Things to Know

- Japan’s Hideki Matsuyama comes from behind to win his eighth career PGA TOUR victory, tying K.J. Choi for most wins by a player from Asia
- Matsuyama becomes first two-time winner of the season (2021 ZOZO CHAMPIONSHIP, 2022 Sony Open in Hawaii)
- Matsuyama becomes the ninth consecutive Sony Open champion who competed in the Sentry Tournament of Champions the week before
- Matsuyama becomes the 11th straight winner since the start of the 2021-22 PGA TOUR Season to enter the week inside the top 50 in the Official World Golf Ranking
- 2013 Sony Open in Hawaii winner Russell Henley moves to 1-for-6 in converting 54-hole lead/co-leads
- Marks the 14th playoff in tournament history and first since 2020 (Cameron Smith defeated Brendan Steele)
- Marks first playoff of the season in the 11th event, the longest span without a playoff to start a season since 2010 (15 events/Houston Open/Anthony Kim)
- On the heels of the University of Georgia football team winning the National Championship for the first time since 1980, three Georgia alums finish in the top 10: Russell Henley (2nd), Kevin Kisner (T3), Keith Mitchell (T7); All 10 UGA golfers in the field made the cut

- Improves to 4-1 playoff record
- Wins his eighth career PGA TOUR victory in his 203rd start at the age of 29 years, 10 months, 22 days
- Ties K.J. Choi for most wins by a player from Asia (8)
- Began the final round two shots off the lead; marks fifth come-from-behind win and first since 2017 WGC-Bridgestone Invitational
- Becomes the first multiple winner of the 2021-22 season: 2021 ZOZO CHAMPIONSHIP, 2022 Sony Open in Hawaii; marks his second multiple-win season (other: 2016-17/three wins)
- Wins in his ninth start in the Sony Open in Hawaii and marks first top-10 (previous: T12/2020)
- Sets personal-best 54-hole score (194) and 72-hole score (257)
- Closes with 63-63—126, his career-low closing 36-hole score
- Becomes first player to win a playoff with an eagle since J.J. Henry/2015 Barracuda Championship
- Records 26 birdies, his second-most in an event (best: 29/2016 WGC-HSBC Champions)
- Led the field with a career-best Strokes Gained: Putting (7.537)

Russell Henley

- Moves to 1-1 playoff record; Is 1-for-6 in converting 54-hole lead/co-leads (2013 Sony Open)
- Was seeking to become sixth multiple winner of the event (Jimmy Walker/2014, 2015; Ernie Els/2003, 2004; Lanny Wadkins/1988, 1991; Corey Pavin/1986, 1987; Hubert Green/1978, 1979)
- Became first 54-hole leader/co-leader to shoot 29 on opening nine of final round since 2003
- Set personal-best opening 36-hole (125) and 54-hole (192) scores
- Low 72-hole scores have each come in the Sony Open in Hawaii

Miscellaneous Notes

- After going bogey-free for 54 holes for the first time in his career, **Matt Kuchar** (T7) bogeyed No. 5 in the final round, ending a streak of 60 consecutive holes without a bogey on TOUR (58 this week); career-best streak: 62 holes
- Canadian **Adam Svensson** (T7) records his first career top-10 in his 40th TOUR start
- **Kevin Kisner** is the only player to finish in the top 10 in both Hawaii events: Sentry Tournament of Champions/T8, Sony Open in Hawaii/T3
- Defending champion **Kevin Na**, who led after a first-round 61, finished T20
- World No. 1 amateur, **Keita Nakajima**, one of two amateurs in the field and the only one to make the cut, finished 41st in his second PGA TOUR start (first at Sony Open), highlighted by a second-round 64
