**Scottie Scheffler (T1/-6)**

- 13<sup>th</sup> career 36-hole lead/co-lead on TOUR, the most of any player since he joined the TOUR at the start of the 2019-20 season (second-most: 8, Patrick Cantlay); 3-for-12 to date converting to victory (wins: 2022 Masters Tournament, 2023 WM Phoenix Open, 2024 Arnold Palmer Invitational presented by Mastercard)
- Third career 36-hole lead/co-lead in majors; 1-for-2 to date converting to victory (Won/2022 Masters Tournament, T2/2023 PGA Championship)
- Fourth 36-hole lead/co-lead on TOUR this season, the most of any player in a single season since Sam Burns had five in 2020-21; 1-for-3 to date converting to victory (win: Arnold Palmer Invitational presented by Mastercard)
- Eight-time PGA TOUR winner and 2022 Masters Tournament winner
- With a win, would become the 18<sup>th</sup> player to win the Masters multiple times and first to accomplish the feat since Bubba Watson in 2014
- With a win, would become the fourth-youngest player to win the Masters multiple times, behind Jack Nicklaus, Tiger Woods and Seve Ballesteros
- Multiple titles at three PGA TOUR events (WM Phoenix Open in 2022 and 2023, Arnold Palmer Invitational presented by Mastercard in 2022 and 2024, THE PLAYERS Championship in 2023 and 2024)
- Won the Arnold Palmer Invitational presented by Mastercard and THE PLAYERS Championship in back-to-back weeks in March, entering the Masters with multiple wins on the year for the third consecutive year (longest streak since Tiger Woods from 2005 to 2008)
- Entered the week No. 1 in the FedExCup standings and Official World Golf Ranking; did the same in 2022 (went on to win)
- Leads the PGA TOUR in wins (2) and top-10s (7) this season

**Max Homa (T1/-6)**

- Fourth career 36-hole lead/co-lead on TOUR and first in a major championship; 1-for-3 to date converting to victory (Won/2022 Fortinet Championship, 2<sup>nd</sup>/2023 Genesis Invitational, T5/2023 BMW Championship)
- Previous-best 36-hole position in a major: T11, 2023 Open Championship (finished T10)
- 138 is his career-low 36-hole total in a major championship (previous: 139, twice)
- 18<sup>th</sup> start in a major and coming off his best result (T10/2023 Open Championship)

**Tiger Woods (T22/+1)**

- Extends his streak of consecutive made cuts at the Masters to 24, breaking a tie with Gary Player and Fred Couples for longest streak in tournament history; streak began with his win in 1997 (DNP in 2014, 2016, 2017, 2021)
- 82-time PGA TOUR winner and five-time Masters Tournament champion
- Second start of the season and first since The Genesis Invitational, where he withdrew during the second round due to illness

### Miscellaneous Notes

- 2020 U.S. Open champion and 18-hole leader Bryson **DeChambeau** holds a share of the lead, his first career 36-hole lead/co-lead in a major; previous-best 36-hole position: solo-second, 2020 U.S. Open (went on to win)
- **Ludvig Åberg** (7<sup>th</sup>/-2) records a 3-under 69 and beats the field average by 6.079 strokes, his career-high Strokes Gained: Total in a round on TOUR (previous: 6.000, R4/2023 John Deere Classic); Åberg was the only player in the field to break 70 in the second round
- **Neal Shipley** (T30/+3) is the only amateur to make the cut; qualified by finishing runner-up at the 2023 U.S. Amateur
- The field average in the second round was 75.079, the highest in a single round at the Masters since the third round in 2016 (75.719)
- 6-over is the highest 36-hole cut relative to par on TOUR since the 2020 U.S. Open (+6) and highest at the Masters since 2017 (+6)
