TOP STORYLINES

Established in 1904, the RBC Canadian Open is the second-oldest non-major on the PGA TOUR schedule behind the BMW Championship (1899). Oakdale Golf & Country Club hosts the tournament for the first time in 2023 and becomes the first new venue for the RBC Canadian Open since Angus Glen Golf Club in 2002.

Reigning FedExCup Champion **Rory McIlroy** is the two-time defending champion of the RBC Canadian Open after victories in 2019 and 2022 (tournament not held in 2020 and 2021 due to COVID-19). The last player to earn three consecutive wins at a tournament was Steve Stricker at the John Deere Classic in 2009, 2010 and 2011. Only three players (eight instances) have accomplished the feat in the last 40 years.

Three of the eight active Canadian PGA TOUR members have won this season, the most in a single season in TOUR history: **Mackenzie Hughes** (Sanderson Farms Championship), **Adam Svensson** (The RSM Classic), **Corey Conners** (Valero Texas Open). Since the inception of the FedExCup in 2007, there has not been a year in which multiple Canadians advanced to the TOUR Championship, and entering the week, the highest-ranked Canadians in the FedExCup are Conners (No. 27), Nick Taylor (No. 32), Svensson (No. 33) and Hughes (No. 34). 14 players from Canada are credited with PGA TOUR wins (37 total), led by George Knudson and Mike Weir with eight each. The last Canadian to win the RBC Canadian Open was Pat Fletcher in 1954 (not recognized as an official PGA TOUR win).

The low Canadian professional at the RBC Canadian Open is awarded the Rivermead Cup. Corey Conners won the Rivermead Cup with a solo-sixth in 2022. A Canadian player has finished in the top 10 the last three times the event has been played:

After finishing No. 1 in the 2023 PGA TOUR University Ranking, Texas Tech's **Ludvig Aberg** became the first player to earn a PGA TOUR card via PGA TOUR University and will make his first start as a TOUR member at the RBC Canadian Open. Aberg, who joined Jon Rahm (2015, 2016) as the only players to win the Ben Hogan Award in multiple years (2022, 2023), earned PGA TOUR membership for the remainder of the 2022-23 season and all of the 2024 season.

ADDITIONAL STORYLINES

Matt Fitzpatrick, who won the RBC Heritage earlier this season, finished T10 at the 2022 RBC Canadian Open and went on to win his first major championship title at the following week's U.S. Open. Fitzpatrick, the second-highest ranked player in the field at No. 8 in the Official World Golf Ranking, is one of two players in the field that finished in the top 10 at last week's Memorial Tournament presented by Workday (T9; Rory McIlroy/T7).

RBC ambassador **Sam Burns** finished T4 at the RBC Canadian Open in his tournament debut. Burns earned his fifth career PGA TOUR title earlier this season at the WGC-Dell Technologies Match Play and enters the week No. 12 FedExCup standings.

11-time PGA TOUR winner **Justin Rose** is making his fifth start at the RBC Canadian Open and just his second in the FedExCup era, following a T4 in 2022. Last year, Rose made a bogey at the 18th hole in the final round to card a 60, his career-low score on the PGA TOUR. Rose won the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am in February, snapping a winless drought of 1,471 days (first win since the 2019 Farmers Insurance Open).

2013 RBC Canadian Open champion **Brandt Snedeker** is making his third start of the season. Snedeker finished T41 at last week's Memorial Tournament presented by Workday, his first start on TOUR since the 2022 Fortinet Championship, after undergoing surgery on his chest.

Sam Bennett, who made his professional debut at last week's Memorial Tournament presented by Workday and finished solo-63rd, is competing on a sponsor exemption. Bennett, the reigning U.S. Amateur champion, played in the final group on Saturday at the 2023 Masters Tournament and went on to finish T16. He finished No. 5 in the final PGA TOUR University ranking and is exempt on the Korn Ferry Tour for the remainder of the season.

Michael Thorbjornsen, who just completed his junior year at Stanford University, is competing on a sponsor exemption. Thorbjornsen finished solo-fourth at the 2022 Travelers Championship, the only top-five result by an amateur on the PGA TOUR since Braden Thornberry at the 2017 FedEx St. Jude Classic. Thorbjornsen qualified for the U.S. Open on Monday via Final Qualifying and will make his third start in the U.S. Open (79th/2019, MC/2022).
