Things to Know

- Tom Kim defeats Patrick Cantlay and Matthew NeSmith by three strokes to win the 2022 Shriners Children's Open
- With wins at the Wyndham Championship and Shriners Children's Open, Kim becomes the first player since Tiger Woods to win twice on the PGA TOUR before turning 21
- At 24-under 260, Kim ties the record for the low-winning score since TPC Summerlin moved to a par-71 layout in 2009
- Kim becomes the first TOUR winner without a bogey over 72 holes since J.T. Poston at the 2019 Wyndham Championship
- Cantlay has a win (2017), three runner-up finishes (2018, 2019, 2022) and a T8 (2020) in five starts at the event
- NeSmith finishes a career-best runner-up, including a final-round 66 (his 16th score in the 60s in as many attempts at the Shriners Children's Open)

- Third-round co-leader picks up his second win in his last four starts on the PGA TOUR; win comes in his 18th TOUR start at the age of 20 years, 3 months, 18 days
- With wins at the Wyndham Championship and Shriners Children's Open, becomes the first player since Tiger Woods to win twice on the PGA TOUR before turning 21 (Woods' first two wins: 1996 Shriners Children's Open, 1996 Walt Disney World/Oldsmobile Classic); is the only player born in the 2000s to win on TOUR
- At 20-under 264, ties the record for the low-winning score at the Shriners Children's Open since TPC Summerlin moved to a par-71 layout in 2009 (Sungjae Im/2021, Webb Simpson/2013, Ryan Moore/2012)
- Wins in his debut appearance at the Shriners Children's Open, the first to do so since Patrick Cantlay in 2017
- Becomes the first TOUR winner to play 72 holes without a bogey since J.T. Poston at the 2019 Wyndham Championship
- First player to play 72 holes without a bogey or worse on TOUR since Joaquin Niemann (2021 Rocket Mortgage Classic)
- Including Sunday's 5-under 66, has par-or-better scores in the final round in all 15 made cuts on TOUR
- Wins in his first attempt on TOUR with the 54-hole lead/co-lead
- One of nine Koreans to win on TOUR (23 wins)
- Led the field in Scrambling (9-of-9)

Patrick Cantlay (T2/-21)

- Eight-time TOUR winner entered the par-4 18th tied with Tom Kim at 24-under, but his errant drive led to a triple-bogey
- Finishes runner-up for the ninth time on TOUR, including three times at the Shriners Children's Open (2018, 2019, 2022); also has a win (2017) and T8 (2020) in five starts at the event
- Falls to 3-for-5 when holding the 54-hole lead/co-lead and 0-for-2 at the Shriners Children's Open

Miscellaneous notes

- **Matthew NeSmith** (T2/-21) posts final-round 5-under 66 for his 16th consecutive round in the 60s at the event; has finished inside the top 20 in all four starts at TPC Summerlin (T18/2019, T8/2020, T14/2021, T2/2022); tops his previous-best finish on TOUR at the 2022 Valspar Championship (T3)
- First-round leader **Tom Hoge** (T4/-20) cards final-round 7-under 64 to finish four strokes behind Kim; falls to 1-for-9 when holding the 18-hole lead/co-lead (2022 AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am)
- Defending champion **Sungjae Im** (7th/-19) records final-round 4-under 67, his 15th consecutive under-par score at TPC Summerlin; Jim Furyk (1999) remains the only player to successfully defend a title at the Shriners Children's Open
- **Jason Day** (T8/-18) closes with an 8-under 63, including a 7-under 29 on the final nine holes; marks his second-lowest nine-hole score on TOUR, with the first coming at TPC Summerlin in 2012 (front-nine 28)
