(36th of 36 events in the FedExCup Regular Season)

**Weather: Sunday:** Partly cloudy. High of 84. Wind ENE 4-8 mph. Play was suspended due to darkness at 8:17 p.m. ET with one player (Matt Kuchar) left to complete the round. **Monday**: Mostly sunny. High of 70. Wind NE 3-6 mph. The final round resumed at 8 a.m. and was completed at 8:06 a.m.

## Aaron Rai (1st/-18)

- Closes with a bogey-free 6-under 64 to claim his first career PGA TOUR title in his 89<sup>th</sup> start at the age of 29 years, 5 months, 8 days
- With the win, collects 500 FedExCup points and moves from No. 53 to 25<sup>th</sup> in the standings entering the FedExCup Playoffs; qualified for the FedExCup Playoffs in each of his first two seasons on TOUR but has not advanced to the BMW Championship
- Becomes the 11<sup>th</sup> first-time winner on TOUR this season and first since Harry Hall (ISCO Championship)
- Wolverhampton native becomes the 17<sup>th</sup> PGA TOUR winner from England since the start of the 1940 season (48<sup>th</sup> win)
- Becomes the second TOUR winner from England this season, joining Harry Hall (ISCO Championship)
- Becomes the first player from England to win the Wyndham Championship and first international winner of the event since Tom Kim in 2022
- Trailed Max Greyserman by four strokes with four holes to play, before a Greyserman quadruple bogey at No. 13 dropped him from 21-under into a tie with Rai at 17-under
- With two eagles, a birdie and a par, played the par-5 15<sup>th</sup> hole for the week in 5-under par
- Most recent finishes on TOUR: T2/Rocket Mortgage Classic, T7/John Deere Classic, T4/Genesis Scottish Open, T75/The
  Open Championship, Won/Wyndham Championship
- Now in his third season as a TOUR member, has amassed 11 top-10 finishes in 89 starts
- In two previous starts at the Wyndham Championship, finished T71 in 2022 and missed the cut in 2023

# Max Greyserman (2<sup>nd</sup>/-16)

- Finishes solo-second for the second consecutive tournament on the PGA TOUR schedule (3M Open, Wyndham Championship)
- After an eagle-3 at No. 5, holed his second shot from 91 yards at the par-4 13<sup>th</sup> for a second eagle of the round, extending his lead to four strokes at 21-under; an ensuing quadruple bogey at the par-4 14<sup>th</sup> dropped him into a tie for the lead at 17-under with Rai; he followed a birdie at No. 15 and double bogey at the par-4 16<sup>th</sup> before finishing two back at 16-under 264
- The last player to follow an eagle on one hole with a quadruple bogey on the next was Jarrod Lyle in round one of the 2009 Valero Texas Open
- With his runner-up finish, moves to No. 47 in the FedExCup standings entering the FedExCup Playoffs
- Has claimed four top-10 finishes in 22 starts this season (T7/Texas Children's Open, T4/Zurich Classic of New Orleans with partner Nico Echavarria, 2<sup>nd</sup>/3M Open, 2<sup>nd</sup>/Wyndham Championship)

- The Wyndham Championship was the final event of the FedExCup Regular Season, with the top 70 in the standings qualifying for next week's FedEx St. Jude Championship (the first FedExCup Playoffs event)
- For the second time and first since 2013, no player moved in from outside the FedExCup Playoffs bubble and went on to
- One week after representing France in the 2024 Men's Olympic Golf Competition, **Victor Perez** (T33/-8) remains No. 70 and qualifies for the FedExCup Playoffs in his first season as a member
- Matt Kuchar snaps his streak of qualifying for the FedExCup Playoffs; entered the week as the only player to qualify for the Playoffs in each season since the inception of the FedExCup in 2007

## **Comcast Business TOUR TOP 10**

- The Wyndham Championship served as the final opportunity for players to secure their spot inside the Comcast
  Business TOUR TOP 10, which rewards season-long performance for the top 10 players in the FedExCup standings at the
  conclusion of the FedExCup Regular Season; the group will share a \$40 million bonus, with the No. 1-ranked played
  earning \$8 million
- Two players in the field entered the week inside the top 10 and remained in their spots: **Sungjae Im** (No. 9) and **Shane Lowry** (No. 10)

## **Miscellaneous Notes**

- Coming off three straight missed cuts and seeking his first top-10 finish of the season, **Ryo Hisatune** (T3/-15) closes his first Wyndham Championship with a 3-under 67 to reach 15-under 265; marks his third top-10 finish in his 27<sup>th</sup> career start on TOUR (T10/2023 Barracuda Championship, T6/2023 ZOZO CHAMPIONSHIP)
- Making his seventh start in the Wyndham Championship, J.J. Spaun (T3/-15) closes with a bogey-free 6-under 64 in his bid for a second consecutive top-10 finish on the PGA TOUR (T9/3M Open) and third of the season (T10/Rocket Mortgage Classic); T16 in his first start of 2017 marked his previous-best Wyndham Championship finish
- In his sixth PGA TOUR start this season, amateur Luke Clanton follows his career-low 8-under 62 in round three Sunday morning with a 1-under 69 to reach 14-under 266, good for a fifth-place finish; as an amateur, he cannot earn official or unofficial money or non-member FedExCup points; this marks his third top-10 of the season (T2/John Deere Classic, T10/Rocket Mortgage Classic); becomes the first amateur to amass three top-10 finishes in a season on the PGA TOUR since Jack Nicklaus in 1961; remains committed to competing in this week's U.S. Amateur at Hazeltine National Golf Club in Minnesota
