1984 Masters - 1995 Masters

- Second lead/co-lead after any round at a major championship (R1/2013 U.S. Open/T4)
- Would be his ninth career PGA TOUR title and second of the 2024 season (Corales Puntacana Championship)
- Would be his first major championship title in his 43rd major appearance (best finish: T4/2013 U.S. Open)
- Making his 342nd start on the PGA TOUR, would be the second-most starts of any player before their first major title since 1995 (Stewart Cink/2009 Open Championship/352nd start); Brian Harman won the 2023 Open Championship in his 340th start on TOUR
- Would be the first player since Padraig Harrington (2008/74) to win The Open Championship after carding an over-par score in the first round
- Would be the 11th consecutive first-time winner of The Open Championship, tying the longest streak in tournament history (1994-2004)

Would mark the first time since 1982 that all four majors in a year were won by players from the United States

• With a win, **Justin Rose** (T2/-3) would set the longest span between victories in major championship history (4,053 days/2013 U.S. Open)

- 2024 PGA Championship winner **Xander Schauffele** (T2/-3) would be the first player since Brooks Koepka in 2018 (U.S. Open, PGA Championship) to win multiple majors in the same year; entered the week as one of two players (Bryson DeChambeau) with top-10 finishes in the first three majors this year
- Thriston Lawrence (T2/-3) joins Billy Horschel in final pairing of the final round after teeing off 3 hours and 10 minutes before the final pairing in round three and 10 strokes off the lead; four-time DP World Tour winner is making his 14th career PGA TOUR start (best: T24/2022 Genesis Scottish Open) and third at The Open Championship
- Daniel Brown (T2/-3) would be the first player to win in their major championship debut since Keegan Bradley (2011 PGA Championship) and first at The Open Championship since Ben Curtis (2003)
- Sam Burns (T2/-3) would be the first player since Jack Fleck (1955 U.S. Open) to win a major championship after opening with a 76 or worse
- Russell Henley (T2/-3) seeks his first major title in his 40th start (best: T4/2023 Masters Tournament) and would be the second consecutive player from the University of Georgia to win The Open Championship (Brian Harman)
