Things to Know

- Joohyung Kim earns his first PGA TOUR title at the Wyndham Championship, joining the PGA TOUR as a full-time member and qualifying for the FedExCup Playoffs (enters the Playoffs at No. 34 in the FedExCup standings)
- At age 20 years, 1 month, 17 days, Kim is the second-youngest winner on the PGA TOUR since World War II (youngest: Jordan Spieth, 2013 John Deere Classic) and the first player born in the 2000s to win on TOUR
- Kim made a quadruple bogey on his first hole of the tournament (No. 1 in R1); he is the first player on record (since 1983) to make a quadruple bogey or worse on the first hole of an event and go on to win and the fifth to record such a score on any hole and go on to win
- Kim joined the PGA TOUR as a Special Temporary Member after The Open Championship and is the first Special Temporary Member to win on TOUR since Collin Morikawa at the 2019 Barracuda Championship
- Kim’s front-nine 27 ties the second-lowest nine-hole score in PGA TOUR history (15th instance of 27 or lower) and his final-round 61 ties the fifth-lowest final-round score by a winner on record (since 1983)
- Sungjae Im finishes in a two-way tie for second place and moves to No. 10 in the FedExCup standings, earning \$1 million through the Comcast Business TOUR TOP 10
- Rookie Max McGreevy, who entered the week No. 126 in the FedExCup standings, finishes T5 to play his way into the FedExCup Playoffs; Kim and McGreevy replace Matt Wallace (entered No. 124/MC) and Austin Smotherman (entered No. 125/MC) in the top 125

- **Becomes a full-time member of the PGA TOUR**
 - Earns first PGA TOUR title in the finale of the FedExCup Regular Season and becomes a full-time member of the PGA TOUR
 - Appears in the FedExCup standings for the first time (No. 34) now that he is a full-time member and is eligible for the FedExCup Playoffs
 - Has 917 FedExCup points (500 for the win + 417 earned in non-World Golf Championships events prior to the win)
 - Fully exempt on the PGA TOUR through the 2023-24 season
 - Earns a spot in the following events during the 2022-23 season (in order of play; **majors** in bold): Sentry Tournament of Champions, The American Express, The Genesis Invitational, Arnold Palmer Invitational presented

by Mastercard, THE PLAYERS Championship, **Masters Tournament**, RBC Heritage, **PGA Championship**, Charles Schwab Challenge, the Memorial Tournament presented by Workday)

- Eligible for the 2022 Arnold Palmer Award as PGA TOUR Rookie of the Year

- **Second-youngest PGA TOUR winner since World War II**

- **Made a quadruple bogey on the first hole in the first round**

- First player since the PGA TOUR began tracking hole-by-hole data in 1983 to make a quadruple bogey or worse on the first hole of an event and go on to win
- Fifth player since the PGA TOUR began tracking hole-by-hole data in 1983 to make a quadruple bogey or worse on any hole in any round and go on to win

- Went on to shoot a 3-under 67 in the first round, becoming the third player in the ShotLink era (est. 2003) to make a quadruple bogey or worse on the first hole of a round and go on to card an under-par score

- **Wins as Special Temporary Member**

- Fourth player to win as Special Temporary Member in the last 10 seasons; the previous three have combined to win six major championships (all three have won The Open Championship)

- **Cards final-round 61, including a 27 on the front nine**

- Ties the fourth-lowest final-round score by a winner on record (since 1983)

- Ties the second-lowest nine-hole score in PGA TOUR history (lowest: Corey Pavin, 2006 U.S. Bank Championship)
- 15th nine-hole score of 27 or better on TOUR and first since Dustin Johnson at the 2020 FedEx St. Jude Championship
- Second score of 27 on the front nine at Sedgefield Country Club (first: Brandt Snedeker, R1, 2018 Wyndham Championship)
- Played Nos. 2-6 in 6-under (B-B-B-E-B), the 12th birdie/eagle streak of 6-under or better this season and first since Trey Mullinax and Sebastian Munoz did so in the first round of the AT&T Byron Nelson

- **Ninth Korean to win on TOUR**

- Ninth Korean to win on TOUR and 22nd victory by a Korean on TOUR

- Third Korean to win on TOUR this season, joining Sungjae Im (Shriners Children's Open) and K.H. Lee (AT&T Byron Nelson)
- Seeking to make the International Team at the 2022 Presidents Cup in September; at No. 21 in the Official World Golf Ranking, is the fifth-highest ranked player from a country outside the United States and Europe
- **Wins by five strokes over Sungjae Im and John Huh**
 - Ties the second-largest margin of victory on TOUR this season (largest: 6, Ryan Brehm, Puerto Rico Open)
 - Second consecutive week on TOUR with a margin of victory of five strokes or more (Tony Finau won last week's Rocket Mortgage Classic by five)
 - The last time back-to-back PGA TOUR events were decided by five strokes or more was during the 2017-18 season (3 straight: Francesco Molinari won the Quicken Loans National by 8, Kevin Na won the Greenbrier Classic by 5, Michael Kim won the John Deere Classic by 8)

Miscellaneous notes

- 54-hole leader **Sungjae Im** (T2/-15) moves to No. 10 in the FedExCup standings, earning \$1 million through the Comcast Business TOUR TOP 10; two-way T2 is the worst Im could have finished and still moved into the top 10 (3-way T2 or solo-third would not have been enough)
- **John Huh** (T2/-15) earns his second career runner-up and first since 2012 Valero Texas Open (went on to win PGA TOUR Rookie of the Year)
- **Ben Griffin**, competing on a sponsor exemption, finishes solo-fourth in his fourth career PGA TOUR start; Griffin entered the week No. 5 in the Korn Ferry Tour points list and will join the PGA TOUR as a rookie at the start of the 2022-23 season
- Rookie **Max McGreevy** finishes T5, moving from No. 126 to No. 104 in the FedExCup; McGreevy earned his second top-10 of the season and first since the Puerto Rico Open (2nd)
- **Matt Wallace** (entered No. 124/MC) and rookie **Austin Smotherman** (entered No. 125/MC) fall out of the top 125 and miss the FedExCup Playoffs; Smotherman made double bogey on his last hole in the second round to miss the cut by two strokes
