# **Things to Know**

- 2014 FedExCup champion Billy Horschel converts a five-stroke lead beginning the final round into his seventh career PGA TOUR title; improves to 3-for-5 when attempting to convert a 54-hole lead/co-lead on TOUR
- Horschel's 52' 10" made putt at the par-5 15th marks his first eagle in 576 holes played at the Memorial Tournament
- Horschel ends the TOUR streak of winners coming from behind in a final round at four, including seven-shot rallies from Justin Thomas (PGA Championship) and Sam Burns (Charles Schwab Challenge)
- Aaron Wise was seeking his second career PGA TOUR title and first since the 2018 AT&T Byron Nelson, where Billy Horschel was defending champion
- Reigning FedExCup Champion and defending Memorial Tournament champion Patrick Cantlay finishes T3 in his bid to join Tiger Woods (2000 and 2001) as players to successfully defend a Memorial Tournament title

- Beginning the day with a five-stroke lead at 13-under 203, closed with an even-par 72, highlighted by a 52' 10" eagle at the par-5 15th, to claim his seventh career PGA TOUR title at the age of 35 years, 5 months, 29 days in his 293rd start
- His four-stroke win marks the largest margin of victory on TOUR since Ryan Brehm won the 2022 Puerto Rico Open in March by six strokes
- The eagle at No. 15 marked his first in 573 holes played in the event to that point and stands as his longest putt made in the event (576 holes)
- Becomes the first player on the TOUR to win with a final-round score of par-or-higher this season since Scottie Scheffler at the Arnold Palmer Invitational (even-par 72)
- Most recent title before this week came at the 2021 WGC-Dell Technologies Match Play; most recent individual strokeplay title came at the 2017 AT&T Byron Nelson
- With the win, collects 550 FedExCup points and moves to No. 10 in the standings
- With the win, is projected to move to No. 8 in the Presidents Cup standings
- Wins in his ninth start at the Memorial Tournament, with his only previous top-10 finish being a T9 in 2019
- Becomes the 11<sup>th</sup> 54-hole leader/co-leader since 2000 to win the Memorial Tournament presented by Workday and
  first since Jon Rahm in 2020; also becomes the 11<sup>th</sup> 54-hole leader/co-leader to convert for the win on TOUR this season
  and first since Rahm at the Mexico Open at Vidanta

- Improves to 3-for-5 when attempting to convert for the win (Won/2014 BMW Championship, Won/2014 TOUR Championship, Won/the Memorial Tournament)
- Played his 11<sup>th</sup> hole in round one through his fifth hole in round four without a bogey or worse (49 holes), coming
  up two shy of his career record
- Win marks his fifth top-10 finish in 15 starts this season: T6/WM Phoenix Open, T2/Arnold Palmer Invitational presented by Mastercard, T9/WGC-Dell Technologies Match Play, 2<sup>nd</sup>/Zurich Classic of New Orleans with partner Sam Burns, 1<sup>st</sup>/the Memorial Tournament presented by Workday

#### **Additional Player Notes**

- Aaron Wise (2<sup>nd</sup>/-9) was seeking his second career TOUR title in his 117th start and first since the 2018 AT&T Byron Nelson, where Billy Horschel was defending champion; missed the cut in his first two Memorial Tournament starts of 2018 and 2019, before claiming T9 honors last year in his third start; runner-up finish this week marks his best of four top-10 finishes this season
- Coming off missed cuts in his last two Memorial Tournament starts of 2020 and 2021, Chile's **Joaquin Niemann** (T3/-7) offset double bogeys at Nos. 14 and 18 with five birdies to close with a 1-under 71; finished T6 in his first start in the event in 2018; marks his fourth top-10 finish of the season and first since claiming his second career TOUR title at the Genesis Invitational in February
- In his attempt to join Tiger Woods (1999-2001) as players to successfully defend a Memorial Tournament title, 2019 and 2021 winner **Patrick Cantlay** closed with a 1-under 71 to finish T3 at 7-under 281
- Sahith Theegala's 1-under 71 in the final round was good for a T5 finish, his second top-5 finish of the season (T3/WM Phoenix Open); finished T32 in his Memorial Tournament debut in 2021
- Second-round leader Cameron Smith (T13/-3) took two double bogeys and four bogeys en route to a final-round
   5-over 77; with seven starts at the Memorial Tournament, marks his most career starts in a tournament (non-major) without a top-10 finish
- En route to a 2-under 70, **Mito Pereira** (T13/-3) used a 3-wood from 273 yards on the par-5 seventh hole to make an albatross; marks the first score of two on a par-5 at the event since 2019 (Shubhankar Sharma/R2) and second albatross on No. 7 (Carlos Franco/1999/R2)
