Things to Know

- Rory McIlroy becomes first player to win the FedExCup three times; wins TOUR Championship for 22nd career TOUR title
- McIlroy began the day six strokes back; marks largest final-round comeback in TOUR Championship history
- No. 1 seed Scottie Scheffler ties TOUR record for largest lead lost with 18 holes left to play (6); becomes second No. 1 seed not to go on to win in fourth year of Starting Strokes format (other: 2019/Justin Thomas)
- South Korea's Sungjae Im (T2) records best finish in FedExCup history by a player from Asia
- Max Homa (T5) records the best finish among nine first-time participants in the field

- Wins 22nd PGA TOUR title in 220th career TOUR start at the age of 33 years, 3 months, 24 days
- Wins TOUR Championship for third time (2016, 2019, 2022); ties Tiger Woods for most victories in the event
- Moves to T28 on the all-time PGA TOUR wins list, tied with Jim Barnes, Johnny Farrell and Raymond Floyd
- Becomes first player to win the FedExCup three times (2016, 2019, 2022); the only other player with multiple FedExCup titles is Tiger Woods (2007, 2009)
- Began the final round six strokes off the lead, marking the largest final-round comeback in TOUR Championship history (previous: 5/2008/Camilo Villegas); marks his 12th come-from-behind win on TOUR
- Third largest, come-from-behind victory this season (most: 7 strokes, Justin Thomas/PGA Championship, Sam Burns/Charles Schwab Challenge)
- Third win of the season (THE CJ CUP @ SUMMIT, RBC Canadian Open, TOUR Championship); fourth season on TOUR with three or more wins and first since 2019
- Becomes fifth player with three or more victories this season (others with 3+ victories: Scottie Scheffler/4, Sam Burns/3, Cameron Smith/3, Xander Schauffele/3), the most in a season on TOUR since 2003 (5): Tiger Woods/5, Vijay Singh/4, Davis Love III/4, Kenny Perry/3, Mike Weir/3
- Third-round 63 marked lowest score in 36 rounds at East Lake
- Led the field with 23 birdies, second-most in TOUR Championship history (most: 28/Tiger Woods/2007)

• Ties Dustin Johnson for most wins in the FedExCup Playoffs (6) and moves to second most top-five FedExCup Playoffs finishes (11); most: 13/Dustin Johnson

• Began the week at No. 7 in the FedExCup, at 4-under; Since Starting Strokes was implemented in 2019, McIlroy is the only player, and has done so twice, to come from behind and win

Scottie Scheffler (T2/-20)

- No. 1 seed entered the final round with a six-stroke lead, the largest after any round at the TOUR Championship since 2019
- Ties TOUR record for largest lead lost with 18 holes left to play (6); one of eight players and first since Dustin Johnson at the 2017 World Golf Championships-HSBC Champions
- Moves to 1-for-5 in converting 54-hole lead/co-leads to victory (2022 Masters Tournament)
- Spent 24 of the last 25 weeks at No. 1 in the FedExCup standings; first took over the top spot after winning the Arnold Palmer Invitational presented by Mastercard, fell to No. 2 after Will Zalatoris won the FedEx St. Jude Championship and moved back to No. 1 after a T3 at last week's BMW Championship
- Was attempting to become the third player who entered the FedExCup Playoffs at No. 1 in the FedExCup standings and go on to win the FedExCup: Tiger Woods (2007, 2009) and Jordan Spieth (2015)
- Was attempting to become the fourth player who held the No. 1 position entering the TOUR Championship and go on to win the FedExCup, joining Tiger Woods (2009), Dustin Johnson (2020) and Patrick Cantlay (2021)
- Was attempting to become the fourth World No. 1 (four times) to win the FedExCup: Tiger Woods (2007, 2009), Justin Rose (2018), Dustin Johnson (2020)
- Third consecutive TOUR Championship start (5th/2020, T22/2021, T2/2022)
- During the 2021-22 Regular Season, won four PGA TOUR titles in six-week stretch, including the WM Phoenix Open, Arnold Palmer Invitational presented by Mastercard, WGC-Dell Technologies Match Play and Masters Tournament)
- Was attempting to become the first player since 1947 to win his first five PGA TOUR titles in the same season (others: Bobby Locke/6 wins/1947 and Joe Kirkwood Sr./5 wins/1923)

Miscellaneous Notes

- Sungjae Im (T2) records the best finish by a player from Asia in the FedExCup (previous: 5th/K.J. Choi/2007); marks best performance in his fourth TOUR Championship start (T19/2019, 11th/2020, T20/2021, T2/2022)
- 2017 TOUR Championship winner **Xander Schauffele** (4th) closes with a 69, his 25th consecutive round of par or better at the TOUR Championship in as many attempts, the longest active streak; has finished inside the top 10 in all six starts (Won/2017, T7/2018, 2nd/2019, T2/2020, T5/2021, 4th/2022)
- **Justin Thomas** (T5) extends his record to seven consecutive top-10s finishes at the TOUR Championship, the longest active streak (T6/2016, 2nd/2017, T7/2018, T3/2019, T2/2020, 4th/2021, T5/2022)
- In his first TOUR Championship start, **Max Homa** finishes T5, the best performance among the nine first-time participants in the field; records his career-low score on TOUR with a second-round 62
- Reigning FedExCup Champion **Patrick Cantlay** finishes T7; the best finish by a returning defending FedExCup Champion is 7th (2017/Justin Thomas); he entered the week at No. 2 in the FedExCup, the best position by a defending FedExCup champion (next: 3rd/Tiger Woods/2009); marks his 12th top-10 of the season, the most of any player
- Two PGA TOUR rookies advanced to the TOUR Championship: Cameron Young (19th), Sahith Theegala (28th)
- **Jon Rahm** (T15) ends streak of eight consecutive top-10s in the Playoffs (dating back to the start of the 2019 Playoffs), the longest streak in the FedExCup era; no player finished in the top-10 in all three Playoffs events in 2021-22
