Pre-Tournament Notes

TOUR season notes

- With his win at the Memorial Tournament presented by Workday, Scottie Scheffler captured his 11th PGA TOUR title and fifth of the season, becoming the first player to win five times in a season on TOUR before the U.S. Open since Tom Watson in 1980. Scheffler is also the seventh player since 1983 (16th instance) to win five or more times in a single season on TOUR and first since Justin Thomas in 2016-17 (5).
- 2024 PGA Championship winner **Xander Schauffele** is coming off a T8 finish at the Memorial Tournament presented by Workday in what was his first start since claiming his first major title. Schauffele enters this week on a TOUR-leading streak of 48 consecutive made cuts, with Scheffler second on the list with 38.
- Three-time U.S. Open winner **Tiger Woods** is making his fourth start of the season (WD/The Genesis Invitational, 60th/Masters Tournament, MC/PGA Championship) and first in the U.S. Open since 2020.
- With 3,915 FedExCup points, **Scottie Scheffler** has a 2,172-point lead over **Xander Schauffele** in the FedExCup standings.
- All Signature Event winners this season are in the field: Chris Kirk (The Sentry), Wyndham Clark (AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am), Hideki Matsuyama (The Genesis Invitational), Scottie Scheffler (Arnold Palmer Invitational presented by Mastercard, RBC Heritage, the Memorial Tournament presented by Workday), Rory McIlroy (Wells Fargo Championship)

U.S. Open notes

The field includes:

- The top 30 in the FedExCup standings
- The top 50 in the Official World Golf Ranking
- 14 past U.S. Open winners
- 28 major championship winners
- Pinehurst No. 2 is hosting the U.S. Open for the fourth time; previous winners: Payne Stewart (1999), Michael Campbell (2005) and Martin Kaymer (2014)
- Pinehurst No. 2 is also scheduled to host the U.S. Open in 2029, 2035, 2041 and 2047
- 27 players in the field competed in the 2014 U.S. Open when it was last held at Pinehurst No. 2, including seven who finished inside the top 10 (in bold): Daniel Berger (T28), Zac Blair (T40), **Keegan Bradley** (T4), Brian Campbell (MC), **Jason Day** (T4), Harris English (T48), Matt Fitzpatrick (T48), **Rickie Fowler** (T2), Sergio Garcia (T35), Lucas Glover (MC), Russell Henley (T60), Billy Horschel (T23), **Dustin Johnson** (T4), **Martin Kaymer** (Won), Chris Kirk (T28), **Brooks Koepka** (T4), Matt Kuchar (T12), Shane Lowry (MC), Hideki Matsuyama (T35), Rory McIlroy (T23), Phil Mickelson (T28), Francesco Molinari (T23), Justin Rose (T12), **Adam Scott** (T9), Webb Simpson (T45), Jordan Spieth (T17), Justin Thomas (MC), Brendon Todd (T17), Gary Woodland (T52)
- Five players in the field competed in the 2005 U.S. Open at Pinehurst: Tiger Woods (2nd), Sergio Garcia (T3), Adam Scott (T28), Phil Mickelson (T33) and Matt Kuchar (MC)
- Three players in the field competed in the 1999 U.S. Open at Pinehurst: Phil Mickelson (2nd), Tiger Woods (T3) and Matt Kuchar (MC)
- Two players in the field are playing in the U.S. Open at Pinehurst for the fourth time: Matt Kuchar, Phil Mickelson
- With **Jon Rahm's** streak of 19 made cuts at the majors snapped at the PGA Championship, **Hideki Matsuyama** now holds the longest streak with 16, dating back to the 2020 PGA Championship (note: DNP 2021 Open Championship)
- The last five winners of the U.S. Open were all first-time major champions: Wyndham Clark (2023), Matt Fitzpatrick (2022), Jon Rahm (2021), Bryson DeChambeau (2020), Gary Woodland (2019)

Top player notes

• World No. 1 and FedExCup leader **Scottie Scheffler**, who enters the week with wins in five of his last eight starts on TOUR, has top-10s in his last three U.S. Open starts (3rd/2023, T2/2022, T7/2021). Scheffler looks to become the first player to win multiple majors in the same year since Brooks Koepka (2018 U.S. Open, PGA Championship). The last player to win on TOUR

- and win a major the following week was Rory McIlroy in 2014 (won the WGC-Bridgestone Invitational the week before the PGA Championship).
- 2024 PGA Championship winner **Xander Schauffele** enters the U.S. Open having finished inside the top 15 in all seven career appearances, including top-fives in 2017 (T5), 2019 (T3) and 2020 (5th). Schauffele has also finished inside the top 20 in each of the last nine major championships dating back to the 2022 PGA Championship. With a win, Schauffele would become the first player to win consecutive major championships since Jordan Spieth in 2015.
- Adam Scott will compete in his 93rd career major championship (92nd consecutive) after finishing No. 61 in the Official World Golf Ranking through the week prior to the U.S. Open. Scott became exempt when the late Grayson Murray (No. 59) was removed from the list for purposes of determining the top 60.
 - Scott will compete in his 23rd consecutive U.S. Open, with his best finish is a tie for fourth in 2015 at Chambers Bay. He has played in two U.S. Opens at Pinehurst (T28/2005, T9/2014).
- Collin Morikawa arrives with top-five finishes in each of his last three starts on TOUR (T4/PGA Championship, 4th/Charles Schwab Challenge, 2nd/the Memorial Tournament presented by Workday); Morikawa is one of four players with a top-10 finish in each of the first two majors of the year (only one with a top-five in each):

- 2011 U.S. Open champion and 2023 runner-up Rory McIlroy has five consecutive top-10 finishes at the U.S. Open.
- **Rickie Fowler**, who finished T5 at the 2023 U.S. Open, was co-runner up in 2014 when the U.S. Open was last held at Pinehurst No. 2.
- The last two winners of the North and South Amateur, held annually at Pinehurst Resort & Country Club, are in the field, with PGA TOUR rookie **Nick Dunlap** winning in 2023, and Florida State sophomore **Luke Clanton** capturing the title in 2022.
- Four players in the top 10 in the Official World Golf Ranking seek their first major championship victory: **Viktor Hovland** (No. 5), **Ludvig Åberg** (No. 6), **Patrick Cantlay** (No. 9), **Max Homa** (No. 10)
