's T3 was his second top-three finish in a span of three starts, with the other being a T2 at the 2020 Albertsons Boise Open presented by Chevron two weeks prior

- The Ohio State University Golf Club's Scarlet Course hosted the Nationwide Children's Hospital Championship in Columbus, Ohio last week
- Adam Svensson turned a two-stroke 54-hole deficit into a two-stroke victory, earning his second win of the season and third victory of his Korn Ferry Tour career
- Svensson became the seventh player with multiple Korn Ferry Tour wins this season; the only other seasons in Tour history with seven multi-time winners were 1995 and 1999

- In the final round, Svensson shot a 5-under 31 on the front nine, then played the back nine at 1-over par; he became just the second player this season to win a tournament without making a birdie on the back nine of the final round (Roberto Díaz was the other, with his last under-par hole at the 2021 Chitimacha Louisiana Open being an eagle on No. 7)
- Five players secured their PGA TOUR cards by crossing the 210-point threshold the Korn Ferry Tour is currently using as its fail-safe number for players to finish inside The Finals 25 Bronson Burgoon, Scott Gutschewski, Alex Smalley, Callum Tarren, and Vincent Whaley
- Sahith Theegala three-putted for bogey on the 72nd hole and fell to T4; he moved to 10 in The Finals 25 points standings, but finished 10 points shy of the 210-point threshold
- Stephan Jaeger's T2 marked his fourth runner-up finish of the 2020-21 season and his third consecutive top-four finish
- In his final 22 starts of the 2020-21 Korn Ferry Tour season, Jaeger recorded 12 top-10s including two wins, four runners-up, a solo fourth, and two T4s
