Things to Know

- After matching 1-under 71s, 2019 Memorial Tournament champion Patrick Cantlay defeats Collin Morikawa in sudden death and overtakes the lead in the FedExCup
- With the win, Cantlay becomes the seventh multiple winner of the Memorial Tournament
- Cantlay's victory comes in the seventh playoff of the season and first since the Zurich Classic of New Orleans
- Morikawa's playoff loss marks sixth top-10 finish of the season and third in his last five starts
- Scottie Scheffler narrowly misses first PGA TOUR title and second professional victory in Columbus
- Six-time PGA TOUR winner Jimmy Walker nets first top-10 finish since 2018

Patrick Cantlay (1st/-13)

- Beginning the final round locked at 12-under 204 with Collin Morikawa, made four birdies against three bogeys to post a 1-under 71, as did Morikawa; on the first hole of sudden death, won with a par-4 at the 18th hole
- Claims his fourth career PGA TOUR victory, including the 2019 Memorial Tournament, in his 114th start at the age of 29 years, 2 months, 20 days
- With the win, collects 550 points and overtakes the No. 1 spot in the FedExCup (from No. 10)
- With the win, is projected to move inside the top 10 in the Official World Golf Ranking
- PGA TOUR playoff record: 2-1
- Second victory at the Memorial Tournament comes in his fifth start; 2021/1st, 2020/T32, 2019/1st, 2018/4th, 2017/T35

^{*}defeated Collin Morikawa with a par on the first hole of sudden death (par-4 18th)

- Becomes the seventh multiple winner of the Memorial Tournament, joining Tiger Woods (5), Kenny Perry (3), Jack
 Nicklaus (2), Hale Irwin (2), Greg Norman (2) and Tom Watson (2)
- Joins Stewart Cink, Bryson DeChambeau and Jason Kokrak as multiple winners this season (2020 ZOZO Championship)
- Marks fifth top-10 of the season (17 starts) and first since a T3 at the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am; most recently before this week finished T23 at the PGA Championship two weeks ago
- 2011 Jack Nicklaus Award winner is one of three past recipients to also win the Memorial Tournament (Tiger Woods, Jon Rahm)

Collin Morikawa (2nd/-13)

- Was seeking a fifth career PGA TOUR title, second of the season and second at Muirfield Village Golf Club (2020 Workday Charity Open)
- Highlighted by five made putts from outside 10 feet, sank a total of 109' 1" of putts in the final round
- In only previous start at the Memorial Tournament, finished T48 in 2020
- With the runner-up finish, moves to No. 8 in the FedExCup (from No. 23)
- PGA TOUR playoff record: 1-2
- Was seeking a fourth victory on a Jack Nicklaus-designed venue 2019 Barracuda Championship (Montreux G&CC), 2020 Workday Charity Open (Muirfield Village), 2021 WGC-Workday Championship at The Concession
- Marks sixth top-10 of the season and his first since a T8 in defense of his PGA Championship title two weeks ago

Additional Notes

- Making his second start in the Memorial Tournament (2020/T22), **Scottie Scheffler** (3rd/-11) collects his sixth top-10 finish of the season and first since a T8 at the PGA Championship two weeks ago
- A week after withdrawing from the Charles Schwab Challenge with a back injury, 2021 Puerto Rico Open winner Branden Grace (4th/-10) made a 40′ 3″ shot from off the green for birdie at the 72nd hole to close with a 1-under 71; was looking to become the first South African to win multiple times in a season since Ernie Els in 2010
- A week after missing the cut at the Charles Schwab Challenge, **Patrick Reed** (5th/-8) closed with a 3-under 69 to clench his sixth top-10 finish of the season and first since a T6 at the Wells Fargo Championship
- The Memorial Tournament is one of three tournaments on the PGA TOUR schedule with "elevated status" (The Genesis Invitational, Arnold Palmer Invitational presented by Mastercard); elevated events offer a larger purse (\$9.3 million), a three-year PGA TOUR exemption for the winner and, new in 2021, 550 FedExCup points to the winner; with his win at this season's Genesis Invitational, T10 at the Arnold Palmer Invitational and T6 at this week's Memorial Tournament, Max Homa becomes the first player to earn top-10 finishes in all three events since Bill Haas in 2013
- **Jimmy Walker**, who began the final round T38, posted the day's low score with a bogey-free 7-under 65 to finish T6 at 6-under 282; marks his first top-10 finish on TOUR since a T6 at the 2018 AT&T Byron Nelson
- Two-time Masters Tournament winner and World Golf Hall of Fame member **Ben Crenshaw** has been selected as the Honoree for the 47th Memorial Tournament in 2022
