Five Things to Know: 2023 Korn Ferry Tour Season

Things to Know

- The Visit Knoxville Open marks the 11th tournament of the Korn Ferry Tour's 26-event schedule
- This week will be the 33rd edition of the Visit Knoxville Open, one of four tournaments on the 2023 Korn Ferry Tour schedule held every season since the Tour's establishment in 1990
 - The other three events with such distinction are the Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Kansas Wichita
 Open Benefitting KU Wichita Pediatrics, Price Cutter Charity Championship presented by Dr
 Pepper, and the Albertsons Boise Open presented by Chevron
- Historic Holston Hills Country Club, a Donald Ross design which opened in 1927, is hosting the Visit Knoxville Open for a third consecutive year
- Three-time PGA TOUR winner and Knoxville resident Scott Stallings plays and practices at Holston Hills
- Notable past champions of the Visit Knoxville Open include five-time PGA TOUR winner Chris Kirk (2010) and PGA TOUR winner and Knoxville resident Peter Malnati (2013)
- Four-time PGA TOUR winner **Heath Slocum**, winner of the 2001 Visit Knoxville Open, is the only past champion in the field this week
- Reigning champion Anders Albertson eventually finished No. 25 on the 2022 Korn Ferry Tour Points List and secured a return to the PGA TOUR
- Four of the top five players from last year's Visit Knoxville Open earned PGA TOUR cards at season's end
 - o Anders Albertson (Winner), Carl Yuan (2nd), MJ Daffue (3rd), Taylor Montgomery (T4)
- **John Augenstein** (Vanderbilt University) and **Dawson Armstrong** (Lipscomb University) played collegiately in the state of Tennessee
- University of Tennessee's Jake Hall and Caleb Surratt both Monday qualified into the field
- Players in the field with ties to the state of Tennessee include Dawson Armstrong (plays from Brentwood), Grant Hirschman (Memphis native), Wes Roach (Knoxville native and resident), and Scott Stevens (plays from Chattanooga)
- A number of changes to the Korn Ferry Tour <u>announced this past June</u> will be implemented for the first time this season, with the most notable changes being:
 - o Increase from 25 to 30 PGA TOUR cards annually awarded via the Korn Ferry Tour Points List
 - Reimagining of the Korn Ferry Tour Finals
 - Previous Finals System: Three-event competition for 25 PGA TOUR cards between the top 75 from the Korn Ferry Tour Points List and Nos. 126-200 on the FedExCup standings
 - 2023 and Beyond Finals System: Final four events of the season where members will compete for increased purses and points (600 points for winning one of the four Finals events, compared to 500 for winning one of the 22 preceding events) to determine the season-long points race, in addition to a progressive reduction in field sizes

- ➤ Albertsons Boise Open presented by Chevron (August 24-27) 156 players
- ➤ Simmons Bank Open for the Snedeker Foundation (September 14-17) 144 players
- Nationwide Children's Hospital Championship (September 21-24) 120 players
- Korn Ferry Tour Championship presented by United Leasing & Finance (October 5-8) – 75 players [no cut]
- One season-long Korn Ferry Tour Points List as opposed to separate points lists for the regular season and Korn Ferry Tour Finals
- Purses increasing to \$1.5 million for the four Korn Ferry Tour Finals events and \$1 million for the
 22 preceding events, with the \$28 million season purse representing the highest single-season
 total in Korn Ferry Tour history

Field Notes (as of 5/22/2023)

- Field features 44 of the top 50 players on the Korn Ferry Tour Points List
- Five of this season's winners are in the field: **Ben Kohles** (two wins), **Rhein Gibson**, **Spencer Levin**, **Grayson Murray**, **Chandler Phillips**
- Field includes 42 Korn Ferry Tour winners with 60 total victories, led by Ben Kohles with four
- Field Includes nine PGA TOUR winners with 22 total victories, led by Mark Wilson with five
- Two players in the field are currently inside the top 200 of the Official World Golf Ranking: Yuto Katsuragawa (No. 171) and Ben Kohles (No. 194)

- Anders Albertson led or co-led after every round en route to his second career Korn Ferry Tour victory and first since 2018, which led to him securing a PGA TOUR card at season's end
- Albertson trailed by two strokes with five holes left in the final round before back-to-back birdies at Nos. 14 and 15, along with a two-putt birdie for the win at the par-5 18th
- Albertson made one bogey the entire week (at the par-3 11th in the second round), the fewest in the field
- Carl Yuan carded a career-low 8-under 62 in the third round and finished the week with 24 birdies, two
 more total birdies than anyone in the field
- Yuan led by two strokes through 13 holes of the final round, but settled for one of his three runner-up finishes which helped secure his first PGA TOUR card at season's end
- MJ Daffue shared the 36-hole lead but settled for one of his seven top-10s which propelled him to his first PGA TOUR card at season's end
- Taylor Montgomery carded four rounds in the 60s, highlighted by a 7-under 63 in the third round for one of his nine top-10s of the season and eventually earned his first PGA TOUR card at season's end

- **Grayson Murray**, a previous winner on both the PGA TOUR and Korn Ferry Tour, double bogeyed the 72nd hole but held on for a one-stroke victory, his first Korn Ferry Tour win since the 2016 Nationwide Children's Hospital Championship
- Rookie Wilson Furr, the outright 54-hole leader who held at least a share of the lead after each round this
 week, followed his first career top-25 (T7/HomeTown Lenders Championship) with another career-high
 finish; he set the tournament course record earlier in the week with a 9-under 63 in the first round and
 posted the lowest 54-hole score (17-under 199) by two strokes in the four times this event has been
 played since its relocation to Blue Hills Country Club in 2019
- Rico Hoey played his final seven holes in 3-under par to record a career-high finish in his 82nd career start on the Korn Ferry Tour, as well as his fifth top-10 in 10 starts this season; his previous career-high finish on Tour was T3 on two occasions (2023 Veritex Bank Championship, 2023 Astara Chile Classic), and he entered the 2023 season with four top-10s in 72 career starts on Tour
- Rookie **Alejandro Tosti** birdied the 72nd hole and rose to a career-high finish, as well as his third top-10 in nine starts this season (T10/Veritex Bank Championship; T7/Astara Chile Classic)
- Rookie and Monday qualifier Parker Coody (T5/-14) tied Logan McAllister (T9/-12) for the low round Sunday, a 7-under 65, and posted his first top-25 in his sixth start of the season, which earned him a spot in this week's field
- Jake Knapp (T9/-12) closed with a bogey-free 4-under 68 for his fourth top-10 in nine starts this season; he entered the 2023 season with one top-10 in his previous 36 career starts on the Korn Ferry Tour (all in 2020-21 season)
