Things to Know

- Patrick Cantlay sinks a 17'6" putt for birdie on the sixth extra hole to win his fifth PGA TOUR title and overtake the No. 1 spot in the FedExCup
- Cantlay becomes the first three-time winner of the 2020-21 season and first 54-hole leader/co-leader to convert for the win since Phil Mickelson at the PGA Championship, a span of 15 events
- Bryson DeChambeau moves from No. 8 to 3 in the FedExCup with his eighth top-10 finish of the season
- 27-under par ties the fourth-most strokes under par in a 72-hole event since 1950 (best: Ernie Els/-31/2003 Sentry Tournament of Champions)
- The BMW Championship marks the fourth consecutive week to feature a playoff and 14th of the season
- 2016 and 2019 FedExCup champion Rory McIlroy claims his 95th top-10 finish in his 203rd TOUR start
- In his first FedExCup Playoffs start, Erik van Rooyen (5th) closes with a bogey-free 7-under 65 to earn a berth into the TOUR Championship; played his final 69 holes without a bogey
- Sergio Garcia's T6 finish results in his first TOUR Championship start since 2017
- Player(s) who moved <u>into</u> top 30: Erik van Rooyen, Sergio Garcia
- Player(s) who moved <u>outside</u> top 30: Charley Hoffman, Max Homa

Patrick Cantlay (1st/-27)

 After birdies on four of his first five holes, sank a 21'9" putt for birdie on the 72nd hole to post a 6-under 66 and force sudden death with Bryson DeChambeau; moves to 3-1 in playoffs on TOUR and marks second playoff win this season (the Memorial Tournament presented by Workday)

- His fifth career PGA TOUR title comes in his 120th start at the age of 29 years, 5 months, 12 days
- With the win, holds the No. 1 spot in the FedExCup for a 10th time this season, second only to Bryson DeChambeau (20 weeks); will begin the TOUR Championship with a two-stroke advantage on the field
- Moves to No. 4 in the Official World Golf Ranking, up from 10th
- Wins a FedExCup Playoffs event for the first time
- With the win, becomes the first player to claim three victories this season (2020 ZOZO Championship, 2021 the Memorial presented by Workday, BMW Championship)
- 27-under marks his lowest score to par in a PGA TOUR event (previously 23-under at the 2019 Shriners Children's Open and 2020 ZOZO Championship); 261 total ties his career-low 72-hole score (2019/Shriners Children's Open/2nd)
- 27-under falls three strokes shy of the record for most-under-par score in a FedExCup Playoffs event (Dustin Johnson/-30/2020 THE NORTHERN TRUST)
- Set record for Strokes Gained: Putting, outperforming the field by +14.577 strokes
- Made 537'5" of putts (in regulation), becoming the third winner since 2003 to make over 500 feet of putts en route to victory
- Converts a 54-hole lead/co-lead into victory for the first time; on only previous occasion, finished T8 at the 2020 Shriners Children's Open; converts a lead/co-lead after any round for the first time (1-for-10)
- Becomes the first player to convert a 54-hole lead on TOUR since Phil Mickelson at the PGA Championship, a span of 15 events
- Becomes the 12th 54-hole leader/co-leader to win the BMW Championship since 2000 and first since Justin Thomas in 2019
- Makes a return to the TOUR Championship for a fourth time and first since 2019 (34th in the FedExCup in 2020)

Bryson DeChambeau (2nd/-27)

- Following a final-round 6-under 66, missed an 11'9" putt for birdie on the sixth extra hole to extend the playoff
- Moves to 1-1 in playoffs on the PGA TOUR
- With the runner-up finish, moves to No. 3 in the FedExCup
- Best finish in the FedExCup: 3rd/2018 after entering the TOUR Championship as the FedExCup leader
- Eight-time PGA TOUR winner records his fifth runner-up on TOUR
- Was seeking a third victory in the FedExCup Playoffs (2018 THE NORTHERN TRUST, 2018 Dell Technologies Championship)
- Runner-up finish comes in his fifth start at the BMW Championship, marking his first top-10 in the event

Miscellaneous Player Notes

- Sungjae Im closed with a 5-under 67 in his third BMW Championship to finish third at 23-under 265 and move from No. 25 in the FedExCup to 12th; will make his third start at the TOUR Championship in as many seasons on TOUR
- 2012 BMW Championship winner and first-round co-leader **Rory McIlroy** (4th/-22) closed with a 5-under 67; in addition to his 2012 victory, finished inside the top-10 in 2014/T8, 2015/T4, 2018/5th and 2021/4th
- Erik van Rooyen (5th/-21), the only first-timer remaining in the FedExCup Playoffs, carded just one bogey during the tournament (No. 3 in round one); ranked No. 139 before winning the Barracuda Championship to move inside the top 125 (No. 78); After entering the FedExCup Playoffs at No. 76, finished seventh at THE NORTHERN TRUST to move to No. 45; with his top-five finish this week, moved to No. 27
- Eleven players have finished in the top 10 in each of the FedExCup Playoffs events in a single season. Through two of this season's three Playoffs events: **Jon Rahm** and **Erik van Rooyen** have top 10s and remain in the Playoffs
- **Sergio Garcia** (T6/-20), who entered the week No. 44 in the FedExCup, closed with a 3-under 69 to move to No. 28 in the standings; returns to the TOUR Championship for the first time since 2017
- **Dustin Johnson** (T6/-20) recorded a 6-under 66, his 94th sub-70 round in the FedExCup Playoffs, the most of any player (next: Adam Scott/90)
- Last week's winner of THE NORTHERN TRUST **Tony Finau** (T15/-16) birdied five of his first nine holes and five of his last six en route to a 9-under 63, the low score in the final round; marks his fifth final-round score of 65 or better in a Playoffs event since 2017, the most of any player; will enter the TOUR Championship at No. 2 in the FedExCup
