Things to Know

- FedExCup leader and World No. 1 Scottie Scheffler holds a five-stroke lead after the second round of the Masters Tournament, tying the largest 36-hole lead in tournament history (sixth instance)
- Scheffler is the first player to lead by five strokes or more after the second round of a major championship since Brooks Koepka at the 2019 PGA Championship (7)
- Scheffler has won three times in his last five starts on TOUR
- 82-time PGA TOUR winner and five-time Masters Tournament champion Tiger Woods records a second-round 74 and enters the third round tied for 19th
- Woods makes his 22nd consecutive cut at the Masters, one shy of the tournament record held by Fred Couples and Gary Player
- Defending champion Hideki Matsuyama enters the third round T2; last player to successfully defend title at the Masters: Woods, 2002
- Notables to miss the cut: Jordan Spieth, Brooks Koepka, Xander Schauffele, Bryson DeChambeau

- Ties the largest 36-hole lead in Masters history (sixth player)

 Herman Keiser, 1946 (Won)
 Harry Cooper, 1936 (finished 2nd)
- First player to hold a 36-hole lead of five strokes or more in a major since Brooks Koepka (7) at the 2019 PGA Championship (won wire-to-wire)

- Ties largest 36-hole lead on the PGA TOUR this season (Keith Mitchell/THE CJ CUP @ SUMMIT, Seamus Power/AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am)
- Fourth career 36-hole lead/co-lead on TOUR and first in a major (0-for-3 to date: 2019 Military Tribute at The Greenbrier, 2019 Butterfield Bermuda Championship, 2020 American Express; all co-leads)
- In the top 10 after each of the last nine major championship rounds (R2-R4/2021 U.S. Open, R1-R4/2021 Open Championship, R1-R2/2022 Masters Tournament)

Three-time winner this season

- Leads the PGA TOUR with three wins this season; all three have come in his last five starts (WM Phoenix Open, Arnold Palmer Invitational presented by Mastercard, WGC-Dell Technologies Match Play)
- Last player to win on the PGA TOUR and win a major in his next start: Jordan Spieth, 2017 Travelers Championship and Open Championship
- Last player to win four times in a six-start stretch on the PGA TOUR: Jason Day, 2015 (4 in 6: RBC Canadian Open, PGA Championship, FedEx St. Jude Championship, BMW Championship)
- Last player to win in consecutive PGA TOUR starts: Patrick Cantlay, 2021 BMW Championship and TOUR Championship
- Last player to win in consecutive PGA TOUR starts during the FedExCup Regular Season: Brendon Todd, 2019 Bermuda Championship and World Wide Technology Championship at Mayakoba

FedExCup leader and World No. 1

- No. 1 in both the FedExCup standings and Official World Golf Ranking (first start as World No. 1)
- Third time World No. 1 has held at least a share of the lead after a round on TOUR this season (Jon Rahm/R3/Sentry Tournament of Champions, Rahm/R2/Farmers Insurance Open, Scheffler/R2/Masters Tournament)
- Fifth time in the last 10 rounds at the Masters that World No. 1 has held at least a share of the lead (Dustin Johnson/R1-R4/2020, Scheffler/R2/2022)
- World No. 1 has won the Masters five times: Ian Woosnam/1991, Fred Couples/1992, Tiger Woods/2001, Woods/2002, Dustin Johnson/2020
- Last World No. 1 to win on TOUR: Dustin Johnson, 2020 Masters
- No Masters Tournament winner has entered the week No. 1 in the FedExCup standings
- Last FedExCup leader to hold lead/co-lead after any round on TOUR: Patrick Cantlay, 2021 TOUR Championship (R1-R4)
- Last FedExCup leader to win on TOUR: Scheffler, two weeks ago at the WGC-Dell Technologies Match Play

Tiger Woods (T19/+1)

- Making first start on the PGA TOUR since the 2020 Masters Tournament (508 days between the final round of the 2020 Masters and first round of the 2022 Masters)
- Makes the cut at the Masters for the 22nd consecutive time, one shy of the record held by Fred Couples and Gary Player (23)
- Began the round 4-over through five holes, his worst start through five holes in 92 starts at the Masters
- Position by round at the 2022 Masters: T10-T19
- Position by round at the 2020 Masters: T10-T17-T20-T38

Miscellaneous notes

- Defending champion **Hideki Matsuyama** cards a 3-under 69 and moves to T2; last player to successfully defend title at the Masters: Tiger Woods (2002)
- First-round leader **Sungjae Im** records a 3-over 74 and enters the third round T2 with three major champions (Charl Schwartzel, Shane Lowry, Matsuyama)
- **Justin Thomas** (T10/-1) improves by nine strokes from the first round to the second and moves up 60 spots on the leaderboard after a 5-under 67, tying Scottie Scheffler for low round of the day
- **Bryson DeChambeau** (MC) records a second-round 80, the highest score of his PGA TOUR career
- Seven players in the top 20 in the Official World Golf Ranking missed the cut: No. 10 Xander Schauffele, No. 11 Sam Burns, No. 14 Louis Oosthuizen (WD), No. 15 Abraham Ancer, No. 17 Brooks Koepka, No. 18 Jordan Spieth, No. 19 Bryson DeChambeau
