Things to Know

• Due to COVID-19, the Valspar Championship was not held in 2020

- 2018 and 2019 champion Paul Casey, the only player in tournament history to win back-to-back, returns in search of third consecutive victory at the event
- The top-two players in the Official World Golf Ranking, Dustin Johnson (1) and Justin Thomas (2), are in the field
- First time in tournament history the Valspar Championship will be played in April/May

Field Notes

- 11 of the top 30 in the FedExCup standings, led by No. 2 Justin Thomas and No. 7 Viktor Hovland
- 18 of the top 50 in the Official World Golf Ranking, led by No. 1 Dustin Johnson and No. 2 Justin Thomas
- 97 PGA TOUR winners, the second-most of any tournament to date during the 2020-21 season (most: 110, THE PLAYERS Championship)
- 17 major championship winners combining for 24 major victories, led by Phil Mickelson (5)
- Five FedExCup champions: Brandt Snedeker (2012), Henrik Stenson (2013), Justin Thomas (2017), Justin Rose (2018), Dustin Johnson (2020)
- Eight past champions: K.J. Choi (2002, 2006), Sean O'Hair (2008), Gary Woodland (2011), Luke Donald (2012), Kevin Streelman (2013), Charl Schwartzel (2016), Adam Hadwin (2017), Paul Casey (2018, 2019)

- Paul Casey won his second consecutive Valspar Championship, defeating Jason Kokrak and Louis Oosthuizen by
- Casey became the first player to successfully defend Valspar Championship title and third to win the event multiple times, joining K.J. Choi (2002, 2006) and Retief Goosen (2003, 2009)
- The win marked Casey's third PGA TOUR title in his 250th career start
- Dustin Johnson entered the final round one stroke back of Casey before closing with a 74, snapping a streak of 14
 consecutive rounds in the 60s

Valspar Championship and the FedExCup

- The Valspar Championship is the 31st of 50 events in the 2020-21 PGA TOUR Season
- 12 of the 13 winners of the Valspar Championship during the FedExCup era have qualified for the season-ending TOUR Championship, including each of the last 11
- Two players have won the Valspar Championship and gone on to win the FedExCup in the same season: Jim Furyk (2010 season) and Jordan Spieth (2014-15 season)
- 2019 champion Paul Casey went on to finish No. 5 in the FedExCup standings

Top 10 in the FedExCup standings at the conclusion of the Wyndham Championship will be recognized through the Comcast Business TOUR Top 10. Updated standings are below:

Player notes

Two-time defending champion Paul Casey (FedExCup No. 57, OWGR No. 20)

- Two-time defending champion (2018, 2019; canceled in 2020)
- Last player to win three consecutive titles at the same PGA TOUR event: Steve Stricker, John Deere Classic (2009, 2010, 2011)
- Four top-10s in 12 starts during the 2020-21 season, highlighted by T5s at the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am and THE PLAYERS Championship
- Won the European Tour's Omega Dubai Desert Classic in January, his first victory worldwide since the 2019 Porsche European Open in September 2019

World No. 1 and reigning FedExCup champion Dustin Johnson (FedExCup No. 10)

- Finished T6 at the 2019 Valspar Championship and missed the cut at his only two prior starts at the event (2008, 2010)
- Won the Masters Tournament in November and has three additional top-10s on the season
- 24-time PGA TOUR winner, tied with Gary Player for 26th all-time; players with 25 wins (T23): Tommy Armour, Johnny Miller, Macdonald Smith

Justin Thomas (FedExCup No. 2, OWGR No. 2)

- Three prior Valspar Championship starts (T10/2015, T18/2016, MC/2017)
- One win (THE PLAYERS Championship), one runner-up (ZOZO CHAMPIONSHIP @ SHERWOOD) and one solo-third (Sentry Tournament of Champions) in 12 starts during the season
- 14-time PGA TOUR winner, the most among players younger than 30

Patrick Reed (FedExCup No. 19, OWGR No. 7)

- Two-time runner-up at the Valspar Championship (P2/2015, T2/2018)
- Four top-10s in 11 starts during the 2020-21 season, highlighted by win at the Farmers Insurance Open
- One of three players to qualify for the TOUR Championship in each of the last seven seasons (others: Dustin Johnson, Hideki Matsuyama)

Additional player notes

- Among players making their tournament debut is two-time PGA TOUR winner **Viktor Hovland**; Hovland enters the week in the top 15 in both the FedExCup (No. 7) and OWGR (No. 15)
- 2016 Valspar Championship winner **Charl Schwartzel** lost in a playoff at last week's Zurich Classic of New Orleans; Schwartzel and partner Louis Oosthuizen fell to Cameron Smith and Marc Leishman
- In the last two weeks, **Peter Uihlein** has won on the Korn Ferry Tour (MGM Resorts Championship at Paiute) and earned a career-best result on the PGA TOUR (3rd/Zurich Classic of New Orleans with partner Richy Werenski); Uihlein earned a spot in the field via the top-five at the Zurich Classic
