Scottie Scheffler (1st/-16)

- Entered the event leading by two strokes at 10-under and cards the low score of the day with a 6-under 65 to hold a seven-stroke lead
- Becomes the first player to hold a lead of seven strokes or more after 18 holes of a TOUR event on record (1983present)
- Previous largest 18-hole lead since the Starting Strokes format started in 2019: 5 (Scheffler, 2022)
- Fourth career 18-hole lead/co-lead on TOUR and first since the 2022 TOUR Championship (led by 5); 0-for-3 to date with the 18-hole lead/co-lead
- 65 ties his lowest score in 17 career rounds at the TOUR Championship (R4/2020, R1/2022, R2/2023)
- Entered the TOUR Championship at No. 1 in the FedExCup standings for the third consecutive year (T2/2022, T6/2023)
- Fifth consecutive start at the TOUR Championship (5th/2020, T22/2021, T2/2022, T6/2023)
- With a victory, would win the FedExCup for the first time in his career and earn his seventh victory of the season (wins: Arnold Palmer Invitational presented by Mastercard, THE PLAYERS Championship, Masters Tournament, RBC Heritage, the Memorial Tournament presented by Workday, Travelers Championship)
- With a win, would become the second player to win THE PLAYERS and the FedExCup in the same season and first since Rory McIlroy in 2019
- Last player to win seven or more times in a single season: Tiger Woods, 2007

Additional notes

- **Collin Morikawa** (T2/-9) birdies Nos. 10-15, tying the longest birdie streak of his career and setting the longest birdie streak in TOUR Championship history
- Taylor Pendrith cards a 5-under 66 and moves from T21 to T10, the highest 18-hole standing of any of the nine first-timers in the field; captain's picks for the Presidents Cup will be announced Tuesday and Pendrith finished No. 11 in the International Team standings
