Things to Know

- 14-time PGA TOUR winner Adam Scott holds a one-stroke lead after the second round of the BMW Championship, his 17th 36-hole lead/co-lead on the PGA TOUR
- Three players that have won the Masters Tournament and have been or currently are ranked No. 1 in the Official World Golf Ranking are T2 or better: Scott (1st), Scottie Scheffler (T2) and Jordan Spieth (T2)
- Scott and Spieth rank Nos. 3 and 4 in career PGA TOUR wins among players that qualified for the FedExCup Playoffs
- PGA TOUR rookie Cameron Young (T2) has five runner-up finishes this season and is the highest-ranked player in the Official World Golf Ranking without a win on TOUR

Second-Round Lead Notes

- 7 Second-round leaders/co-leaders to win the BMW Championship since 2000 (most recent: Marc Leishman/2017)
- 12 Second-round leaders/co-leaders to win individual stroke-play events on TOUR in 2021-22 (most recent: Joohyung Kim/Wyndham Championship)

- Holds the 36-hole lead/co-lead for the 17th time on the PGA TOUR (6-for-16 to date converting to victory); was tied for the lead after the second round of the 2005 Genesis Invitational, which was shortened to a 36-hole event due to weather, and earned an unofficial victory after defeating Chad Campbell in a playoff
- First 36-hole lead/co-lead since the 2019 Masters Tournament (finished T18)
- First lead/co-lead after any round since the 2020 Genesis Invitational (co-led after the third round and went on to win)
- Now has 95 sub-70 scores in the FedExCup Playoffs, the second-most of any player (most: 98, Dustin Johnson)
- 19 top-10s in the FedExCup Playoffs, second-most of any player (most: 23, Dustin Johnson)
- One of two players that has qualified for the FedExCup Playoffs in each of the 16 seasons of the FedExCup era, along with Matt Kuchar
- Finished T5 at last week's FedEx St. Jude Championship, moving from No. 77 to No. 45 in the FedExCup; was one of four players to enter the week outside the top 70 and go on to qualify for the BMW Championship, along with Wyndham Clark, Lucas Glover and Andrew Putnam
- Has qualified for the TOUR Championship eight times in the FedExCup era (2007, 2010, 2011, 2012, 2013, 2014, 2016, 2019)
- Best result in the FedExCup: 4th (2013, 2016)

- 14-time PGA TOUR winner, including the 2013 Masters Tournament; most recent victory came at the 2020 Genesis Invitational
- At age 42, would be the oldest PGA TOUR winner since Phil Mickelson at the 2021 PGA Championship (50); has not won on TOUR since turning 40
- Fifth player age 42 or older to hold 36-hole lead/co-lead in a FedExCup Playoffs event and first since Tiger Woods at the 2018 TOUR Championship (42)

Scottie Scheffler (T2/-7)

- Fourth 36-hole position of T2 or better this season; went on to win one of the previous three (2nd/World Wide Technology Championship at Mayakoba/finished 4th, 1st/Masters Tournament/Won, T1/Charles Schwab Challenge/P2)
- Four wins this season (WM Phoenix Open, Arnold Palmer Invitational presented by Mastercard, WGC-Dell Technologies Match Play, Masters Tournament)
- Official money total of \$13,176,910 million is the largest in a single season in PGA TOUR history
- Fell to No. 2 in the FedExCup standings after last week's FedEx St. Jude Championship, snapping a streak of 23 consecutive weeks as FedExCup leader
- Last player to win five or more times in a season: Justin Thomas, 2016-17 season (5)
- One player has won the Masters and the FedExCup in the same season: Jordan Spieth, 2014-15 season

Miscellaneous notes

- 2015 FedExCup Champion **Jordan Spieth** (T2/-7), who won the RBC Heritage in April, has won multiple titles in a season three times in his PGA TOUR career but has not since 2016-17 (5/2014-15, 2/2015-16, 3/2016-17)
- PGA TOUR rookie **Cameron Young** (T2/-7), at No. 17, is the highest-ranked player in the Official World Golf Ranking without a win on TOUR
- Three of the five players tied for 6th entered the week in the top 10 of the FedExCup standings: Xander Schauffele (entered No. 6), Patrick Cantlay (No. 7) and Rory McIlroy (No. 9)
- Four rookies entered the week in the top 30 of the FedExCup (Young/13, **Joohyung Kim**/25, **Davis Riley**/26, **Sahith Theegala**/27) and all but Young are projected to move outside the top 30; there has not been a season in the FedExCup-era (since 2007) which more than two rookies have advanced to the TOUR Championship
