## Back-nine supremacy lifts Shore to 36-hole lead

BERAZATEGUI, Argentina—A slow start to his second round didn't deter Davis Shore as the former University of Alabama stalwart kicked it in gear once he turned on the back nine at Ranelagh Golf Club. Shore will take a one-stroke lead into the weekend at PGA TOUR Latinoamérica's Roberto De Vincenzo Memorial 100 Years. He's a stroke ahead of a quintet of players—Argentines César Costilla, Andres

Romero and Rafael Echenique, Chandler Blanchet of the U.S. and New Zealander Charlie Hillier. Canadian Max Sekulic is alone in seventh, two shots back of Shore.

After a birdie to open his round, Shore bogeyed his second and third holes, to drop to 1-over. He then parred his next six holes.

“The way this course is, the hard holes all come in a row. The front nine, one through eight, kicks you in the teeth,” said Shore, who was born a year after both Echenique and Romero turned pro, in 1998, and two years after Costilla left the amateur ranks. “It was windy when we started out today, and I was hitting some pretty good shots but still just trying to hold on on the front nine.”

Held on Shore did, making the turn and rallying, with a birdie at No. 10, an eagle for the second consecutive day at the 11th and another birdie at 12. “I knew something like that was going to happen on the back nine because that’s the scoreable side,” Shore explained.

His second-shot approach on the par-5 11th stayed on the green after looking like it might fall off. From there, he rolled in a 12-footer. In Thursday’s first round, his eagle putt came from 10 feet.

“I hit a 5-iron again, the same club,” Shore added about his last two approach shots on No. 11. “It was a different pin location, with a little more wind in our face today. It was probably a little tougher shot today.”

Romero struggled off the tee Friday after enjoying a solid tee-ball game a day earlier. “Today it was hard for me to start the day,” Romero noted. He battled for most of a windy morning, making four birdies against two bogeys for his 2-under 69.

Blanchet took a share of second place despite making one birdie on Ranelagh’s three back-nine par-5s Friday—at No. 14. He birdied all three in Thursday’s opening round.

Echenique, who is playing in his 104th career PGA TOUR Latinoamérica tournament, has made 66 cuts and has a second- and a third-place finish to his credit but has yet to break through and win. His 65 Friday was the low round of the day.

Costilla suffered his first bogey of the round, at No. 15, but recovered nicely with a birdie-birdie-par finish. His last PGA TOUR Latinoamérica top-10 came at the 2019 Cañuelas Championship, a tie for fifth, while Hillier has yet to finish inside the top 10 in this, his 13th career tournament appearance.

**Did you know** Andres Romero played in 231 career PGA TOUR tournaments, posting one victory? Of those appearances, 10 percent (23) resulted in top-10s. The Argentine made his debut at the 2006 Open Championship, tying for eighth. He won his lone title at the 2008 Zurich Classic of New Orleans when it was not a team event. Romero edged Australia’s Peter Lonard by a stroke at TPC Louisiana.

The cut came at 1-under, with 58 players advancing to the weekend.

The Zurich Argentina Swing ends this week at the Roberto De Vincenzo Memorial 100 Years, the fourth of four events in Argentina. There are nine players in this week's field still with a mathematical chance of winning the U.S. \$10,000 bonus. Sweden's **Linus Lilliedahl** holds a 114-point lead over No. 2 **Cristobal Del Solar**, but Del Solar is playing on the Korn Ferry Tour this week. The next-closest player to Lilliedahl is **Jake McCrory**, 135 points behind Lilliedahl.

It was a solid day for the Hillier brothers. **Charlie Hillier** followed his 5-under 66 with a 67 Friday to move into a tie for second. His younger brother, **Harry**, who followed Charlie to the University of Kansas from their native New Zealand, shot a 66, seven shots better than his opening-round score. Harry is tied for 23rd. Friday, the two Hilliers combined for 13 birdies.

First-round leader **Leandro Marelli** struggled on day two, posting a 3-over 74 after opening with a 62. He only managed two birdies Friday after making eight and an eagle in round one. He enters the weekend tied for eighth.

**Andres Romero** played the three par-5s even-par Friday, with a birdie, a bogey and a par. His birdie came at the 11th, but he walked away from the 13th disappointed. "I hit a perfect shot with the 3-wood before the lake," he said of the hole where he settled for par. "On the 14th, with the wind, I felt like it was a par-4, and I made bogey."

On his last full swing of the day, **Chandler Blanchet**, from the fairway bunker, faced 35 yards to the pin. He played what he called a "chunk-and-run shot" that ran out to six feet. He proceeded to sink the birdie putt to end his day on a high note. "It was a really good shot for what I needed," he observed.

In three of the four previous tournaments this season, the halfway-point leader has held the solo advantage. Of that group, only **Cristobal del Solar** converted the 36-hole lead into a win, at the Neuquén Argentina Classic. **Linus Lilliedahl** (Visa Argentine Open) and **David Pastore** (Termas de Rio Hondo Invitational) did not win. At the Scotia Wealth Management Chile Open, **Jorge Fernández Valdés** and **Matt Ryan** shared the second-round lead, with Ryan going on to victory.

The only two 2022-23 tournament winners in the field this week are **Matt Ryan** (Scotia Wealth Management Chile Open) and last week's champion, **Jake McCrory** (Termas de Rio Hondo Invitational). Both players made the cut, with Ryan shooting rounds of 70-69 (tied for 23rd heading into the weekend). McCrory recorded a pair of 70s and is tied for 34th.

The last time **Rafael Echenique** shot a 6-under round in a PGA TOUR Latinoamérica tournament was at the 2020 Estrella del Mar Open in Mexico. He closed with a 66 at the par-72 course to tie for 22nd. His last 65 in competition was at the 2016 Guatemala Open at the par-72 La Reunion Resort.

There were 39 Argentines playing this week, and 12 made the cut. Leading the contingent are Andres Romero, César Costilla and Rafael Echenique, all three at 9-under and tied for second. Here is where the others sit through 36 holes.
