Things to Know

- Cameron Smith's total of 131 ties the fourth-lowest opening 36-hole score in Open Championship history and is the lowest in an Open Championship at St. Andrews
- With a two-stroke lead over first-round leader Cameron Young, Smith holds the 36-hole lead/co-lead for the second time in a major championship (2020 Masters/shared 36-hole lead with four others before finishing T2) and the fourth time in an individual stroke-play event on TOUR (1-for-3)
- Making his 90th major championship start, three-time Open Championship winner Tiger Woods misses the cut for the fourth time in 22 starts at The Open; 153 is his highest 36-hole score at The Open and third-highest in a major championship
- Rory McIlroy trails by three in bid for fifth major championship win and first since winning the 2014 PGA Championship
- At T3, Viktor Hovland holds his best 36-hole position in a major championship (previous-best was T17)
- World No. 1 and FedExCup leader Scottie Scheffler sits T6 (16th time in last 19 major championship rounds inside the top 10)
- Four of six amateurs in the field made the cut: Barclay Brown, Filippo Celli, Sam Bairstow and Aaron Jarvis
- Collin Morikawa becomes the first defending champion to miss the cut at The Open since Darren Clarke in 2012
- All four past champions at St. Andrews missed the cut: Zach Johnson, Louis Oosthuizen, Tiger Woods and John Daly

- Holds the 36-hole lead at The Open Championship following rounds of 67-64, two clear of Cameron Young
- 131 is the lowest opening 36-hole score in an Open Championship hosted at St. Andrews and ties the fourth-lowest in Open Championship history:

- Holds fourth 36-hole lead/co-lead of his PGA TOUR career (individual stroke-play events); 1-for-3 to date (T2/2020 Masters Tournament, Won/2022 Sentry Tournament of Champions, T13/2022 Memorial Tournament presented by Workday)
- R2 stats: 16 of 18 greens, 12 of 16 fairways, 28 putts
- Hoping to join Jack Nicklaus (1978) as the only players to win THE PLAYERS Championship and The Open Championship in the same year
- Finished T20 in 2019 for the best of his four prior Open Championship starts
- Best finishes in 24 previous major championship starts came at the Masters Tournament (2020/T2, 2022/T3)
- In addition to his win at TPC Sawgrass earlier this season, won the Sentry Tournament of Champions by one stroke over Jon Rahm, posting the most strokes under-par in a 72-hole event on TOUR (34-under)

Tiger Woods (MC/+9)

- Misses the cut for the fourth time in 22 Open Championship starts, including two at St. Andrews (2015, 2022)
- Made the cut in two of three majors in 2022 after not competing on TOUR for 508 days between the 2020 Masters Tournament and 2022 Masters
- 14th missed cut in 90 major championship starts
- 30th missed cut in 371 starts on TOUR
- Total of 153 is his highest 36-hole score at The Open and third-highest in a major championship
- Ties his fifth-highest 36-hole total on TOUR:

Miscellaneous notes

- First-round leader **Cameron Young** (2nd) posts 3-under 69 and falls two shots behind Cameron Smith; in his debut Open Championship start, makes the cut for the second time in sixth major appearances (T3/2022 PGA Championship)
- Rory McIlroy (T3) cards a second-round 4-under 68, his 48th round of 68 or better in major championships (most since 2007); since his win at the 2014 PGA Championship, has accumulated 16 top-10s in majors, the most of any player in that span; is in search of his fifth major championship victory
- **Viktor Hovland** (T3) holed out for eagle from 138 yards on the par-4 15th hole, his first eagle in six rounds at The Open; holds his best 36-hole position in a major championship (previous-best: T17 at the 2020 U.S. Open and 2021 Masters Tournament)
- World No. 1 and FedExCup leader **Scottie Scheffler** (T6) posts second consecutive 68 and trails by five; marks the 16th time in the last 19 major championship rounds he has been inside the top 10 on the leaderboard; is attempting to join 10 players (17 instances) who have won five or more times in a season with multiple majors (most recently Jordan Spieth in 2014-15)
- Genesis Scottish Open champion Xander Schauffele (T18) posts rounds of 69-70 and trails by eight in bid to become the
 first player to win on the PGA TOUR and win a major the following week since Rory McIlroy in 2014 (WGC Bridgestone
 Invitational, PGA Championship)
- **Collin Morikawa** becomes the first defending champion to miss the cut at The Open since Darren Clarke in 2012; the last player to successfully defend at The Open was Padraig Harrington in 2008
