Additional Notes

- Course was all bermudagrass for last year's event in June. It was overseeded this year.
- There was 4,000 square feet of tee area added to No. 17 after last year's event.
- Area had a cold, wet winter, which was not good for the bermudagrass. Course has seen extensive play during pandemic.
- Ahead of 2020 event fairways were expanded on holes 1, 2, 3, 6, 8, 11, 12, 13, 15 and 16. Bunker faces and banks were reestablished throughout the course.
