Five Things to Know: 2023 Korn Ferry Tour Season

Things to Know

- The 2023 Korn Ferry Tour season continues with the fifth playing of the LECOM Suncoast Classic, hosted by Lakewood National Golf Club's Commander course since its inaugural playing in 2019, is the eighth tournament of the 26-event schedule
- The LECOM Suncoast Classic is one of five events being contested in a different month as part of the revamped Korn Ferry Tour schedule (more details outlined below)
 - LECOM Suncoast Classic moved from mid-February to mid-April
 - NV5 Invitational presented by Old National Bank moved from late May to late July
 - o Simmons Bank Open for the Snedeker Foundation moved from early May to mid-September
 - o Nationwide Children's Hospital Championship -- moved from late August to late September
 - Korn Ferry Tour Championship presented by United Leasing & Finance moved from early September to early October
- All four past champions of the LECOM Suncoast Classic Byeong Hun An (2022), Hayden Buckley (2021), Andrew Novak (2020), Mark Hubbard (2019) – are PGA TOUR members this season
 - Buckley enters the week at No. 33 in the 2022-23 FedExCup Standings, while An checks in at No.
 61, followed by Hubbard at No. 83 and Novak at No. 93
- All five players who finished T2 or higher, and another four players who finished T14 or higher at last year's LECOM Suncoast Classic earned PGA TOUR cards at season's end
 - Byeong Hun An (Winner), MJ Daffue (T2), Ben Griffin (T2), Scott Harrington (T2), S.H. Kim (T2),
 Will Gordon (T6), Nicholas Lindheim (T6), Eric Cole (T14), Paul Haley II (T14)
- Nine members in this week's field played collegiately in Florida:
 - University of Florida (4) A.J. Crouch, Alejandro Tosti, Camilo Villegas, T.J. Vogel
 - o Florida State University (2) Cristobal Del Solar, Chase Seiffert
 - o Florida Atlantic University (1) Ben Silverman
 - Florida Gulf Coast University (1) Frankie Capan III
 - o Florida Southern College (1) John VanDerLaan
- Players in the field with ties to the greater Tampa, Florida area are Jimmy Stanger and Jackson Suber (both Tampa natives and residents)
- A number of changes to the Korn Ferry Tour <u>announced this past June</u> will be implemented for the first time this season, with the most notable changes being:
 - o Increase from 25 to 30 PGA TOUR cards annually awarded via the Korn Ferry Tour Points List
 - Reimagining of the Korn Ferry Tour Finals
 - Previous Finals System: Three-event competition for 25 PGA TOUR cards between the top 75 from the Korn Ferry Tour Points List and Nos. 126-200 on the FedExCup standings

- 2023 and Beyond Finals System: Final four events of the season where members will compete for increased purses and points (600 points for winning one of the four Finals events, compared to 500 for winning one of the 22 preceding events) to determine the season-long points race, in addition to a progressive reduction in field sizes
 - ➤ Albertsons Boise Open presented by Chevron (August 24-27) 156 players
 - ➤ Simmons Bank Open for the Snedeker Foundation (September 14-17) 144 players
 - ➤ Nationwide Children's Hospital Championship (September 21-24) 120 players
 - Korn Ferry Tour Championship presented by United Leasing & Finance (October 5-8) – 75 players [no cut]
- One season-long Korn Ferry Tour Points List as opposed to separate points lists for the regular season and Korn Ferry Tour Finals
- Purses increasing to \$1.5 million for the four Korn Ferry Tour Finals events and \$1 million for the
 22 preceding events, with the \$28 million season purse representing the highest single-season
 total in Korn Ferry Tour history

Field Notes (as of 4/18/23)

- Field includes 45 Korn Ferry Tour winners with 66 total wins, including all seven winners from the 2023 season (Pierceson Coody, Rhein Gibson, Ben Kohles, Spencer Levin, Chandler Phillips, Ben Silverman, David Skinns) and six winners from 2022 (Coody, Brandon Harkins, David Kocher, Andrew Kozan, T.J. Vogel, Norman Xiong)
- Field includes six PGA TOUR winners with 14 total wins, led by **Chad Campbell** and **Camilo Villegas** with four apiece
- Field includes two players currently inside top 200 of the Official World Golf Ranking: **Pierceson Coody** (No. 158) and **Kaito Onishi** (No. 196)
- This week's eight open qualifiers include Lakewood Ranch resident and Saint Stephen's Episcopal School senior Beni Long, who carded an 8-under 64 and played his final 12 holes at 8-under par as he earned his first Korn Ferry Tour start; he signed a National Letter of Intent with University of Kansas (Class of 2023)

- Byeong Hun An earned his first PGA TOUR-sanctioned victory as he drained a 55-foot birdie putt at the par-4 16th, the toughest hole of the final round, and salvaged a bogey on the 72nd hole
- Outright 54-hole leader **Michael Gellerman** (T6) birdied the par-3 17th and moved into a tie for the lead, but four-putted the 72nd hole for double bogey
- MJ Daffue and Ben Griffin both had potential playoff-forcing birdie putts run by the edge of the cup on the 72nd hole
- S.H. Kim and Scott Harrington were one and two strokes, respectively, off the low round of the final round en route to runner-up finishes
- Playing as a sponsor exemption with conditional membership, Philip Knowles (T22) chipped in for birdie
 on the 72nd hole and recorded a top-25 in his first career made cut, which earned him a place in the
 reshuffle and allowed him to climb the priority ranking; he went on to earn his first PGA TOUR card via the
 2022 Korn Ferry Tour Finals

- **Spencer Levin** capped a bogey-free 8-under 63 in the final round with a birdie on the 72 hole, the par-5 18th, earning his first PGA TOUR-sanctioned win in his 343rd TOUR-sanctioned start
- Levin, a conditional member who successfully open qualified into the field last Monday, became the 26 open qualifier in Korn Ferry Tour history who went on to win the tournament; the most recent was Norman Xiong at the 2022 Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Kansas Wichita Open Benefitting KU Wichita Pediatrics
- Levin joined Chandler Phillips (The Bahamas Great Exuma Classic at Sandals Emerald Bay) as the second first-time winner this season
- **Brett Drewitt** became the fourth player in Korn Ferry Tour history to record five top-10s in the first seven events of the season, joining Deane Pappas (1998), Stewart Cink (1996), and Sean Pacetti (1990)
- Drewitt carried a five-stroke lead into the final round and became the first player who failed to convert a 54-hole lead of five-plus strokes into a win since Kevin Chappell at the 2010 Ford Wayne Gretzky Classic presented by Samsung
- Prior to this past Sunday, the last 15 leads of five-plus strokes through 54 holes of a Korn Ferry Tour event were converted into wins
- Drewitt had three bogeys in 72 holes last week all of them came in the final round (Nos. 3, 10, 17); he made two fewer bogeys than any player in the field
- **Rico Hoey** tied his career-high finish (T3/2023 Astara Chile Classic) in his 79th career Korn Ferry Tour start and logged his fourth top-10 of the season; he entered 2023 with four top-10s in 72 career starts
- Patrick Fishburn, who finished No. 49 on the 2022 Korn Ferry Tour Points List, snapped a streak of five consecutive missed cuts with his first top-10 since a career-high finish (T2) at the 2022 Utah Championship presented by Zions Bank; the T3 marked the second-highest finish of his career
- Conditional member Cole Hammer (T21/-11), who played last week via a sponsor exemption, followed bogeys on Nos. 15 and 16 with back-to-back birdies on Nos. 17 and 18 converted his first made cut in his second start of the season into a top-25, earning him a spot in this week's LECOM Suncoast Classic; he was the 12th alternate for the LECOM Suncoast Classic prior to his top-25
