Things to Know

- Bubba Watson equals the PGA Championship scoring record with a 7-under 63, becoming the third player to do so at Southern Hills (Raymond Floyd/1982, Tiger Woods/2007)
- Will Zalatoris leads after tying the third-best opening 36-hole score in PGA Championship history
- Zalatoris holds the second 36-hole lead/co-lead of his PGA TOUR career; 0-for-1 to date converting to victory
- In the seven major championships hosted at Southern Hills, all winners held at least a share of the 36-hole lead
- Four-time PGA Championship winner Tiger Woods makes the cut for the 18th time in 22 starts at the event
- Scottie Scheffler becomes just the third World No. 1 to miss the cut at the PGA Championship
- First-round leader Rory McIlroy trails by five shots following a 1-over 71

Will Zalatoris (1st/-9)

- Leads by one over Mito Pereira following a bogey-free 65; becomes the seventh player during the stroke-play era of the PGA Championship (since 1958) to hold the outright 36-hole lead without having a TOUR win
- Ties the third-best opening 36-hole score (131) in PGA Championship history (128/Brooks Koepka/2019, 130/Gary Woodland/2018)
- R2 stats: 11/18 greens in regulation, 7/14 driving accuracy, 7/7 scrambling, 2/2 sand saves
- Leads the field in Strokes Gained: Putting (+6.180)
- Second 36-hole lead/co-lead on TOUR; 0-for-1 converting to victory (2021 Sanderson Farms Championship/T14)
- Seeking fifth top-10 finish in last seven major championship starts
- Finished T8 in debut appearance at the 2021 PGA Championship
- Seeks first victory in 48th PGA TOUR start (best finishes: T2/2021 Masters, P2/2022 Farmers Insurance Open)

Additional Player Notes

- **Mito Pereira** (2nd/-8) equals his career-low round on the PGA TOUR with a 64, one week after initially setting the mark in the first round of the AT&T Byron Nelson (finished T17)
- 2017 PGA Championship winner Justin Thomas (3rd/-6) equals his best opening 36-hole score in a major championship at 6-under 134; marks the third time in 26 major championship starts to open with two rounds in the 60s (2018 PGA Championship/T6, 2020 Masters/4th)
- **Bubba Watson** (4th/-5) equals the PGA Championship scoring record with a 7-under 63, becoming the 17th player (18th instance) to perform the feat; records the third 63 at Southern Hills (Raymond Floyd/1982, Tiger Woods/2007); round included nine birdies, the most in a round in his major championship career (182 rounds)
- First-round leader **Rory McIlroy** (T5/-4) trails by five shots following a 1-over 71; 2012 and 2014 PGA Championship winner makes the cut for the 13th time in 14 starts at the event (2016)
- Shane Lowry (T41/+2) extends the longest active streak of cuts made in major championships to 12, dating to a T8 at the 2019 PGA Championship
- Making his 89th major championship appearance, Tiger Woods (T53/+3) rallies from a double-bogey on the par-3 11th with birdies on Nos. 13 and 16 to post a 1-under 69; four-time PGA Championship winner makes the cut for the 18th time in 22 starts at the event
- Scottie Scheffler (MC/+6) becomes just the third World No. 1 to miss the cut at the PGA Championship (Seve Ballesteros/1986, Dustin Johnson/2021); Jordan Spieth remains the last player to win consecutive major championships (2015 Masters Tournament, U.S. Open)
