• Five Things to Know: 2023 Korn Ferry Tour Season

Things to Know

- The Blue Cross & Blue Shield of Kansas Wichita Open Benefitting KU Wichita Pediatrics is one of four tournaments played every season since the Korn Ferry Tour's inaugural 1990 season, with this year marking the 34th playing of the event
 - The other three events with such distinction are the Visit Knoxville Open, Price Cutter Charity
 Championship presented by Dr Pepper, and Albertsons Boise Open presented by Chevron
 - Only the Blue Cross & Blue Shield of Kansas Wichita Open, Price Cutter Charity Championship, and Albertsons Boise Open are set to enter their 34th playing, as the Visit Knoxville Open was only contested once (2021) amid the 2020-21 combined season
- This will be the event's 23rd consecutive year at Crestview Country Club
- Notable past champions of the Blue Cross & Blue Shield of Kansas Wichita Open Benefitting KU Wichita Pediatrics include Tom Lehman (1990) and David Duval (1993), who were both World No. 1s during their careers and won the 1996 and 2001 Open Championship, respectively
- Major championship winners David Toms (1995) and Jason Dufner (2001) also won in Wichita; Toms went on to win the 2001 PGA Championship, while Dufner won the 2013 PGA Championship
- Four past champions of the event are in the field this week: reigning champion **Norman Xiong** (2022), **Jared Wolfe** (2020), **Ollie Schniederjans** (2016), and **Rob Oppenheim** (2015)
- Xiong is bidding to join Brad Elder (1999, 2007) as the only other two-time champion of the Blue Cross & Blue Shield of Kansas Wichita Open Benefitting KU Wichita Pediatrics
- Xiong won last year's Blue Cross & Blue Shield of Kansas Wichita Open as a Monday qualifier, becoming the 25th open qualifier in Korn Ferry Tour history to win the tournament for which they open qualified
- Even with a double bogey on the 72nd hole, Xiong won by five strokes at 26-under 254, the second-lowest 72-hole score in Korn Ferry Tour history, only behind Stephan Jaeger's 30-under 250 from the 2016 Ellie Mae Classic at TPC Stonebrae
- Xiong's five-stroke margin of victory tied Aaron Wise's tournament record from 2017; Wise went on to earn 2017-18 PGA TOUR Rookie of the Year honors
- Six of the 10 players who finished T8 or higher in last year's event earned a PGA TOUR card at season's end: Kevin Roy (2nd), Kevin Yu (3rd), Tyson Alexander (T4), Augusto Núñez (6th), Kyle Westmoreland (7th), and Vincent Norrman (T8)
- Adrien Dumont de Chassart, who finished No. 3 in the 2023 PGA TOUR University Ranking to earn Korn Ferry Tour membership for the remainder of the season, won his Korn Ferry Tour and professional debut at last week's BMW Charity Pro-Am presented by TD SYNNEX

Field Notes (as of 6/13/2023)

- Eight champions from the first 13 events of the 2023 season are in this week's field:
 - Pierceson Coody, Adrien Dumont de Chassart, Jorge Fernández Valdés, Rhein Gibson, Scott Gutschewski, Rico Hoey, Spencer Levin, Chandler Phillips
- Field includes 37 Korn Ferry Tour winners with 51 total victories, led by **Daniel Chopra, Tommy Gainey**, and **Scott Gutschewski** with three apiece
- Field includes six PGA TOUR winners with nine total victories
- Field includes two players currently inside top 200 of the Official World Golf Ranking: **Pierceson Coody** (No. 154) and **Rico Hoey** (No. 158)
- Korn Ferry Tour members in the field with ties to the state of Kansas include Wade Binfield (plays from Overland Park), sponsor exemption Jeremy Gandon (played collegiately at Kansas State), Michael Gellerman (plays from Sterling), and Joseph Winslow (Overland Park native and resident)
- Open qualifier Cooper Schultz recently completed his third season at Kansas State and will compete as an amateur this week

PGA TOUR University Class of 2023

- Seven of the top nine finishers from the 2023 PGA TOUR University Ranking are in the field this week:
 - o No. 2 Fred Biondi (Florida) won individual and team national titles at 2023 NCAA Championship
 - No. 3 Adrien Dumont de Chassart (Illinois) won Korn Ferry Tour and professional debut
 - o No. 4 Ross Steelman (Georgia Tech) individual and team runner-up at 2023 NCAA Championship
 - No. 6 William Mouw (Pepperdine)
 - No. 7 Ryan Burnett (North Carolina)
 - No. 8 Patrick Welch (Oklahoma)
 - No. 9 Ricky Castillo (Florida)
- Five of those seven made their professional and Korn Ferry Tour debuts last week at the BMW Charity Pro-Am presented by TD SYNNEX: Dumont de Chassart (Win), Burnett (T11), Biondi (T31), Mouw (T41), Welch (missed cut)
- Steelman and Castillo are making their professional and Korn Ferry Tour debuts this week
- The top five finishers from the 2023 PGA TOUR University Ranking earned fully exempt status on the Korn Ferry Tour through the 2023 Korn Ferry Tour Finals (which grants entry to its field based off the Korn Ferry Tour Points List), as well as an exemption to Final Stage of 2023 PGA TOUR Q-School presented by Korn Ferry – where the top five finishers and ties earn PGA TOUR cards – and the ability to accept unlimited PGA TOUR sponsor exemptions for the remainder of 2023 and 2024
- Finishers Nos. 6-10 from the 2023 PGA TOUR University Ranking earned conditional status for the remainder of the 2023 Korn Ferry Tour season, as well as fully exempt status for the 2023 PGA TOUR Canada season, an exemption to Second Stage of 2023 PGA TOUR Q-School presented by Korn Ferry, and exempt status through the Latin America Swing of the 2024 PGA TOUR Americas season
- For all events prior to the Korn Ferry Tour Finals, the PGA TOUR University category on the Korn Ferry
 Tour Priority Ranking will be filled by five players to a floor of the No. 10 finisher from the 2023 PGA TOUR
 University Priority Ranking
 - Example: No. 3 Adrien Dumont de Chassart now plays out of the Tournament Winners category, meaning his place in the PGA TOUR University category will be filled by No. 6 William Mouw
 - Additional Example: If No. 2 Fred Biondi records a top-25, he would play the next tournament out
 of the Top-25 Previous Event category, meaning his place in the PGA TOUR University category
 would be filled by No. 7 Ryan Burnett (since No. 6 will already be in field via previous example)

2023 Korn Ferry Tour Season

- A number of changes to the Korn Ferry Tour <u>announced this past June</u> will be implemented for the first time this season, with the most notable changes being:
 - o Increase from 25 to 30 PGA TOUR cards annually awarded via the Korn Ferry Tour Points List
 - Reimagining of the Korn Ferry Tour Finals

- Previous Finals System: Three-event competition for 25 PGA TOUR cards between the top 75 from the Korn Ferry Tour Points List and Nos. 126-200 on the FedExCup standings
- 2023 and Beyond Finals System: Final four events of the season where members will compete for increased purses and points (600 points for winning one of the four Finals events, compared to 500 for winning one of the 22 preceding events) to determine the season-long points race, in addition to a progressive reduction in field sizes
 - ➤ Albertsons Boise Open presented by Chevron (August 24-27) 156 players
 - ➤ Simmons Bank Open for the Snedeker Foundation (September 14-17) 144 players
 - ➤ Nationwide Children's Hospital Championship (September 21-24) 120 players
 - Korn Ferry Tour Championship presented by United Leasing & Finance (October 5-8) – 75 players [no cut]
- One season-long Korn Ferry Tour Points List as opposed to separate points lists for the regular season and Korn Ferry Tour Finals
- Purses increasing to \$1.5 million for the four Korn Ferry Tour Finals events and \$1 million for the 22 preceding events, with the \$28 million season purse representing the highest single-season total in Korn Ferry Tour history

- **Norman Xiong** finished five strokes clear of runner-up Kevin Roy, who tied the previous 72-hole tournament scoring record of 21-under 259 set by Aaron Wise in 2017
- Roy recorded a career-high finish and earned his first PGA TOUR card at season's end
- Kevin Yu recorded his second consecutive top-five finish at the Blue Cross & Blue Shield of Kansas Wichita Open and went on to earn a PGA TOUR card at season's end
- **Pierceson Coody**, who became a Korn Ferry Tour member after finishing No. 1 in the PGA TOUR University Class of 2022, logged a top-five finish in his second career start; he won in Maine the following week
- Justin Suh broke the course record and 18-hole tournament scoring record with a final-round 10-under 60; he went on to finish No. 1 on the 2022 Korn Ferry Tour Points List, which notably earned him an exemption for this week's U.S. Open at The Los Angeles Country Club

- Adrien Dumont de Chassart saved par on the first hole of a sudden-death playoff and defeated 44-yearold Josh Teater to win his professional and Korn Ferry Tour debut
- Dumont de Chassart's final-round 65 included a birdie-birdie-eagle stretch on the back nine (Nos. 13-16); he bogeyed the 72nd hole to fall into a playoff with Teater
- Dumont de Chassart became the fourth PGA TOUR University alum to win on the Korn Ferry Tour, joining **Pierceson Coody** (two wins), Davis Thompson, and Trevor Werbylo
- Off the strength of a season-low 7-under 64 in the third round, Brandon Crick logged his first top-25 since
 June 2022 and the third top-10 of his career (2nd/2019 Ellie Mae Classic at TPC Stonebrae; T10/2020 Korn
 Ferry Challenge at TPC Sawgrass)
