Tom Kim (Winner/-20)

- Picks up his third PGA TOUR title in his 44th start at the age of 21 years, 3 months, 24 days
- PGA TOUR wins (3): 2022 Wyndham Championship, 2022 Shriners Children's Open, 2023 Shriners Children's Open
- Becomes the youngest three-time winner on the PGA TOUR since Tiger Woods (1996 Shriners Children's Open, 1996 Walt Disney World/Oldsmobile Classic, 1997 Sentry)
- Successfully defends a TOUR title in first attempt (DNP/2023 Wyndham Championship)
- Becomes the second-youngest to successfully defend a PGA TOUR title since 1900 (John McDermott/1912 U.S. Open/20 years, 11 months, 21 days)
- Joins Jim Furyk (1998-99) as the only players to win the Shriners Children's Open in back-to-back years
- Becomes the first player to win the same event twice in a season since Byron Nelson won the San Francisco Open in January and December 1944
- Becomes the fourth player to successfully defend a PGA TOUR title this season, joining Max Homa (2022 Fortinet Championship), Rory McIlroy (THE CJ CUP in South Carolina) and Scottie Scheffler (WM Phoenix Open)
- Improves to 2-for-2 in converting the 54-hole lead/co-lead to victory (2022, 2023 Shriners Children's Open)
- Becomes the third defending champion to convert the 54-hole lead/co-lead to victory this season (McIlroy, Scheffler)
- Moves to No. 11 in the Official World Golf Ranking, the highest position of his career
- Qualified for the 2023 TOUR Championship (first appearance in his career), finishing No. 20 in the FedExCup standings

FedExCup Fall Notes

- The top 125 in the FedExCup Fall standings thru The RSM Classic will be exempt into all Full-Field events and THE PLAYERS Championship next season
- Nos. 51-60 in the standings at the conclusion of The RSM Classic will qualify for two Signature Events in 2024 via The Next 10 (AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am, The Genesis Invitational)
- Player currently projected to move into Top 125: **Chesson Hadley** (T7; No. 127 to No. 122)
- Players currently projected to move into The Next 10: **Luke List** (T18; No. 61 to No. 58) and **Sam Ryder** (T28; No. 63 to No. 60)

Additional Player Notes

- **Adam Hadwin** (2nd/-19) and **Taylor Pendrith** (T3/-18) were seeking to join Mackenzie Hughes, Adam Svensson, Corey Connors and Nick Taylor as Canadians to win on TOUR this season
- Hadwin finished runner-up for the sixth time in his 245th TOUR start and recorded his 26th top-10 since the start of the 2017-18 season, the second-most of any player without a win in that span (most: 29/Tommy Fleetwood)
- With a career-low 9-under 62, PGA TOUR rookie **Eric Cole** (T3/-18) earns his fifth top-10 finish of the season; The Arnold Palmer Award (PGA TOUR Rookie of the Year) will be voted on after the FedExCup Fall
- With his first career top-10 finish, Open Qualifier **Isaiah Salinda** (T7/-17) earns a spot in the World Wide Technology Championship field (previous best: T33/2019 Fortinet Championship)

- With a career-low 9-under 62 in the final round (previous: 63/R4/2023 John Deere Classic), **Ludvig Åberg** (T13/-16) is tied for the second-most scores of 65 or lower on TOUR since the start of the RBC Canadian Open (most: 8/Viktor Hovland)
