Ludvig Åberg (1st/-5)

- Third career 36-hole lead/co-lead on TOUR, including his first at a major; 1-for-2 converting the victory: 2023 RSM Classic/Win, 2024 AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am/2nd
- Hit his first 20 fairways this week, tying him with George Coetzee (2015) for the second-most consecutive fairways hit to start a U.S. Open since 2003 (most: 27/David Toms/2014)
- Third player in the last 25 years to lead in both Driving Accuracy (93%) and Greens in Regulation (83%) through 36 holes at the U.S. Open (Kenny Perry/2006, Bill Haas/2007)
- Last player to win the U.S. Open in their debut: Francis Ouimet/1913
- Last player to hold the 36-hole lead/co-lead in their U.S. Open debut: T.C. Chen/1985 (finished T2)
- Best finish at the U.S. Open by a player from Sweden: 4th/Niclas Fasth/2007, T4/Henrik Stenson/2014, T4/Robert Karlsson/2008
- Finished T5 at last week’s Memorial Tournament presented by Workday, his sixth top-10 in 12 starts on TOUR this season
- One of four players inside the top 10 in the Official World Golf Ranking seeking their first major championship victory (No.5/Viktor Hovland, No. 6/Ludvig Åberg, No. 9/Patrick Cantlay, No. 10/Max Homa)
- Third career start in a major championship: 2024 Masters Tournament/2nd, 2024 PGA Championship/MC

Additional Player Notes

- First-round co-leader **Patrick Cantlay** (T2/-4) holds his best position through 36 holes in his 30th career major appearance (previous: T6/2020 Masters Tournament); one of four players inside the top 10 in the Official World Golf Ranking seeking their first major championship victory (No.5/Viktor Hovland, No. 6/Ludvig Åberg, No. 9/Patrick Cantlay, No. 10/Max Homa)
- **Thomas Detry** (T2/-4) posts 67 to sit inside the top 10 after the last six rounds at a major; is a cumulative 22-under par in his last 10 rounds in majors after being 34-over par in his first 18 rounds
- 2020 U.S. Open champion **Bryson DeChambeau** (T2/-4) posts back-to-back under-par rounds at the U.S. Open for the first time since 2021 (R2/69, R3/68); has sat inside the top 10 in nine of the last 10 rounds at a major (T18/2024 PGA Championship/R1)
- World No. 1 and FedExCup leader **Scottie Scheffler** (T57/+5) posts 74 for his sixth over-par score this season and marks his third consecutive over-par score on TOUR for the first time since the 2020 BMW Championship (R1/75, R2/72, R2/72); first round on TOUR without making a birdie since a final-round 72 at the 2022 Charles Schwab Challenge (16 pars, two bogeys); third time in a U.S. Open round without making a birdie (R1/2019/72, R2/2016/78)
- Playing in his first U.S. Open since 2020, three-time champion **Tiger Woods** (+7) misses his second consecutive cut at the U.S. Open and fourth in his last five

- **Sepp Straka** and **Francesco Molinari** each made a hole-in-one at the par-3 ninth hole from 194 yards (Straka's first career hole-in-one on TOUR, Molinari's third); Molinari's hole-in-one moved him to 5-over for the tournament to make the cut on the number. Since 2003, no player has made a hole-in-one at the 36th hole to make the cut on the number on the PGA TOUR.
