Things to Know

- Martin Laird wins his fourth PGA TOUR title and second at the Shriners Hospitals for Children Open, defeating Matthew Wolff and Austin Cook in a playoff
- Laird joins Jim Furyk and Kevin Na as multiple winners of the event
- Laird becomes the first player to win on TOUR competing as a sponsor exemption since Matthew Wolff at the 3M
 Open
- Playoff was the fourth of Martin Laird's TOUR career (2-2) and third at the Shriners Hospitals for Children Open
- Matthew Wolff has finished second in each of his last two starts and three of his last 10
- Austin Cook earns his best result since winning The RSM Classic in 2017
- Defending champion Kevin Na finishes T43 in attempt to join Jim Furyk as the only back-to-back winners of the event

- Earns fourth PGA TOUR victory and second at the Shriners Hospitals for Children Open; wins: 2009 Shriners Hospitals for Children Open, 2011 Arnold Palmer Invitational presented by Mastercard, 2013 Valero Texas Open, 2020 Shriners Hospitals for Children Open
- Moves to No. 4 in the FedExCup standings with the win
- Joins Jim Furyk (1995, 1998, 1999) and Kevin Na (2011, 2019) as multiple winners of the event

^{*} won with a birdie on the second playoff hole (par-3 17th)

- Becomes first player to win on TOUR competing as a sponsor exemption since Matthew Wolff at the 2019 3M Open
- Has competed in four playoffs on the PGA TOUR and three at the Shriners Hospitals for Children Open (Won/2009, P2/2010, Won/2020)
- After finishing 19-under 265, won the 2009 event in a playoff over Chad Campbell and George McNeill; followed with a playoff loss to Jonathan Byrd in 2010, who made a hole-in-one in the playoff to win
- Converts 54-hole lead/co-lead to victory for second time in fifth attempt on TOUR and first time in second attempt at the Shriners Hospitals for Children Open; previous 54-hole leads/co-leads: 2015 Waste Management Phoenix Open (T5), 2011 Arnold Palmer Invitational presented by Mastercard (Won), 2010 Shriners Hospitals for Children Open (P2), 2010 THE NORTHERN TRUST (P2)
- Also held a share of the 36-hole lead, converting to victory for the second time in four attempts (others: Won/2011
 Arnold Palmer Invitational presented by Mastercard, T3/2014 Safeway Open, T5/2015 Waste Management Phoenix
 Open)
- Played the par-5 ninth in 7-under for the week (birdie-eagle-eagle-eagle)
- Had surgery to repair a torn meniscus in his left knee prior to the Return of Golf at the Charles Schwab Challenge in June

Additional Player Notes

- Matthew Wolff (P2) has finished second in each of his last two starts and three times in his last 10 (2nd/Rocket Mortgage Classic, 2nd/U.S. Open, P2/Shriners Hospitals for Children Open)
- Austin Cook (P2) earned his best result since winning The RSM Classic in 2017
- Defending champion **Kevin Na** finished T43 after a final-round 76; Jim Furyk (1998, 1999) is the only back-to-back winner at the event
- Playing on a sponsor exemption, Will Zalatoris finished in a three-way tie for fifth, while a two-way T5 would have earned him Special Temporary Membership for the remainder of the season; Zalatoris earns a spot in the Bermuda Championship by finishing in the top 10
- With a T5, James Hahn earned 100 of the 140 FedExCup points he needed to remain in the Major Medical category for the remainder of the season; Hahn has 11 starts remaining on his Major Medical Extension to earn 40 points
- Patrick Cantlay (T8) fails to convert the first 54-hole lead/co-lead of his PGA TOUR career to victory; ends streak of three consecutive years with a win or runner-up at the event
- **Bryson DeChambeau** maintains his lead in the FedExCup standings with a T8 in his first start since winning the U.S. Open
